## KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A meeting of the Community Council was held on Tuesday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May, 2000 at Kilmelford Village Hall. There were four community councillors present, plus fourteen members of the public. Also in attendance were Cllr. Alan Macaskill and constable Raymond Law.

At the start of the meeting, the chairman noted the resignation from the community council by David Kilpatrick.

Following the approval of the minutes from the last meeting, it was reported by the secretary that he had received a proposed list of children and young adults' sports equipment to be purchased for the Village Hall, and that Don McAllister would shortly be submitting the order on the Village Hall Committee's behalf. This was made possible from various fund raising activities, but mainly from beach cleaning over the last three years (this being an activity that receives little support, yet can raise up to  $\pounds750$  per year for such causes). The secretary wished to extend especial thanks to Nadine Archibald from Maolachy for her solo efforts in clearing the shore of the Oude dam.

The proposed speed limit outside Kilninver School was discussed, but it appears that the police are reluctant to support this proposal since it would be difficult to enforce. Efforts will continue to be made to push this proposal through as soon as possible.

Following a query at the last meeting regarding the absence of an advertisement for the planning application east of Kilmelford Yacht Haven, the secretary reported that he had spoken to the planning officer and had been told that neighbour notification only was required in this instance. Cllr. Macaskill suggested that in future, all planning applications should be posted on a notice board.

Cllr. Macaskill reported that M & K MacLeods have announced that they are awaiting delivery of lighting columns, and they would then complete the street lighting and reinstate the road on the Glebe development, with a proposed completion date of three to four weeks from 22<sup>nd</sup> May, 2000. The lack of landscaping was discussed, and it was agreed that this should be looked into further.

It had been hoped that Colin Gladstone might have been able to attend the meeting to discuss the future management of the Kilmelford Summer Festival, but in his absence G Dalton reported that the Festival was to be held in the Village Hall this year. There was various discussion as to events taking place, and it was felt that the use of a nearby field would greatly enhance such an occasion. It was agreed that John Tilley be

contacted to see if part of the neighbouring field might be available for purchase as a permanent playing field for the Hall.

Three planning applications were reported by Dorothy Carmichael, none of which received any objection. These being: Kilmelford Village Shop (change of use to café); siting of generator at Bheinn Chaorach; Loch Melfort Hotel (erection of staff accommodation).

Finally, the chairman reported that with new people coming into the community, it would be very useful to keep a record of all members of the community so that newcomers could be welcomed and invited to attend community functions. The chairman felt that one person should be appointed to monitor this. It was pointed out that the newsletter team kept a mailing list up to date, and G Dalton suggested compiling a community telephone list and including it in the newsletter. Mike Erskine advised that it was the minister's duty to keep abreast of community members, and would adopt this role immediately.

The next meeting was set for Tuesday, 29<sup>th</sup> August, 2000 in Kilmelford Village Hall (N.B. This was subsequently changed to Tuesday, 19<sup>th</sup> September 2000).

There being no further business the meeting was closed at 8.56 p.m.

#### WHAT'S IN A NAME .....?

Extract taken from "The Melfort Journal", Melfort, Saskatchewan dated 18<sup>th</sup> August 1998.

"The city of Melfort is a Scottish name, and was chosen by Mrs Mary Beatty, the first white woman to become a permanent resident in the district.

Mrs Beatty was given the honour of naming the town by Mr Malcolm Hugh McLeod in 1904. She chose Melfort, after her parents' estate in Argyllshire, Scotland.

Today Melfort can still be found on a map of Scotland, north west of Glasgow on the coast."

On a cold, crisp morning the chief assembled his hunters for one of the regular winter deer hunts on which the community's survival depended. #### RECIPES

## PHEASANT NORMANDY (from Cath Manchester)

large pheasant
 large Cox's apples, peeled, cored and sliced
 pint dry cider
 tablespoons natural yoghurt
 Chopped parsley
 Seasoning

Place pheasant breast side down in flameproof casserole and add the cider, apples and seasoning.

Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 1 - 2 hours (depending how old the bird is).

Remove the pheasant, carve and keep it warm.

Remove the apples from the sauce, sieve them and add them to the pheasant.

Boil the sauce. Remove from the heat and add the yoghurt. Pour the sauce over the pheasant and sprinkle with parsley.
