KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The community council held an ordinary general meeting on 5th February, 2002 at Kilmelford Village Hall.

The main issues discussed were:

Timber extraction at Scammadale is ongoing, with some 600 tonnes remaining to be removed. The condition of the road is under review, and repairs will be effected after extraction is complete.

Planning consent has been granted for the Arduaine campsite application, subject to conditions as requested by the community council.

There was much discussion over planning procedures, especially regarding neighbour notification and advertising. It was generally considered that a presentation by the Head of the Planning Department would be quite useful. It was agreed that this should take place for the next meeting, and that questions should be submitted to the secretary by the end of February (at the time of writing two people had submitted questions - NJM). It should be noted that the community council receives notice of all planning applications pertinent to the community, and that the community council planning officer, Dorothy Carmichael, obtains detailed plans of each application immediately. The community council can then decide what action should be taken.

The planning application for five houses at Scammadale was discussed, with general objections on a number of issues. It was finally agreed that the community council would object to the applications as they were in clear contravention of Council guidelines. It was, however, pointed out that blanket objections to planning applications do not allow communities to develop, so careful thought must be given to the grounds for objection, rather than automatic objections.

Georgina Dalton reported on the current state of play regarding the proposed wind farm at Loch Avich. A map was tabled showing the location and potential visual impact points in the surrounding area. Scottish power have issued a scoping document for local consultation (a copy of which has been available for inspection at the Kilmelford Post Office). There has been no planning application lodged to date. It was pointed out by Cllr Duncan MacIntyre that the government policy is in favour of renewable energy, so any application such as this one couldn't be rejected purely on visual impact. There was a discussion on the pros and cons of wind energy, where it was clear that further information is required to allow members of the community to form an opinion. It was suggested that one community council member be appointed to set up a sub-committee to focus on this one topic.

The high incidence of dog fouling in the village was raised. It was suggested that some dogs were allowed to wander unattended, and the chairman agreed to contact the dog warden to investigate action.

The application by Celtic Sea Ltd for an access road, slipway and shed was due for discussion by the Argyll and Bute Council Area Committee on 6/2/02. The application had been recommended for approval by the Planning Department.

Finally, Constable Raymond Law announced that he was moving to a new post shortly, and would no longer be our 'local bobby'. A vote of thanks for his work over the years was offered.

The next meeting of the Community Council, including the Annual General Meeting will be held in May 2002 at Kilmelford Village Hall (exact date to be announced).

CONGRATULATIONS TO TONY DALTON ON THE PUBLICATION OF HIS BOOK "BRITISH ROYAL YACHTS"

After many years of painstaking research, Tony's long awaited book "British Royal Yachts" has finally been published. The term "yacht" is the recognised description of those ships (83 in all) used by successive monarchs from the restoration of Charles II in 1660 until the decommissioning of Her Majesty's Yacht Britannia, after her last official function at the handing over of Hong Kong to the Chinese in 1997. Sadly Britannia was the end of the line, but she is still maintained in immaculate condition at the Port of Leith in Edinburgh, where she is one of Scotland's most popular tourist attractions.

Tony served as a Lieutenant, Royal Navy, in H.M.Y. Britannia in 1969 – 70 during the Queen's tour of Australia, New Zealand and the South Pacific, and so he had an intimate knowledge of all aspects of life on board this magnificent ship.

The book also contains details of Kings' ships prior to 1660 back to Anglo-Saxon times, in addition to those used by the Scottish kings.

With the many beautifully coloured illustrations and photographs together with anecdotes and the personal stories of some of the "yachtsmen" who served in these ships, this is indeed a fascinating book.

SPRING GARDENS

Spring and early summer is a wonderful time in my garden. There are signs of life everywhere and changes seem to happen daily. Bulbs, herbaceous plants, shrubs and annuals vie with each other in the freshness of new leaves and in the range and shape and colour of their flowers.

One of my favourite evergreen shrubs is Pieris "Forest Flame". In early spring its leaves are green and the flower buds dark red which open to give great clusters of white flowers which cover the bush so that it looks as though there had just been a fall of snow. But that is only the beginning of its display: the new leaves are scarlet and stay scarlet for a couple of months before fading to rose and finally to yellow. In late summer the yellow leaves turn green and by autumn the dark red flower buds have formed and give colour throughout the winter until the cycle restarts in spring.

Do you know the woodland bulb Erythronium Dens-Canis, the dog's tooth violet or trout lily? Dog's tooth as the bulb is the same shape as a dog's canine tooth, and trout lily for its foliage which is green splashed with dark chocolate or maroon streaks. Some forms are native plants, others come from other lands, particularly California. All forms that I have tried grow very well in Kilmelford. Leaves and flowers grow very quickly, the flowers can be violet, pink, yellow or white and the petals are "revolutum" and bend back (rather like a cyclamen) showing an attractive contrast colour near the centre of the flower. The flowers last a month or so, the leaves a little longer and then suddenly they disappear after being above ground for a couple of months. But they are alive and growing underground and the clumps get bigger every year. They grow happily at the foot of trees or shrubs, but can be less successful in an open unshaded border.

And what about rhododendrons. What a huge range there is to choose from. The size varies from carpeter to forest trees, the leaves vary in size,

colour and shape and many have attractive "fur" on their underside. And the choice of colour and shape of the flowers is unbeatable. Rhodies love the acid soil that most of our gardens have and some of the finest rhododendron gardens in the UK are in Argyll.

So spring and summer are great times for visiting other folks' gardens just for pleasure and to get ideas for our own gardens. I will just suggest two that you might like to visit which are open every day. They are Arduaine with its amazing display of rhododendrons and Cnoc-na-Garrie, 2 miles south of Kilmartin where Dorothy and Tom Thomson are turning a 7 acre rough hillside into an exciting and colourful beauty spot. Dorothy grows many of her plants from seed and always has home-raised plants for sale. Both gardens charge an entrance fee, Arduaine £3 which benefits the National Trust for Scotland and Cnoc-na-Garrie £1.50 which supports the British Red Cross Society, the Cancer Relief Macmillan Fund and Scotland's Gardens Scheme charities.

Finally, I know only too well that weeds love spring time too, but they can be kept under control if you can find the time to pull them out or kill them by regular hoeing before they have set see. Better still suffocate them with a mulch such as bark (for a big border) or stones (for a scree). A 2" thick mulch is a help, but a 4" thick mulch almost eliminates the problem.

Enjoy this glorious season and forget the dreary wet, wet winter that we have had to put up with.

THE REEL OF THE 51st

In June of 1940 Lt. J E M Jim Atkinson of the 7th Battalion Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders was captured by the Germans. When he arrived at the P O W internment camp near Salzburg, he found that Lt. A P J "Peter" Oliver of the 4th Seaforths had started Highland Dancing classes. Lt. Atkinson was more of a country than a highland dancer and soon after his arrival a reel club was formed. The P O W's had a few problems. They had no musicians, no instruction books and no women as partners. They had to make do with whistling the tunes, assigning the women's parts to men, and making up steps as they went along. On his way to the camp, Lt. Atkinson had developed an idea for a new dance, based on the cross of St Andrew, which was the badge of the 51st Division. He and Lt. Oliver began to work it out on paper. When they hit a snag, the problem was resolved by Lt. Col. Tom Harris Hunter, former C.O. of the Royal Army Service Corp, 51st Division, and a past chairman of the Perth branch of the Scottish Country Dance Society.

Once they had the dance composed, Lt. Atkinson and Col. Hunter tried to send copies home. Written in the specialised shorthand used by dancers to communicate dance moves to one another, Lt. Atkinson's copy was apparently intercepted by the German security, who spent the rest of the war trying to figure out what the cryptic, coded instructions really meant. Col. Hunter's copy made it back home to Scotland and the local dance group began dancing it at about the same time the soldiers were dancing it on the roof of the prison hospital block in the camp.

The Reel of the 51st Division is a general favourite everywhere. It is sometimes danced in an all male set as a memorial to the P O W's, but it was written for both men and women and it is not incorrect to dance with both sexes in the set.

As we all know the variation commonly known as "Aberdonian" has crept in and vastly altered the original. This practise is perfectly understandable and acceptable if only the practitioners would dance it in a manner that USES all the music; unfortunately this frequently isn't the case. The whole essence of scottish country dancing is the flow and phrasing of a dance where one eight bar phrase flows seamlessly into the next. Atkinson, Hunter and Oliver would be appalled if they saw their beautifully crafted dance adulterated by the incorrect dancing of the Aberdonian version.
