KILNINVER CHURCH AND PARISH NEWS

The work at Kilninver Church is almost finished - or, at least, the work paid for by the generous response to our Appeal.

When the figures were computed, we discovered that the work to be done exceeded the amount of money we had, by a small margin, and we trimmed the schedule of work accordingly. What is important is that the necessary repairs to the roof have been completed to a high professional standard and the works trimmed off the schedule are being carried out by local and voluntary labour. Some things remain to be done. It would have been good to tackle the electrical installation, particularly the lighting, to bring it up to the standards required by the Disability Discrimination Act, and some interior work like replacing the carpeting. All in all, thanks to the generous response of those who heeded our Appeal, we now have a strong, secure and watertight roof, with a separate place for the bats in the roof space.

We will be celebrating the completion of the works enabled by the Appeal by a special service to be arranged in the near future.

Over the Easter period there will be services in Craignish on Good Friday at 6.30 p.m., an early morning Communion in Kilmelford at 8.30 a.m. and the service at the usual time also at Kilmelford. There will also be a Communion Service in Kilbrandon Church at 7.45 p.m. on Maundy Thursday, so a full range of services are available in the neighbouring parishes.

As I write this, no date has yet been set for the Introduction Service marking the formal linking of Kilbrandon and Kilchattan parish with the parishes of Craignish and Kilninver and Kilmelford, but that should be happening soon. As I have been reappointed Interim Moderator of Kilbrandon and Kilchattan, I am already fully involved in all three parishes. This means that I will be spread more thinly over the three areas, but with the support of preachers on Sundays and the congregations in the various villages, the work of the Church in this part of Argyll should go on.

As spring establishes itself all around, the area is already noticeably busier. I hope you have a Happy Easter leading to a good summer as it comes.

BOILED FRUIT CAKE

6 oz. margarine	4 oz. dates
8 fl. oz. water	2 oz. glace cherries
8 oz. soft brown sugar	3 eggs
¹ / ₂ tsp. cinnamon	12 oz. plain flour
¹ / ₄ tsp. ginger	¹ / ₂ tsp. bicarbonate of soda
¹ / ₄ tsp. nutmeg	-
1 lb. mixed dried fruit	

Put margarine in a pan with water, sugar, spices, dried fruit and dates. Bring to the boil stirring occasionally, then simmer for 3 minutes. Put aside until cold. Beat eggs and stir into the cold mixture. Put chopped cherries into a bowl with fruit and bicarbonate of soda sifted together, add fruit mixture and mix thoroughly. Put into a greased and lined 8" tin. Bake at 150 degrees C (Gas 3) for $1\frac{1}{2} - 1\frac{3}{4}$ hours. Turn out of tin and cool on a wire rack.

Committee meetings of the above association were held on 10th January and 28th March and the AGM was held on 28th March 2006.

The committee are pleased to welcome Chris Johnson as the new Hall caretaker. Chris is responsible for the maintenance, repairs, security and cleaning of the Hall. The bookings are still to be taken at Kilmelford Village Store.

The wooden floor in the main hall needs sanding and treatment as the surface is wearing thin in places. An estimate is to be obtained for the work. The washbasins in the cloakrooms have insufficient support, and an estimate is being sought to replace them with pedestal basins.

The Treasurer's report indicated that donations to the Village Hall fund were down last year, as were the proceeds from fund raising events. The overheads will be greater this year as the Caretaker's salary has to be found and the ongoing maintenance work has to be paid for. Lettings have been fewer since the new Craignish Hall opened. The Treasurer emphasised the necessity for some rigorous fund raising in the coming year to avoid running at a loss.

It is hoped that the Annual Beach Clean will raise some funds, also the comedy being staged at the Hall by a professional travelling theatre company on 13th June.

OBITUARY

ROBERT CARMICHAEL, former minister of Craignish and Kilninver and Kilmelford Parish Churches retired to the village of Kilmelford in June 1991. Brought up in Glasgow, where his father was a Post Office engineer, Robert was often reminded as a young boy that his great grandfather had been a Sea Captain, and his grandfather on the other side of the family had been a slate quarrier at Easdale. His earliest desire was to go to sea, but he contracted polio and was left with weak legs. The church was calling him to her service - he told me once that if he had not been able to enter the ministry he would have become a teacher - and he succeeded after his M.A., Glasgow in going to Trinity College, Glasgow and was ordained and inducted to Lochranza and Pirnmill on the Island of Arran in 1948. There are memories of him on the island, getting around his scattered parish on a bicycle - he was always determined not to be kept back by his infirmities. After ministries in Brodick and Corrie, and Eassie and Nevay with Newtyle, he came to Argyll in 1975. Throughout his service in the church he was known as an interesting preacher and a good pastor.

The sea was always in his blood, and he had a small sailing boat while on Arran, and later a larger yacht based at Craignish. He is remembered as a good and tidy sailor who did many things to help youngsters take an interest and learn. Navigation was his particular love and he gained his Yachtmasters

qualification. Robert was an enthusiastic and respected member of the Royal Highland Yacht Club, taking part in many of its activities afloat and ashore.

His funeral was held in Craignish Parish Church on 18th January, after which he was buried in Kilmaree Cemetery, in pouring rain (a sort of minister's revenge for inclement funerals endured in the past!) We extend our condolences to his family in the community and beyond.

KILNINVER AND KILMELFORD COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A meeting of the above Council was held on Tuesday the 14th of February at Kilmelford Village Hall.

DRAFT MINUTES

Present: Community Councillors; Neil Manchester (Chairman), Robin Asbury, Robin Grey, Diarmid Campbell (Secretary.). Argyll & Bute Councillor Duncan McIntyre. Also in attendance were 20 members of the public.

Apologies: A & B Councillor Macaskill, Community Councillors Alasdair Oatts and Jane Brown, Kevin Moffat, Deirdre Campbell-Gibson, David Wilkie, Georgina Dalton and Christine McLachlan.

1. Minutes:

The Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday the 14th of December were approved and signed.

2. Matters Arising:

<u>Glebe Completion Issues</u>: The Chairman reported a letter copied by Cllr Allan Macaskill from David Baldwin, Planning Officer, Argyll and Bute Council, which stated that the children's play area had been turfed and fenced as required. The Chairman noted that no equipment was allowed for in the agreement with the developer. There was a statement from the floor that the fence was not high enough.

<u>Kilmelford Car Park</u>: D. Campbell reported that he had discussed the cables under the parking area with the Hydro office and showed the plan they provided. He agreed to provide a new drawing, showing the cables in relation to the grading, at the next meeting.

<u>Bus Shelters:</u> The Chairman noted that the newly installed bus shelter did not match the existing one on the opposite side of the road. Cllr. McIntyre agreed that they should match and took note. He stated that the new shelter for Kilninver was now ready to be installed, but there was a delay waiting for a response from Mr Curry, the landowner.

Land at Kilmelford Village Hall: Robin Asbury advised that he had written to John Tilley about the Community Council wishing to tidy up the area opposite the village hall, and make available for overspill car parking and recycling bins. No response had been received as yet.

Kilninver Speed Limit Signs: It was noted that the flashing 20mph signs had not been fully installed as yet.

<u>Fencing at Kilmelford</u>: The Chairman was asked whether A&BC could stipulate standardised fencing along the main road at The Glebe. The Chairman agreed to discuss this with Cllr Macaskill and report back.

<u>Marine Park Issue:</u> The Chairman advised that David Wilkie was involved in this process, and had agreed to discuss the matter at the next meeting.

Dial a Bus Scheme:

Robin Asbury has the questionnaire and will put that in the April Newsletter.

Transportation Strategy Questionnaire: Secretary to obtain a new copy from Kilmory.

Cllr. McIntyre mentioned that the strategy for the Rural Committee has to be in by the end of April.

3. Outcome of the Community Council Complaint regarding the Oban, Lorne and Isles Area Committee Hearing 7th December 2005: The chairman advised that he had written to Argyll and Bute Council on the 15th of December highlighting concerns that the views of the Community Council had been ignored, and that the conduct of the meeting, and in particular the Planning Officer was unacceptable. The Chairman noted that due process had not been followed at the end of the meeting when the final decision had been taken. The Chairman also noted that the Roads Dept had not been consulted on the access issues raised in the Community Council objection. The Chairman advised that subsequently trees were being felled despite being subject to a Tree Preservation Order.

The Chairman advised that a letter had been received from Charles Reppke (Corporate Services) and Cllr Macaskill, refuting all the complaints but offering a letter of apology from the Planning Officer for his behaviour towards a member of the community. The letter advised that the Community Council should have contacted all Council departments, such as Roads, to highlight objections to any application.

The Chairman asked if Cllr MacIntyre was able to comment on this matter. Cllr. McIntyre stated that he was not present at the meeting in question, but felt that generally due process had been followed. However, Cllr MacIntyre felt that under the circumstances, a motion should have been proposed and a vote taken at the end of the meeting, especially on such a sensitive issue. Cllr MacIntyre also advised that the Roads Department had not been consulted on this application, but it was not the Community Council's responsibility to notify Council departments directly. Cllr MacIntyre advised that if the Community Council were still dissatisfied with the matter, they should write to the Chief Executive of the Council and copy the letter to George Lyon MSP, and to the Roads, Water and Planning departments.

4. Planning Applications:

House at Cuildarrach Kilninver (Near Scammadale road end)

The Chairman noted that it was in close proximity to both the road and the river and was not in an area assigned for development, but that if the application was in contravention of planning regulations it would not get passed anyway. It was agreed that the Community Council had no valid objection to the application.

This raised the issue of the repeatedly delayed 'Local Plan' and any likely completion date. Cllr. McIntyre was asked when the finalised Local Plan would be issued, and he stated delays were in part due to the Helensburgh area plan probably going to a Public Hearing. The other parts of the plan will go forward in the autumn. Any areas still not resolved will be worked in the interim by those parts of them that can be approved. The long delay was due to the number of comments received.

Conservatory to existing house at Lagganmore in Scammadale Glen The Community Council had no objections.

Extension to Mussel Farm Storage Shed at Arduaine (Celtic Seafoods Ltd)

Alastair Oatts had advised that the proposal would double the size of the existing shed to 430 m^2 of storage area in a business expansion expected to add 5 jobs with the company. The Chairman advised that since the current development was reasonably unobtrusive, and that there was evidence of local employment, there was no valid grounds for objection. Ken McColl commented that industrial type developments on the loch shore, which were highly visible from the sea, should be screened by tree planting at the expense of the owners.

It was agreed that the Secretary would write to the planners asking for adequate screening by planting saplings of a native species.

5. Correspondence:

Police Safety Questionnaire; no comment GRAB Trust; no comment Canine Cards; no comment Assoc. of A&B Community Councils; no comment MacDougall Collection Museum; Secretary to send letter of potential visitor support.

6. Other Business:

Isabel Smith had noted that A&B Council has threatened to withdraw the Library Van service. It was agreed that the Secretary would write letter to complain about this proposal.

Alex Tweedly raised the issue that there was a given period in which the community could register an interest in the right to buy land if it were put up for sale. Of suggested interest were the Kilmelford Village Hall area and Playing Field area. The Chairman noted that he had been in correspondence with an organisation that provides support and advice for this type of project, and would seek further details.

Robin Grey advised that he had met with Scottish Water to discuss the new Kilmelford Sewage Treatment Plant, who are awaiting SEPA approval before commissioning. Scottish Water has agreed to clear the working area and restore the car park and verges.

Peter Menzies noted dissatisfaction that there had been no improvements to Blaran Road End for many years. Cllr. McIntyre agreed that it was a very dangerous area and stated that it was first a Police issue, although the Council and BT are still in dispute over who is responsible for the poles. The Chairman suggested that Peter Menzies write to Neil Brown at the A&B Council, but would also follow this up with the Councillors. Robin Grey agreed to talk to the MacDonalds about overhanging trees at the roadside. It was also noted that Raera Forest owners should clear storm-felled trees from the road side.

Mr. Vennell brought up the need for volunteer drivers to help elderly people and mentioned how on Seil 20 people had signed up for that task. The Chairman advised that the issue would be on the agenda for the next meeting, where Margaret Anfield will give a brief presentation on how this system works in practice.

A suggestion was made regarding the flower tubs in Kilninver, that since they are safely in the parking area and not on the roadside, the school children could be asked maintain them. Cllr. McIntyre mentioned that surplus plants could be obtained from the A&B Council.

Cllr. McIntyre stated that the Scottish Executive have a discussion paper on the future of Community Councils. He added that in the next A&B Council election the area will be split into two Wards, with Seil and Kilmore as a separate Ward. The Chairman noted that no correspondence on this proposal had been received by the Community Council, and asked that this be put in the agenda for the next meeting.

7. Date of Next Meeting

The next meeting of the Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council in 2006 would take place on the 11th of April at the Kilmelford Village Hall at 8 pm.

There being no other business, the chairman closed the meeting at 9.25 pm.

A LETTER FROM THE WILD GARDEN

The first tree that we planted, outside the deer fence which enclosed the vegetable plot and herbaceous part of the garden, was a slender copper beech, about eight foot in height. This, in 1975, began the wild garden on the slopes of the hillsides narrowing down to the burn. The only other trees there were some ashes lining the water's edge where the burn ran out into the fields below the house; and a group of tough hazels on the side of the bank, hanging on around some rock outcrops. Bracken up to seven feet tall gave it a jungle-like quality in the summer, thriving in the deep loamy soil.

The copper beech now has a tall fan shape, making an eye-catching contrast with its surroundings; deep reds in the full leaf season or bare-branched against the greens of the background hills. We planted two rowans on each side of the gateway, with no actual gate, to make an entrance to the wild garden.. These have now grown enough to be woven into an arch that at first I thought would look 'twee' in its surrounds. But in fact they make the 'gate' that was never there. Here began the path that leads around the side of the hill to where the burn tumbles over rocks, forming a pool that became the destination for manay picnic and paddling 'xpotition' when the children were small.

The original shelter belt of larches, planted shortly after the copper beech, have been thinned as they were shading the shrubs on the twentyfive steps. The steps were made at my request by a team of friends who

stayed for a weekend to celebrate twenty-five years at Maolachy. This flight takes one up from the beginning of the middle path to meet the end of the top one. The friends asked what they could bring as a contribution to the weekend and my answer was "plants". They came armed with shrubs, mostly without labels – a white *Rhododendron*, one with soft peach colours and darker flecks, a *Pieris*, a pink *escalonia*, a variegated *Elaeagnus*. These have happily grown with each other creating a bank of welcoming spring colours and later autumn tints.

Tony gave me two *Moysii* geranium roses for Christmas some years ago and they arch their spray of bright reds into the canopy of laburnums above. There are two laburnums that we had grown from seed, and a double pink May tree, planted for Auntie Joyce. *Rhododendron luteum, Kerria japonica, Daphne* and a deep pink *Escalonia* have also taken well and now need their light and space. Below, double snowdrops and Lent lilies are a joy to find spreading and seeding themselves. I invested in an electric shredder and now that the needles of the felled larches are falling off I must clear the heaps before the bulbs appear. Tête å têtes shine under the May tree and a taller mixture of daffodils have begun to line the edge of the middle path. I was hoping to establish Lily of the Valley but it has been slow to get going – maybe it is too shaded or the soil too rich.

After the felling of the larches, the light and space released is giving me an excuse – and a treat – to find different shrubs to fill the gaps. *Diervilla lonicera*. *Potentilla* and perhaps a *Photinia* for its contrasting red leaf colours. This corner could be the place for my rescued *Eucryphia*. I found it strimmed to a stick in a garden that I was looking after for one summer, took it home and potted it up. It happily flowered this year and emerged as one of my favourites and well worth the wait to see its delicate blooms.

The centre piece must be my first own-grown cutting of an azalea which has beautiful soft apricotcoloured flowers. The leaves are just turning a deep crimson and it has three strong stems and healthy roots. I felt an inner warmth and satisfaction transferring it from the pot to its new home.

This area of twenty-five years growth and tending has taken on its own shape and seems happy as it settles into its next quarter of a century. I feel content to watch it grow.

TULLICH FARM

Here at Tullich an exciting new thing is happening – children with special needs are coming on a regular basis, not to do RDA, but to 'play' with ponies – making friends, building relationships, learning non verbal communication skills and friendly ways of using ropes and sticks and halters and even a big football.

It's likely with the growth of the village that there are many people who are not familiar with farming and are unaware of what is going on in the fields and hills around us.

First I would like to say a big and public 'thank you' to all the kind observant people who notice animals stuck in brambles or straying on the road or ill and maybe dying and come or phone and tell me. I cannot be everywhere at once and I am most grateful to these people – often their timely warning has saved a life. Thank you very much all of you.

This is a sheep farm and our year begins in October when the oldest ewes are drawn off the hill to conceive and rear one more crop of lambs on the lusher in-bye pastures. They are nervous at first having been on the hard hill all their lives and never seen traffic so they panic away from the road when lorries go by. The only time they will have seen people with dogs will have been when they got gathered in to be dosed or dipped or clipped or injected vaccines. So of course they panic whenever someone with a dog does by. It takes a while for them to calm down. The tups go with them in November/December and we hope they are all pregnant by the end of the year and tamer and more settled.

In January they all have to be dosed again for liver fluke and we gather them off the hill in batches of 200 or 200. We work as a team walking in a big circle using the dogs to guide the sheep till they run together in a big flock that we can travel home to the fank where we can pen them and dose them.

We are only able to do this because of their wild instinct to run together into a 'flock' from what they see as the 'danger' of people with dogs. We walk in ways that influence them to run the way we want them to go. Imagine then our dismay when we find someone out for a walk with their pet all unwittingly panicking them in wrong directions. Once they are off their 'tram lines' they can be very difficult to bring back again. Or again imagine we have gathered together a big flock and are travelling homeward along a loch shore or through a steep ravine and right in the way we are driving them there are people and dogs innocently picnicking, fishing or just walking. The sheep in front stop in confusion and are pushed from behind because we and the dogs cannot see yet that there is a 'road block' ahead. This can result in sheep panicking and bolting in any direction even into the loch where their heavy fleeces quickly waterlog and drown them. These things have happened especially at the pre-lambing gather in March when they are heavily pregnant and at their weakest after the winter months of severe weather and scarce grass and the spring growth not really plentiful yet. Then comes April and lambing time and don't we all love to see them frolicking amongst the daffodils. Danger is here too though - Hoodie crows and Black backed gulls and foxes are all hungrily awaiting the opportunity to grab a new born delicacy so it is essential not to disturb a ewe while she giving birth. If startle or frightened in the first moments before she has had time to bond with her baby by licking it and suckling it the predators may get their chance. If you see a sheep lying down and getting up again and turning round and lying down again and pointing her nose to the sky and heaving, she is in labour. Make a wide detour and not disturb her. Tomorrow you will be rewarded with the sight of skipping lambs and waggling tails.
