CASTLEMILK INTER-CHURCH REFUGEE CENTRE

Keith and Eileen Baxendale, who co-ordinate the relief work, were very grateful for everyone's generosity in donating clothes etc. for the use of the Castlemilk refugees, nearly all of whom are in touch with the centre.

They estimate that there are now around 300 refugees in Castlemilk, who escaped from a wide range of countries. A further 100 are expected soon. The largest contingents are from Iran and Iraq. The financial cost of escape is generally high, so most were formerly prosperous people in their own countries. On arrival, refugees are assigned temporary accommodation, pending Home Office decisions on their future, in tower blocks (i.e. in accommodation, unwanted by local residents, which is thought to be due for demolition). Each is given the most basic necessities (e.g. 1 cup, 1 knife, 1 fork etc.) plus food vouchers and an allowance of £10 per week. It is very much subsistence level provision.

Enough clothes are now available to meet needs for the next two or three months, but other items are in short supply. These include:- Bedding, Cutlery, Crockery, Pots and Pans (especially large ones suitable for cooking rice) Toiletries and Cosmetics, Small Tables (especially nests of tables), Table Cloths and Tray Cloths, Clocks, Watches and Radios, Pictures and Decorations.

KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The community council held an ordinary general meeting and the annual general meeting on 12th June 2001 at Kilmelford Village Hall.

The main issues discussed were:

Road safety at Kilninver School- it was reported that a quote for flashing lights was to be received shortly, and hopefully accepted by the council (the works have subsequently been carried out). There are mixed feelings over a speed limit in the vicinity of the school.

Timber Extraction at Scammadale- the proposed extraction route through Scammadale Glen has been objected to, and a site meeting between all parties would soon be arranged to discuss the options.

Loch Melfort Beach Clean- this was reported as a success and raised a total of £615.

Blaran Road End- this long running saga may now be resolved as it was reported that the council have plans for major road repairs between Oban and Lochgilphead.

M&K MacLeods have a planning application for houses on The Glebe to be discussed at the Area Committee meeting, as it was originally subject to a number of local objections.

The possibility of the community purchasing or leasing land for a permanent sports/recreational facility was discussed, and the land immediately behind the village hall was identified as having greatest potential. This matter will be further investigated.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be held on Tuesday 25th September, 2001 in Kilmelford Village Hall.

LOCH MELFORT ANNUAL BEACH CLEAN 2001

(The Argyll and Bute Trust will provide a grant of over £700 towards local children's charities, groups and activities, based on the mileage of shoreline cleaned)

On 29th April, a small team of community spirited volunteers (yet again, too few to mention) turned up to assist in the Loch Melfort beach clean.

Our efforts were subsequently bolstered by a tremendous effort from pupils of Oban High School, raising money for their exchange visit to Laurinberg, North Carolina later this year. Stuart Cannon very generously provided the Kames Fish Farm work barge and extra labour, who together with David Keate and myself, managed to remove and dispose of a huge quantity of rubbish from around the loch. The end result was that the entire beach between Degnish Point and Kames Bay was cleared of all rubbish that had accumulated over the year. Not only does this benefit all residents of the community and visitors to the area, but also a total of £615 was raised for local children's organisations (mainly the Oban High School exchange students and the Kilmelford Playgroup).

Without the dedication and hard work put in by the small band of volunteers each year on this project, we would end up with a shoreline not dissimilar to that suffered by Arrochar. I would urge anyone that enjoys our beautiful and special piece of shoreline to come and join in next Spring (date to be announced).

BULBS THAT LOVE KILMELFORD

One of the nice things about living in Kilmelford is that a whole host of bulbs thrive in our wet and windy gardens. Do you remember the wonderful show of daffodils last spring? They were an unforgettable sight in gardens and on road verges, almost as if the whole area was taking part in a flower show. The first bulbs in my garden are SNOWDROPS – double and single forms. A few bulbs quickly make a clump, and then the clump should be divided into groups of 5 or 6 bulbs and be immediately replanted. Soon they will make a carpet. The time to do this division is any time while they are obviously growing, gardeners call it being "in the green", so do it before or after flowering just as the flowers fade on a grey drizzly day and the won't know they have been moved.

Another bulb is CHIONODOXA – the "glory of the snow" – usually with brigh light blue flowers, but a pink variety is available. They rapidly form a clump, and like snowdrops benefit from being divided, most easily "in the green", but division can be done at any time, for example if you suddenly dig up a clump later in the year. The leaves of snowdrops and chionodoxa only last for 3 or 4 weeks after flowering and then leave the border looking neat and tidy.

DAFFODIL leaves last for at least 6 weeks after the flowers have shrivelled and the leaves should NOT be cut off, or twisted or tied in a knot, as it is only undamages leaves that feed goodness back into the bulbs to make bigger and more bulbs to flower next year. But I must admit that those leaves <u>are</u> untidy!

Another blue bulb is the GRAPE HYACINTH (Muscari) – usually a much darker blue that chionodoxas – and they often flower at the same time as daffodils. Their thin leaves too persist an awful long time, but again big clumps develop quickly. I divide these clumps once the leaves have died away.

How about TULIPS? I love them and by choosing carefully you can have them in flower from early March to late May. They come in all sizes from 2" - 24" tall, all colours and oddly quite a number of different shapes – many early (Kaufmania) varieties open like stars in sunshine, and lily flowering forms have an elegant "waist" with the tips of the petals flaring outwards. Now I find wind is a problem as their stems are rigid and snap easily so I choose tulips which have short stems and try not to choose any which are more than 18" tall. Tulips do not multiply in my garden and many die after flowering so I order new bulbs each year. Bulbs that flower from late March to early July are the DUTCH IRIS which come in white, blues and yellow. They have strong sturdy stems and stand up well to wind. I find they usually last for 2 years and then need replacing.

Oh dear! I forgot all about CROCUSES which are sociable plants and love growing in clumps, but woe is me, the mice love them too! Try growing them in a planter, especially if it is raised above the ground. Or plant in the lawn, but don't cut the grass until the leaves have died down.

Well that is enough to be going on with except for one last "tip". All bulbs hate being sodden and wet and quickly rot if they are. So when I am planting bulbs I take a bucket of gritty sand or gravel with me and plant all bulbs on top of a $\frac{1}{2}$ " - 1" thick layer. The gravel/grit layer lets the water run away quickly and bulb roots happily grow through it to reach the soil below.

Bulbs are in the shops and garden centres now, and now is the time to buy and plant for next year's display.
