SIGNS FOR EVENTS IN THE VILLAGE HALL

There are signs available for all functions, free of charge. They are stored in the main store room inside the hall. Keys for this room are only held by Deirdre Campbell-Gibson and Dorothy Bark at present, but the signs required can be put out in the hall passageway, given prior warning.

- 1. 2 large, one sided "SUMMER FESTIVAL".
- 2. 1 sandwich board i.e. 2 sided "CHARITY EVENT NOW". There are 2 blue plastic sand bags behind the hall, just beyond the bins for glass.
- 2 medium one sided "COFFEE MORNING 10.30 12" on short poles.

- 4. 1 x 2 sided large CHEF board, painted "VILLAGE HALL ¹/₄ MILE". Paper notices wrapped in clear polythene can be pinned to this. 20" x 20" is a good size. Minimum 3" high writing in black on white is the most suitable and visible by drivers rushing past at 50 mph!! This sign can be tied with its wire to the stobs at the road end.
- 5. Small signs with short posts (PLEASE only hammer the post, not the sign) include:-
 - 2 x " → " 2 x "TODAY" 2 x "TOMORROW"
 - 2 x "FOOD NOW"

Please take signs down immediately after the event and either put them back in the hall or outside the main door if you have no key.

KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A meeting of the above Council was held on Tuesday 11th June 2002 at Kilmelford Village Hall.

The main items on the agenda were:

The application for permission for five houses in Scammadale glen had been withdrawn.

The proposed wind farm at Loch Avich was discussed, but no further action was taken. It was agreed that this would be reviewed when the application was submitted. The issue of roadside brushcutting was discussed, and the secretary reported that it was on the council task list, but was subject to budgetary restrictions.

Concern was raised over dog fouling in public areas, and the chairman agreed to take this up with the local dog warden.

It was expected that the completion of the Scammadale timber extraction was imminent and that the extraction contractors would repair any damage to the road.

There were two planning applications discussed: Kenmore Croft - extension to existing dwelling house, and Melfort Pier - erection of laundry and storage shed - Cllr Macaskill advised that this application had already been approved.

The secretary reported that some £450 had been raised from the Loch Melfort beach clean, which would be going to Kilninver Primary School Board Funds.

It was agreed that in future, community council meetings would be held on the second Tuesday of every other month. Notice of forthcoming meetings will be advertised ten days in advance as usual. It was reported that Alastair Oatts had very kindly agreed to site a community council notice board on the fence at Cuilfail Lodge. A suitable notice board was currently being sought, as this would allow posting of community council meeting minutes.

Note from the editor: according to the Planning Department, the information that the Melfort Pier and Harbour application for the erection of a laundry and storage shed had already been approved was incorrect. The application was withdrawn and replaced by another application which was discussed at the following Community Council meeting, as noted below.

The Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council held an Annual General Meeting on Tuesday 11th June 2002 in Kilmelford Village Hall.

The chairman thanked Councillors Macaskill and MacIntyre for their efforts over the previous year. The chairman then highlighted some of the activities that the community council has been involved with over the previous year, and looked forward to dealing with issues in the forthcoming year, such as strategic and local plans, wind farms and various community projects. The chairman then thanked all the community councillors, and also the Kilninford News team for producing a very informative newsletter.

The treasurer's report indicated that the community council funds currently stand at £815.52, representing an increase over the previous year of £130.63.

It was unanimously agreed that the council officers would be re-elected as per the previous year.

The community council held an ordinary general meeting on 13th August 2002 at Kilmelford Village Hall.

The main issues discussed were:

PC Moffat was introduced to the meeting, as replacement community police officer for Raymond Law. Inspector Shearer of Oban Police then discussed the role of community policing. PC Moffat stated that he was looking forward to meeting members of the community.

Dog fouling is increasingly identified as a problem in public areas, and the chairman agreed to discuss this at the next meeting.

It was reported that there was just a small amount of timber still to be extracted from Scammadale Glen, and that the road had been maintained in good order, with further road repairs to take place shortly.

The main item on the agenda was the proposed wind farm at Loch Avich, and to facilitate discussion and community decision making, the secretary had invited speakers for and against the proposal. Firstly, Steve Macken (Project Manager) and Neil Reid (Environmental Planning Manager) of Scottish Power presented the arguments in support of wind farming, and the Loch Avich proposal in particular. Secondly, Marilyn Henderson (secretary, Dalavich Community Council) countered the argument by highlighting the disadvantages associated with wind farms. Questions were invited from the floor, and a long discussion ensued. The chairman thanked all speakers, and advised that further meetings would be held once a formal planning application was lodged.

Three planning applications were discussed. Firstly, outline consent for the erection of a dwelling house west of the boatyard shed. No objections were raised. Secondly, Melfort Pier had applied for a new laundry and store. It was agreed that since this involved the removal of trees, and represented further creeping development, an objection should be lodged. Finally, retrospective planning permission by Mr and Mrs Jackson-Stark for a septic tank on land west of Ardowan. It was explained that because the original planning permission placed the septic tank in an impossible location, it had been relocated on installation.

Georgina Dalton advised everyone present that the Summer Festival would be held on 25th August, and that the organiser, Steve Ewing, would be grateful for any assistance.

Peter Menzies advised that the road at Blaran had recently been tarred, which raised the road level by some 4 inches thus exacerbating the problem of access from the glen. It was further noted that the removal of the telegraph poles on that section of the road had been held up by a dispute over liability.

Various other roads issues were discussed, which would be pursued prior to the next meeting.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be held at 8.00pm on Tuesday 8th October 2002 at Kilmelford Village Hall

STRATHCLYDE FIRE BRIGADE F71 – KILMELFORD FIRE STATION

On Sunday 2nd June the crew of Kilmelford Fire Station welcomed locals and visitors alike to what, hopefully, was the first of our annual open days.

The weather was not as kind as it could have been but the day was well attended by people keen to get an insight into some of the things we do. The other piece of bad news, apart from the weather, was that the display unit from the Community Safety Department had broken down at Loch Awe. This was unfortunate as it was a live demonstration of a chip pan fire and what not to do with it. This vehicle also carried a smoke generator for our search and rescue exercise to add a touch of realism and freebies for handing out. Oh well, we'll save that for another day.

The first event was the first heat of the Great Golden Jubilee Duck Race. The sight of all those yellow ducks floating down the burn was quite a spectacle, much better than anything they could arrange in London for the Jubilee! Our two "duck shepherds" did a great job keeping all of those thoroughbred racing ducks under control as they did throughout the day for subsequent heats and the final. Thanks Findlay and Hamish. Demonstrations followed illustrating our firefighting capabilities past and present, "guided tours" in and around the fire appliance and search and rescue exercise when our demo dummy and a wayward duck were rescued from an incident in the station.

Firefighter's cream teas (same as ordinary cream teas but served at a fire station) were administered to the needy, for a small fee, and an extension of the village shop was set up in the hall adding to the day and, incidentally, a good place to shelter from the showers.

THANK YOU Tony (Dalton) for sending us the following fascinating account from the "Statistical Account of Scotland, Parish of Kilninver and Kilmelfort 1793" by the Reverend Mr Patrick Campbell. The second instalment will be included in the April issue of the Kilninford News.

"Name and Extent

The strictest research into the etymology and meaning of ancient names must often terminate in probable conjecture; and the following account of the names of whole parishes lays claim to no higher authority. Kil-an-inver signifies the chapel or burying ground at the foot of the water, it being situated where the Water of Euchar discharges itself into the sea.

Kil-na-maol-phort, contracted Kilmelfort, signifies the round bays or harbours, viz. Lochmelfort, which runs three miles into the middle of this parish, ending in two round bays with good anchoring ground, where ships of any burden may ride in safety.

Taken together, the united parishes are nearly of a square form, extending from east to west and from north to south about 12 measured miles. Kilmelfort lies south of Kilninver; but in populousness, valuation, and extent, does not exceed one half of the other. The minister preaches in both alternately; the distance betwixt the two places of worship is six miles.

Soil and Surface

The lower parts of these parishes on the west are generally smooth sloping declivities towards the sea, and consist of light loam upon gravel or rock, yielding when properly cultivated, and in favourable seasons, good crops of corn, bere and potatoes. The upper parts, towards the east and south are mountainous, environed with a ridge of hills, which separate them from the parishes of Kilmore, Dallavich, and Craignish.

The soil in Gleneuchar and the Braes of Lorn and in the higher parts of Kilmelfort is poor and gravelish, yielding little crop, fit only as pasturage and occupied mostly with sheep. A few farms are however stocked almost wholly with black cattle.

There is a good deal of natural wood such as oak, ash, birch, hazel, alder etc. Some parts are also planted with firs, which thrive very well. The tops of the hills are covered with heath interspersed with stripes of coarse pasture well adapted to sheep.

Sea Coast

These united parishes have six miles of a sea coast towards the north and west from the middle of Lochfeachin to the west end of the sound of Clachansoail. This sound is about two miles long, is narrow, being no more than 80 feet over, and admits vessels of only between 10 and 20 tons burden, as it is dry and passable at low water, in some parts, both for men and horses. Formerly there was a ferry boat here, but lately there has been a bridge built over it, consisting of a single arch, 72 feet wide and 27 feet above the highest water mark.

Lochmelfort gives a sea coast of six miles, and makes a beautiful and safe roadstead. Herrings frequent this loch, and a good haddock bank has lately been discovered; and the coast upon the sound of Mull abounds plentifully with sea fish in great variety. These shores furnish also most kinds of shellfish, lobsters, crabs, oysters, spout-fish, hole-fish, cockles and mussels.

Rivers and Lakes

These are the river Euchar, running through the middle of the parish of Kilninver, and having its source in a lake of a mile and a half long and near a mile broad, called Lochseammadale. Into this lake or loch the waters of Braegleon, and a number of rivulets descending from the neighbouring hills, discharge themselves where the river Euchar empties itself into Lochfeachin there is a good salmon fishing, besides many another upon that loch.

The river Oude, which takes its rise also from a lake in the braes of Lorn, called Lochtralig, of a mile long and about half a mile broad, runs through a part of the parish of Kilninver towards the east, and thence taking its course southwards for 4 miles, falls into the head of Lochmelfort. These rivers are stored with salmon, white and muir trout, and eels. And upon Lochmelfort itself, where the Oude forms its junction with the sea, there is a salmon fishing.

<u>Climate</u>

The climate here, as indeed on all the west coast, is excessively rainy and moist. Hence our rainy summers and harvests, though commonly favourable to pasturage, are very unfriendly to agriculture.

From our vicinity to the Atlantic, the winters are open and temperate; snow seldom lies deep, or above two days together, on the low ground of the west coast.

Notwithstanding the moisture of the climate, the people of those parishes are healthy, and live to a good old age; many till 90, a few to 100 years. The most common diseases are rheumatic complaints, colds, and cholics, the constant attendants upon moist and rainy climates. Formerly the small pox made great ravages among the children, especially upon the sea coast, where the inhabitants fed much upon fish. But inoculation is now practised with much success, and the lower class of people have quite got the better of the prejudices which they once entertained against it.

Population

These parishes have, within these few years, greatly increased in population, owing to the young men's continuing at home, and settling in the parish in time of peace, for war always drains off the youth.

No family has emigrated to America during the present ministers incumbrance, being a space of 35 years. No person has been banished nor suffered capitally; nor has any incidence of suicide nor child murder occurred within that period.

Cattle and Sheep

The breed of horses, black cattle, and sheep have been much improved of late years. Plough horses, according to size and kind sell at from 81 to 121, aged stots from 5 to 61, cows from 3 to 61, black faced sheep, all of the south country kind 12 to 14s, slack ewes from 4s 6d to 6s 6d, lambs at 4 to 5s.

The old, small, highland white-faced sheep are still retained by the small tenants; though less in size, they are finer in wool, and reckoned more delicate eating than the blackface.

Six of the farms in the higher parts are stocked entirely with sheep; all the other farms partly with sheep and partly with cows and horses and may be computed safely as follows:

Horses250Black cattle1500Sheep7000

There is a great variety of game. Of quadrupeds there are roes, hares, pine martins, polecats, weasels and otters. Of the feathered kinds there are black-cock, snipes, grey and green plovers, and some partridges; wild duck and water-fowl of all kinds

<u>Rental</u>

It is not easy to ascertain the real rents and still more difficult to estimate the casualties they pay in kain, fowls etc and the personal services they are obliged to perform. It may however be computed at about 16001 Sterling of real rent yearly, and valued rent of 2471 7s 8d sterling. The wages of servants have advanced to nearly double what they were 20 years ago. The usual day wages to a man servant is 1s sometimes 1s 2d without victuals. Women are seldom hired at day wages or by the day.

Carpenters and masons, according to their skills get from 1s 6d to 2s per day without maintenance, taylors and shoemakers 8d besides their victuals, household men servants from 51 to 61 per year, maid servants from 11 15s to 21 10s and shoes."
