Congratulations to the Gaelic Choir who gained a very creditable fourth place in what was a very high standard of competition at the Royal National Mod in Dunoon.

OPEN DAY AND SWIMATHON AT THE MELFORT CLUB IN AID OF THE ANTHONY NOLAN BONE MARROW TRUST

An Open Day, held on the 24th of November, was the Melfort Club's response to a request from Jane Rentoul for their help in raising funds and raising awareness of the Anthony Nolan Bone Marrow Trust.

The Trust was set up in 1974 and now holds one of the largest databases of unrelated donors in the world. In addition to the funds needed to continue its life-saving work (the Trust receives no government funding), the Trust desperately needs volunteers to go on the Register. For many people who suffer from bone marrow diseases and whose immune systems are unable to fight infection, a bone marrow transplant is their only chance of life.

Kay Benn (the full-time lifeguard at the Club) organised a 12 hour Swimathon and 48 sponsored swimmers relayed up and down the pool for a minimum of 15 minutes each. Malcie Macallum showed slides of Mid Argyll, Lorna Peterson provided pony rides, Jill Erskine did face painting and Christine Roberts and Carolyn Stoddart prepared and sold refreshments during the day.

Alice McPhee was awarded the prize for obtaining the most sponsorship and her efforts raised over £380 for the Trust. At the time of going to press the "Open Day" has brought in more than £3,000 and there is still some sponsorship money to come.

KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Summary of Community Council Meeting on 19th September, 2000

A meeting of the Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council was held on Tuesday, 19th September, 2000 at Kilmelford Village Hall. There were five community councillors present, plus eleven members of the public. Also in attendance were Cllrs Alan Macaskill and Duncan MacIntyre.

Following the approval of the minutes from the last meeting, it was reported by Cllr Macaskill that the original plans for the Glebe landscaping by M & K Macleod had shown a children's play area which had not been constructed. It was noted, however, that the maintenance of this area would be the responsibility of the Glebe residents and may not be fully supported. G Dalton reported that the Kilmelford Summer Festival had been a success and had raised around £700 on the day. Since Georgina was retiring as festival organiser, a vote of thanks was given, and Fiona Wyllie presented Georgina with an ornamental tree. The secretary reported that the children's sports equipment for the hall had not yet been ordered, but that this was imminent. Fiona Wyllie raised the question as to why some planning applications required newspaper advertisements, when others did not. Since this query referred to the application for a dwelling house east of Kilmelford Yacht Haven, Cllr Macaskill advised that an advertisement was only required when immediate neighbours did not possess premises where a notice could be delivered by hand. It was also noted that the

community council receives notice of all planning applications whether advertised or not. Dorothy Carmichael is the community councillor with special responsibilities for planning matters, and as such receives notice at the time of application.

Christine Wills, District Nurse, gave a brief presentation on community transport issues in Seil, Luing, Kilninver and Kilmelford. A questionnaire was distributed regarding the need for community transport in this area. Ultimately it was felt that the cost of upkeep, plus the logistical difficulties of operating one vehicle over a large area would render the idea impractical.

Six planning applications were reported by Dorothy Carmichael. These being: Mike Campbell – dwellinghouse at Arduaine; Vodaphone – erection of a mast North of Cuilfail Wood; M & K Macleod – dwellinghouse on plot 17, The Glebe; David Kilpatrick – erection of agricultural shed at Kilninver. There was concern raised over the number of cellular telephone masts being erected without planning permission. Cllr Macaskill advised that masts under 15 metres in height did not currently require planning permission, although new government legislation may change this. It was generally felt that further development on The Glebe would lead to improvements in road surfaces and landscaping as had been requested over a number of years.

The secretary drew attention to a variety of general correspondence, and also highlighted two items: notice of an open meeting with council leaders on 30th September, 2000 in Oban; Community safety questionnaire from the Area Committeee. The two main areas highlighted were Blaran road end, and the need for speed restrictions outside Kilninver school.

Under Any Other Business, the chairman asked Mike Erskine to report on any newcomers to the community. The secretary advised that there had been no response regarding the acquisition of land adjacent to the village hall as a community playing field. The chairman asked the councillors to report on the situation regarding SINA (Special Islands Needs Allowance) money that was available. Cllr Macaskill advised that about £100,000 had been awarded to each Area Committee for distribution amongst various projects. While this has been oversubscribed seven times over, there was general disappointment expressed that the community had not been aware that applications were invited. Cllr Macaskill advised that no more applications would be considered this year, although there may be a similar funding available next year, so it would be advisable to begin planning as soon as possible.

The next meeting was set for Tuesday, 14th November, 2000 in Kilmelford Village Hall.

There being no further business the meeting was closed at 9.32 p.m.

Summary of Community Council Meeting on 28th November, 2000

A meeting of Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council was held on Tuesday, 28th November, 2000 at Kilmelford Village Hall. There were four community councillors present, plus five members of the public. Also in attendance were Cllrs Alan Macaskill and Duncan MacIntyre, and Constable Raymond Law.

Following the approval of the minutes from the last meeting, it was reported by the secretary that the children and young adults' sports equipment had been ordered for the village hall, with delivery expected shortly. Cllr MacIntyre reported that the road improvement works at Blaran road end had been approved by the council provided that local landowners contribute 50% of the total cost of £1,500. Road safety outside Kilninver school was discussed, and Cllr MacIntyre reported that the Roads Department were considering installing flashing warning lights for key periods of the day.

The secretary advised that he had been issued with a copy of the Argyll and Bute Structure Plan, which at present was a document for public consulation, outlining the planned strategies of the council in all areas of Argyll and Bute. Both councillors advised that there was insufficient detail to merit great attention at this stage, but early next year the new Lorn Local Plan would be produced which would detail all relevant topics. The Current Structure Plan will be available for inspection in Kilmelford Village shop shortly.

Three planning applications were reported by Dorothy Carmichael. These being: Scottish Hydro Electric – supply of electricity to Vodaphone mast North of Cuilfail Wood; Macleod Limited – erection of 8 houses on The Glebe; Dr and Mrs A McCoss – erection of dwellinghouse at Eathie, Arduaine. The secretary advised that he had written to the Planning Department voicing concern over the Macleod application, which included a number of two storey houses when the original plan had been for bungalows, and also that a number of recent private applications had been limited to one and a half storey. Cllr Macaskill advised that this application would probably go before the Area Committee in January, followed by a site inspection.

The secretary drew attention to a variety of general correspondence, and also distributed copies of a local health council questionnaire for anyone interested.

Under Any Other Business, Lindsay Robertson highlighted the poor state of the Scammadale road, and the lack of ditch cleaning by the council. It was agreed that the secretary would write to the roads department requesting immediate attention. Colin Clark asked for a mandate to renew the community license under the Lotteries and Amusements Act 1976. This permits the operation of raffles using pre-purchased tickets, and may be available for anyone organising charity fund raising events within the community. Cllr Macaskill reported the Area Committee were meeting on December 6th, and under discussion would be the proposal to close the Nelson Ward in Oban, and encourage a "Care in the Community" programme. Cllr MacIntyre said that the original concept was that hospital beds were provided where needed, but community care should be provided where possible. Cllr Macaskill advised that this was to be an open meeting, where Health Board representatives would be present to answer public questions on the issue. The secretary advised that he would place a notice in the Kilmelford Village shop advising of the time and date of the meeting. Cllr MacIntyre pointed out that there were no roadside signs for

Knipoch. The secretary would pursue this with the roads department. G Dalton reported a lack of passing places on the Loch Avich road. The secretary will write to the roads department requesting improvements. Cllr MacIntyre reported that SINA money may be available for future years, and suggested that the community draw up a five year plan of desired projects and expenditure within the community. This will be placed on the agenda for the next meeting, with ideas from the public welcome.

The next meeting was set for Tuesday, 6th February, 2001 in Kilmelford Village Hall.

There being no further business the meeting was closed at 8.57 p.m.
