Committee meetings of the association were held on 8th January and 11th March 2008. The main topics under discussion were as follows:

Maintenance

- 1) An electrician will soon be fitting a new hand-dryer and electrical unit for the shower in the Ladies' cloakroom; also the replacement token meter for the main hall heaters.
- 2) Rain water has been coming in under the back fire door and the lack of damp course here has allowed seepage under the floor. An estimate for the work is forthcoming.
- 3) The routine electrical inspection of the Hall wiring has been carried out by a qualified electrician.
- 4) The old oil drums and other discarded items have been removed by the Council from the back of the building.
- 5) Volunteers for a rota of grass cutting around the Hall are being sought. Please contact any of the committee if you are willing to do a week.

Fund Raising

- 1) The Race Night in February was so successful and well attended it is to become an annual event. £517.00 was raised. Thanks to Toni Mitchell and the others who helped on the night.
- 2) A Curry Night with Quiz is planned for May 2nd. This is expected to be popular with all ages.
- 3) The 100 Club has 73 members and would like more!
- 4) The Beach Clean will be carried out during April and early May. It is hoped that local business will offer sponsorship to support local causes.

The Race Night, February 22nd 2008

To the thunder of hooves and cheers from the crowd, the 2nd Race Night got under way. It was a very happy and well-organised event with excellent commentary from the M.C. backed up by two able bookies who kept the punters in control and gave out the appropriate winnings.

VILLAGE HALLS' SUMMIT, 2008

The Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations organised the FIRST EVER Village Halls' Summit at The Aviemore Highland Resort on Saturday 23rd February 2008. Fergus Gillanders and I were two of the 250 delegates who attended on behalf of their village halls. There were representatives literally from the length and breadth of Scotland. We met people from the Shetlands and Orkneys, the Western Isles and from John O'Groats to the Haugh of Urr in Dumfries and Galloway. It was heart-warming to see how well attended the summit was, in fact it was oversubscribed, so Fergus and I were lucky to be allocated places.

The day began at 10am and closed at 3.30pm and followed a typical conference style timetable with speeches, case studies, time for questions and round table discussions. However, as so often happens with this type of gathering the most valuable thing to come out of it was talking to other delegates. We found that their problems and experiences are the same as, or at least similar to ours, - namely funding and the recruitment of younger people to help run organisations, assist at events or even support them.

I think the majority of delegates who attended the summit, like us, were hoping to find answers to some of their problems, but sadly in many cases we felt disappointed.

Richard Lohead, MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Rural Affairs and the Environment, made a half-hour speech in the morning session in which he stressed the importance of village halls to their communities, and how valuable those of us who worked on behalf of the community centres are to rural life. He then pledged to make funding for their important work more readily available, but, later on in his address said that funding would still be at the discretion of the local councils, so nothing new there then!!! Unfortunately I felt, and I was not alone in my thinking, that Mr. Lohead's speech was a glorified party political 'broadcast' on behalf of the SNP, and that nothing much would change!

Sandra Hogg who was the SCVO Convener for the summit did give a brief and informative history of village halls and I found the following points interesting. There have been village halls around since the 18th century; there are 3,000 in Scotland; 30% were built in the 19th century; 72% are pre-1960; only 8 are really modern, so Kilmelford and Kilninver are lucky there; 66% are strictly rural and 20% were built as War Memorials. The SCVO have been involved with village halls since the 1940s and feel now is the time to raise their profile. Clearly the summit was the first of many, and I feel pleased that we were 'in at the beginning'.

Fergus and I did at least find out about some organisations which we may be able to approach for future funding, and we also gleaned some ideas as to how we could improve our existing facilities. After all K and K village hall is YOUR village hall and along with the two churches is the heart of our little community, and therefore should be 'user friendly'.

I hope the committee of the Kilmelford and Kilninver Community Association with its new committee members and the valued support of its longer standing members will feel encouraged to take on board some new projects and ideas to help make the hall a warmer and more welcoming place for all our residents and their visitors. However, this can only be done with your help. We cannot expect the same few people to organise, run and attend all occasions. You MUST support the fund raising events and help in other ways when and where possible.

I felt this summit was a very good inauguration into my new position as chair on the Kilmelford and Kilninver Community Association Committee, and I look forward to an exciting new period in the history, the second decade, of our village hall.

LETTER FROM OUR MINISTER

The Church Restoration Appeal Group has been very agreeably surprised by the response that has been made. To date we have received donations (largely against the pledges made at the beginning) of nearly £33,500. With the tax recovered through Gift Aid there should be an additional £4000. Grants have been promised to us amounting to £17,000. This means that we have cleared the original target of at least £50,000. A huge effort and a very generous response, and my thanks must go to everyone who has been involved in any way. There is still some pledged money to come in and we hope additional donations, for Peter Cross, our Fabric convenor has always said that this is the first (and major) stage in ongoing restoration and maintenance.

On Sunday 30th March about a hundred motorbikes assembled in Kilmelford for a sponsored pillion ride through Glencoe and back to Kilmelford. The moneys from this will be coming in for some little while yet, but so far almost £3500 has been given, and this is included in the above total. Christine and I were pillion riders, both of us for the first time, and we enjoyed it immensely, myself probably more than Christine, although the grin she had when she finished has not yet disappeared. Also from the village were two "Pillion Princesses", Cath Manchester and Christine Roberts, and they too seemed to have enjoyed the day. The event was a great day out for the bikers and a good one for the village and the Church.

The coming months will see the work started (and hopefully completed), and also the completion of the restoration work at Kilninver, again accomplished through the generous giving and support of the local community. As minister in this charge I am particularly pleased to know that through all these generous efforts that we will have a comfortable church in both communities that can be used for more than just the usual church services. Visitors are welcome at any time, and locals are particularly welcome to join in our worship Sunday by Sunday.

We remember....

Alan Hill, 22/10/1916 – 11/1/2008

It was the love of sailing and adventurous family holidays that brought Alan, Hilary and the boys to Kilmelford. Alan and Hilary stayed a couple of nights at the Cuilfail while the boys camped on the shores of the loch.

They had understood that there were railway cottages for sale in Argyll for £50 and on hearing this “Old Mac” Mackenzie tempted them to have a wee look at a plot of land down the Degnish road. That was the beginning of building Coille Dharaigh.

Alan wished that his life would be remembered with joy and thanksgiving. In the church full of spring flowers and bright colours Peter, with contributions from family and friends, led the congregation through a descriptive celebration. Alastair shared Alan’s love of steam trains and read W. H. Auden’s “Night Mail”, treating us to a recording of a steam train entering a tunnel and ending in a loud triumphant whistle.

Alex Stewart read the citation from Alan’s award of the Military Cross. It commended him for “his tending the wounded and evacuating them from the front line. His courage and devotion to duty in the midst of enemy action deserved him the highest praise and his example did much to maintain the high moral of the troops”.

Alan’s work at the Stoke Mandeville hospital specialising in rheumatoid arthritis pioneered new approaches to the patients’ treatment and well-being. He brought the orthopaedic surgeons into the consultations and advocated that everyone should have fair treatment and when beds were available, whether male or female, it was first on the list.

Hilary and Peter very kindly provided refreshments at the hall after the service, where family and friends could meet and raise a toast, in his favourite dram, to Alan and a celebration of his life.

Belle Clark, 1921 – 2008 (Formerly of The Lodge, Glenmore).

For the past three years Belle has lived very quietly at Ossians Care Home, North Connell, so we would like to thank everyone who visited her there, and for all the lovely cards and kind words when she passed away.

When Harry and Belle came back to live in Kilmelford in the early 70s it was a dream come true for them. They always felt that they had come home. The Lodge was a huge part of our families’ lives and we all have special memories of them there. God Bless.

Grace Pollard, – born 29th June 1929, died 7th February 2008

Grace was brought up in Dumfries but she left Scotland in 1955 to join Ken in Aden for an almost nomadic life as a service wife. Following several further postings a more settled existence was possible when Ken retired from the RAF and began a second career as a school master, initially in the Bristol area and then south Devon. Grace herself worked for many years in the National Health Service at Frenchay and Torbay hospitals.

Grace and Ken arrived in Argyll towards the end of 1998 having been retired for many years in Devon. While living in one of Morag Mellor’s chalets at Knipoch they looked for a suitable property. Actually building a house wasn’t plan A but the plot at Cuilfail proved an instant attraction to Grace, so that no time was lost in submitting an offer and within a year they moved into Criffel.

Grace and Ken enjoyed life in Kilmelford which brought the added benefit of being in close proximity to some of their grandchildren. They also enjoyed regular holidays including an annual cruise on the Nile with a particular group of friends. KILNINVER AND KILMELFORD COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The meeting of the above Council was held on Tuesday 11th December, 8pm at the Village Hall.

Present: Neil Manchester (Chairman), Nigel Mitchell, Robin Grey, Robin Asbury, Alasdair Oatts and Lindsay Davies.

Also in attendance were Argyll and Bute Councillor Donald McDonald and 17 members of the public.

1.Apologies: Christine McLachlan, Toni Mitchell, Christine Roberts, Judith and John Stannard.

2.Minutes of previous meeting: Minutes of previous meeting held on 9th October 2007 were taken as read. The minutes were proposed by Neil Manchester and seconded by Robin Asbury.

3.Matters Arising from previous meeting:

- a. Roads Issues. The Chairman reported on the following roads issues as updated by Neil Brown, Argyll and Bute Council
 1. Scrub cutting on A816. Neil Brown confirmed the correct procedure for dealing with the cuttings was for them to have been chipped. This will be arranged. Ian Tegner asked for it to be brought to the attention of Neil Brown that unchipped clippings are lying on the road from Kilninver School to Kilninver Church.
 2. Hedge at phone box. Neil Brown confirmed the proprietor of hedge is responsible for the trimming and noted that this has been done. Several members of the public commented this has not been done adequately.
 3. White lines at Degnish Road end faded and require re-doing. This has been noted.
 4. Acquisition of road for widening for HGV at Melfort Farm bend. Feedback from both Neil Brown and Cllr Duncan MacIntyre that Argyll and Bute Council have no plans to compulsorily purchase this land. John Christlieb has written to the Chairman asking for the Community Council's support in persuading the owners of Melfort House, Mr and Mrs Anderson, to sell or gift 700m² of land to the council for this purpose. The chairman confirmed that as per previous discussions on this issue, the Community Council would not be supporting the proposal, since the general roads in Argyll were of a condition that expenditure on this type of project would be wrong. Cllr Donald MacDonald is now in receipt of all correspondence regarding this matter and will deal with any issues.

- b. Speed Limit in Kilmelford.- process being followed in order for consideration for a reduced speed limit in the village. The Chairman suggested that a speed trap within the village might help matters, and to this end will contact Sgt. Ian Stewart. PC Moffat also confirmed the speed notices at Kilninver Primary School were being reviewed regarding timings.
- c. Bus Shelters in Kilmelford- Cllr MacIntyre confirmed the northbound bus shelter to be replaced.
- d. Blaran Road end- Bus report. No copies received as yet, unclear if report has been completed but Blaran Road has been removed from bus timetable. Chairman to contact Douglas Blades and for this to be Agenda item in February.
- e. Melfort Farm Bridge – already dealt with under Roads issues.
- f. Kilninver Notice Board - Permission has been received by ACHA to utilise area by bus stop in Kilninver. Cllr MacDonald to enquire regarding insurance cover. Grant application has been submitted. Nigel Mitchell to discuss with Cllr MacIntyre whether we can claim retrospectively or if we must wait for the grant in order to begin work. Costings – Nigel has range of quotes from £467incl VAT to £499 excl VAT.
- g. Problem weeds in Scammadale – Lindsay Davies to complete map with problem areas identified and liase with the Chairman.
- h. Community Defibrillator – Cllr MacDonald asked for confirmation of interest regarding this issue. The Chairman confirmed that interest had been expressed by several members of the community.

4.Land Around Kilmelford Village Hall:

The planning application for the development of properties has been submitted in the name of Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council with John Tilley covering the costs of applying. The chairman noted that two objections had been received from Mr Kennedy of Kinloch, and Mr Christlieb of Melfort Pier, both of which generally supported the housing development but objected to the community ownership of amenity areas. Both letters have been addressed by Mr John Coleman, Architect for Mr. Tilley. The chairman also pointed out that all steps in the decision making process had been discussed at the Community Council meetings. It was pointed out at the meeting that the planning application included reference to a document supporting operational need but no such document attached. Robin Asbury to enquire for next C.C. Meeting. Elizabeth Asbury asked for the Chairman to confirm that no member of the Community Council was gaining personally from this process. The Chairman confirmed this, also confirming the benefits to the community that the Community Company would be taking forward. Robin Asbury confirmed the football pitch area will be drained with the rest of the land being the responsibility of the Community Company to manage. The Chairman asked all present to indicate whether they supported proceeding with this project. There was unanimous support at the meeting with the actions taken so far, and a mandate provided to proceed as discussed.

5.Land Reform Act:

The Chairman asked for suggestions for a name for the Community Company. It was considered that the name ‘Kilninford Community Company’ was appropriate to the project. The Chairman proposed that a future consideration may be to combine Kilninford Community Company and the Village Hall Committee.

6.Planning Applications:

1. Alterations to dwelling house, Barnacarry house, Kilninver. No issues raised.
2. Installation of voltage regulators SSE Power Distribution, land west of Kames Farm, Kilmelford. No issues raised.

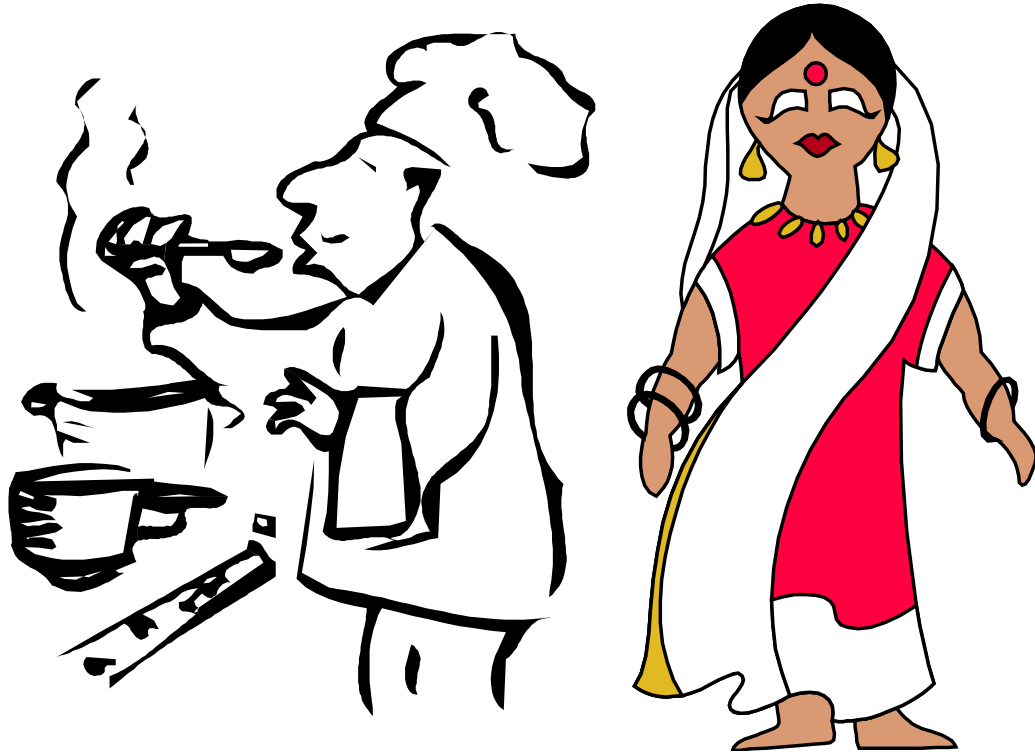
