Grateful thanks go to Colin Gladstone and Colin Clark for their hard work in the preparation and dismantling of the field. Yet again G (Georgina), along with her team of helpers, but to a great extent unaided, has worked tirelessly, not only during the immediate run-up to the Festival but for many months before, to make the Festival the success that it undoubtedly was. Congratulations to her on winning The Melfort Farm Trophy and The Cuilfail Trophy (she didn't add up her own points!!)

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A meeting of the above Council was held on Tuesday 13th July 1999 at Kilmelford Village Hall. There were six members of the Council in attendance and eleven members of the public, including Constable Law and Cllrs. Macaskill and MacIntyre.

Various matters arising from the last minutes were discussed:- it was agreed to obtain a report on the Melfort Pier sea wall application, with Cllr. Macaskill reassuring the Council that no further building development could take place without a full environmental impact assessment; the Blaran road end was considered dangerous and action again called for, despite it not being the responsibility of the Argyll and Bute Council. Cllr. MacIntyre intended taking this on board; the Council and the School Board would press for the introduction of a speed limit outside the school; the poor standard of roadside scrub cutting needed to be addressed; subsidence at Barnacarry and a dangerous corner at Kilninver; Loch Melfort beach clean raised £590 from the Prince's Trust and a £10 donation from D Campbell - this money is to be used in a joint project between the Hall the School to provide full sports equipment in the hall; warning signs have been placed at Scammadale loch for young swimmers; suitable sites for a playing field in Kilmelford were discussed and further action identified.

The Chairman decided that since there had been no suggestions as to a suitable event to commemorate the Millennium, and since there were so many grand events on that night, there was little point in the Community Council attempting to organise anything for that night. It was felt that efforts would be better directed towards a Burns Supper or something of the like with the 12th of January suggested as a suitable date. Colin Clark agreed to be responsible for organising this event.

Recent planning applications were reported but did not warrant discussion.

There were a number of points raised under Any Other Business:- Fiona Wyllie advised of the difficulties in distributing the newsletter, and suggestions for improvements were discussed; G Dalton advised on issues regarding the Kilmelford Summer Festival; the state of the Macleods development in Kilmelford was discussed, and how the lack of upkeep was a constant problem to residents of the Glebe. It was agreed to pursue this with Macleods in the first instance, and then take the matter to higher levels if a satisfactory solution isn't immediately reached; the roadside lay-bys toward Oban require attention, especially when used as tourist picnic sites over the Summer.

The date of the next meeting is Tuesday 28th September 1999 at 8 p.m. in Kilmelford Village Hall.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The annual general meeting of the Community Council followed the above meeting.

In his report, the Chairman highlighted the work carried out by the Council over the previous year, and outlined areas that required attention in the foreseeable future. The Chairman thanked the Council for their efforts, and also thanked Constable Law and the Cllrs. Macaskill and MacIntyre for their support.

The Treasurer's report was given by the Secretary, who advised that there had been no large expenditure over the previous year, and that the provisional accounts showed a cash position at the end of March 1999 of \pounds 522.06. This was subject to auditing by Mrs Shelagh Cannon, whereupon the annual grant from Argyll and Bute Council could be applied for. The matter of the Secretary's expenses was discussed, and it was agreed that an honorarium of \pounds 60 per annum be allocated to cover the same.

The exisiting office holders all agreed to stand again, and were duly reelected. \bigcirc

HOW THE "SHOWER OF HERRING" GOT ITS NAME

The curious case of how the Shower of Herring came by its name is a surprise to the many people who assume that the "Shower" is some sort of corruption or mispronunciation of the word "Shoal". In fact the restaurant is named after a "rain" of fish which fell on the hillside at Melfort at the beginning of the last century. The event was recorded in the Edinburgh New Philosophical Journal, 1826:-

"..... on a small eminence above Melford House, a shower of herring fell in 1821, in every respect so large and good, that the tenants by whom they were found were induced to send some of them to their landlord, then residing in Edinburgh. In regard to the state of the weather, I could learn no more than it was exceedingly boisterous; while the hill on which they were found is exposed to the south-west wind, which blows along Loch Melford, an arm of the sea in which herrings are frequently found."

The second account is a folklore tale of dubious origins which most modern commentators are inclined to dismiss as fantasy:-

"Full of faith and hope we set forth, under a dark and lowering sky. The strong men of Kilchoan had been fishing the day before and told us the loch was full of herring. With four men rowing and the lad to steer we passed the point of Kames with the bow set for Eilean Gamhna and the rising wind lifting the choppy sea. We could see the squalls blowing across Luing and, nearer, the raft of seabirds squabbling over the shoals of herring. We were not far out when the lad let loose a cry and, looking up, we spied a commotion upon the water, a dark line rushing up the loch,

boiling and furious, with the calling seabirds fleeing before it. The nearest shelter being to starboard we turned and, pulling hard past Sgeir na Caillich, made for the lee of Eilean Coltair. With clouds skudding low across the rock we got a line ashore and cowered down, shivering and praying, to wait for the squall to pass. Disbelieving we looked to seaward and saw a swirling column of water, black but filled with the glint of silver, glittering like frost on the bark of a tree, howling up the loch. Past Baghna-Dalach, the point of Ardenstuir, to Fearnach Bay we saw it go. Scared and shaken, convinced by the rising gale, we hoisted a heavily reefed main and ran for home at the head of the loch. Beaching the boat through the crashing surf we were met by Meggy Dubh on the beach, crying her nonsense about fish falling from the sky. With the empty boat secured we set off wearily for home when, walking around the head of the bay, we came across a carpet of silver, a shoal of herring twitching and flapping on the grass with the women folk already at work among them. The storm had done what we had failed to do and brought the herring home to stew(!)"

TALKING OF STORMS

The havoc wreaked by the storm we experienced on the 8th of September was, according to Angus McFadyen senior, the worst at Scammadale since the "Great Flood" in 1963.
