a) HEATING AND INSULATION OF THE VILLAGE HALL

It is generally agreed that the heating in the main hall is more effective now that the wall heaters have been lowered to their new positions. The electricity consumption and costs have been monitored over the last few months and a decision arrived at to price the heating cards at £1.50 each. These are available from Kilmelford Stores and the Melfort Club reception.

Funding for a more efficient system of insulation is being looked into but without much success so far. An energy audit was carried out at the Village Hall by Community Energy Scotland to assess future energy saving strategies, but no financial assistance has been forthcoming. An estimate for improved insulation is being sought from various firms.

b) MAINTENANCE

The caretaker has had no major problems to report. The damaged door to the Gents' cloakroom has been replaced and the faulty kitchen tap repaired.

c) FUNDRAISING

A very successful PiperActive Shindig was held on 30th October, with £200.00 being donated to Hall funds. Thanks go to Matthew and Yvonne Anderson for all their hard work on this.

The committee organised a popular Quiz Night and buffet on 21st November. Some sponsorship is anticipated from the Diageo Company. Final figure is awaited.

The 100 Club is running smoothly and has 86 members at present, but this varies slightly from month to month. DRAFT MINUTES

The meeting of the above Council was held on Tuesday 13th October at 8pm in the Village Hall.

Present: Robin Asbury (RA) Chairman, Lindsay Davies (LD), Nigel Mitchell (NM).

Also in attendance were Cllr Duncan MacIntyre, Cllr Elaine Robertson and 22 members of the public.

1. Apologies: Alasdair Oatts (AO), Robin Grey (RG), Cllr Donald MacDonald and Cllr Neil MacKay.

2. <u>Minutes of previous meeting</u>: Amended 3a) Stuart Turner not Miller, 3f) Jolyon not Julyon and 10 4. residents not resident. Those amendments made the minutes were taken as being a true and accurate representation of that meeting. Proposed NM. Seconded LD.

3. Matters Arising from previous meeting:

Arduaine Garden Action Group has had a subsequent meeting on 09.09.09. The Arduaine Garden Support Group will now be constituted and carry on the work.

- a) Speed limit in Kilmelford RG wrote to Stuart Turner. Response received to the effect that there is currently a review ongoing of speed limits. Both the requested reduction from 40-30mph and the increase in coverage area will be considered as part of this review process. The Community Council will be informed of the outcome of this review.
- b) Bus Shelter in Kilmelford On going. Roof to be repaired by end of the year.
- c) War Memorial- this has now been repaired and all supports/scaffolding removed.
- d) Core Paths- To be carried over for next Community Council to decide if they wish Jolyon Britton to attend.
- e) Blocked pathway in Raera Forest now cleared.
- Roads Issues Oude bridge realignment main road issue outstanding. This has gone out to tender for 2010.
- g) West Highland Housing Association Exhibition in the hall 13.08.09. There are still properties available. WHHA welcome anyone interested to contact them.
- 4. Land Around the Village Hall: This has now been referred back to the PPLS committee with agreement in writing re developer of the site to hand over sports pitch completed to Argyll and Bute Council standard with cash support plan for 5 years to assist with maintenance. Unclear at this stage when this will actually be presented at the PPLS after which it would then go to the Scottish Executive.

- 5. Proposed Wind Farm, Raera Forest: Formal application being prepared by nPower, when complete plans will be available in the Post Office for examination. KKCC will also be in receipt of a copy. Query that jetty may be built at Kilmelford Yacht Haven for loading/unloading. Also query that poles to carry electricity cables proposed for Scammadale, unclear whether would be existing poles or new. Both of these issues would be detailed in the planning application. Claudia Albrecht raised point of planning application going in with respect to new Community Council, potential gap in continuity and next proposed meeting as relevant to planning application. RA suggested we deal with this further in next item. NM added that as a Community Council we can express an interest and this would provide a hold on dates till discussed at proposed meeting.
- 6. Community Council Elections: KKCC have 10 Community Councillor spaces and in the recent nomination process 7 applications were made. These 7 nominees will be declared validly elected at 11am on 29.10.09. The new Community Councillors will be Matthew Anderson of Melfort House, Kilmelford. ARDUAINE GARDEN SUPPORT GROUP

November Newsletter

Welcome to the first newsletter for the Arduaine Garden Support Group, and can I thank you all for your support in joining the Group. I want to initially tell you where we are as a Group with this campaign, secondly invite you to the first Membership meeting, and thirdly to invite you to take part in a competition that will have a large impact for the Garden – more below!

Campaign Status

The National Trust for Scotland continues to identify and follow up potential contributors to build up the Garden's endowment, and has currently firm pledges of over £500,000, albeit some will be paid in stages over a period of time. The NTS will formally launch its fundraising activities very shortly, and is quietly confident that the above figure will be added to over the next few months – I'll keep you informed of this in subsequent newsletters.

One major change, that is hoped to generate extra revenue, is the use of the Loch Melfort Hotel as a ticket office during the off season period, when the Garden's normal reception is unmanned. This has only just started, and we await with interest any difference this will make.

The Group has been very active in raising the Garden's profile – its own area of responsibility. Calum Ross and myself from the Steering Committee were invited by Oban FM (103.3) to explain the campaign, and have also secured commitment by the station to broadcast regular updates. This also applies to the Oban Times, so look out for articles on both the campaign and the Garden itself.

To broaden the attraction of the Garden from the purely horticultural, the Group is working in conjunction with local Primary Schools to place red squirrel, bird, and bat, boxes in the Garden.

However our major activity at this time of year is to prepare and distribute a 'dedicated' Arduaine Garden leaflet – this will be printed by the thousands, and we expect to make it available in all tourist accommodation and other visitor attractions within an appropriate radius, and also distribute it more widely in Tourist Information Centres and other locations where it can reach a wider audience.

Future plans include further internet coverage, with possible web sites, social network pages (Facebook etc), and we are starting to plan a series of events in the Garden, both specifically for members (talks, walks etc), and also for the more general visitor. However we are always open to ideas, so please do contribute.

Membership Meeting

As promised at our open meeting in September, we have arranged a first Group Meeting, and this will take place in the Small Room in Kilmelford Village Hall on Monday 7 December starting at 7.30 pm.

The aim of this meeting is to involve you, the membership, in what is happening, and as such we will further update you on progress.

As was mentioned at the Open Meeting previously, the Steering Committee of the Group are acting Officers at present, and we will be asking for people to join this Committee, and help the initial band, either by taking over some of the activities, or by bringing new skills and experience. Please have a think if this could be you, and contact me at the details below if interested. It is likely that, if there are interested parties, a formal election of the Steering Committee will take place that evening, so please come along and have your say.

We are also looking for volunteers to act on a project by project basis; Maurice Wilkins, Head Gardener, has asked if there is anyone with carpentry and general handyman experience who could spare some time, and those who indicated some gardening skills will be contacted again in the near future. If there is someone with website or other internet skills, these would also be very useful.

To gain some idea of numbers, I would be grateful if you could reply to this email indicating whether you are likely to attend. We do appreciate that some of you, as far away as Kent and Omagh, may find it a little difficult – however please do contribute to any of the above by email or phone as below.

Competition

We would like to invite all of you who have good photographs of the garden to contribute these (electronically please to the email address below) – the new leaflet which I referred to above, and which is being planned at the moment, needs a really striking photograph on the front, and this could be yours! No prizes, but the satisfaction of knowing your photo will be seen by thousands, and we will acknowledge you on the leaflet. Time is pressing on this, so please send these by the end of the month (November) if possible.

I hope this has given you a taste of what the Group, and the Steering Committee specifically, are doing on behalf of the Garden. Everything is very positive – we still have a way to go, but we are definitely starting to see a conclusion – a wonderful Garden available to everyone for the future.

ARDUAINE GARDEN IN NOVEMBER

This is the first of what I intend to be a regular monthly e-letter to members of the Arduaine Garden Support Group.

First and foremost I must thank you all for springing to the support of the garden in its hour of need! Arduaine has long been a favourite of garden lovers from near and far and a recent survey has indicated that many visitors appreciate the tranquillity of the place, in combination with the superb location, the wonderful plant collection and the lack of what one visitor called 'Trustification'. I think I understand what she meant!

The other request that was revealed by the survey was that most visitors don't wish for change, yet change is something that is inevitable in a garden. Change may be forced on a garden in many ways, such as damage from storms, from pests and disease, or as a result of cold or wet weather. Change can also be a voluntary thing, led simply by the wish to expand the plant collection, or to replace a tired or over mature plant with something fresh, or to revitalise a tired area by re-aligning a path or replacing a bridge.

Visitors to Arduaine this winter will see changes being made for all of these reasons. As I write, we're modifying the line of a path beside the Heron Pond to allow more room for a seat and associated planting, we're dealing with a number of trees which have been seriously damaged in gales and we'll shortly be removing a huge old leyland hedge to reveal a fresh hemlock hedge which has been growing behind it, unseen by the public eye, for the last seven or eight years. This will result in the widening of the border beside it and the consequent need to prepare the soil and replant the border; one thing leads to another!

It would be unrealistic to talk about change without a comment on one of the latest trials to be laid before us. I'm talking about *Phytophthora ramorum*, or Sudden Oak Death as it's commonly known. This disease, which is spreading now through western Scotland, can infect a wide range of plants and not just oaks or even rhododendrons as it often thought. Current government legislation insists that we remove and burn infected plants, grubbing up the stumps and likewise incinerating the leaf litter round about the offender. It also means that we are not permitted to replant with anything listed as infectable, which is somewhat limiting. Forward planning becomes more difficult and I see my job as attempting to maintain the diversity of the plant collection in any way that I can, trying at the same time to keep the worst signs of the disease from the public gaze in spite of the legal requirement to inform visitors that we have this fight on our hands. I'm confident that we can sustain our reputation as a garden with a well-maintained air and an interesting plant collection. Watch this space! Plants are of course the backbone of Arduaine, and while the springtime is inevitably a time of great richness and flamboyance, the general aim is to ensure that a succession of flowers keeps the interest going throughout the year. I'll stick my neck out and challenge all comers to fail to find a plant in flower at any time of the year! It may not be spectacular but it will be there! Wanderers along the garden's Gully Path this month will notice two clumps of spiky plants growing on the bank to the north. These bromeliads, or pineapple relatives, are from Chile and rejoice in the names of *Fascicularia bicolor* subsp. *bicolor* and *Fascicularia bicolor* subsp. *canaliculata*. The former, with wider leaves, is what is known as <u>saxicolous</u>, meaning 'growing on or among rocks', and the latter, with narrow foliage, is epiphytic, growing high in the trees. When it flowers, as ours is at the moment, the leaves towards the centre of the rosette turn a bright red, leading the way to the hub of pale blue flowers in the centre! Worth a look but not a touch – they're extremely sharp! I've seen huge clumps of it fallen to the ground in Chile, clumps up to 10ft across! Ours will never grow to that size, but we do have a clump growing in the fork of a large willow and looking very natural!

Fuchsias too are still flowering well. We grow many forms and hybrids of the Chilean *Fuchsia* magellanica, a common plant both in its southern Chile home and along the western seaboard of Britain, especially Scotland and Ireland. The pale pink hybrid 'Flashlight', is still looking good in the middle of November as we've had no frost so far. Many fuchsia cultivars are hardy and it's well worth experimenting with those – we grow 'Mrs Popple', 'Margaret', 'Corallina' (raised in Exeter in 1844) and several others, both named and forgotten.

And finally, or, perish the thought, I shall be accused of prolixity, I must mention Leycesteria crocothyrsos, the far less commonly known sibling of the common and weedy 'pheasant berry'. This lovely shrub, growing along the 'Road to the Sea', has produced a rather out of season flower spike, a cluster of bright yellow tubular flowers very welcome at this time of year! So there you have it – those of you who live along this coast will be able to grow a much wider range of plants than maybe you realise. Why live along the west coast and grow only *Berberis darwinii*! To our supporters elsewhere, my commiserations! Our thanks of course again to everyone for wanting to help us out. If you visit Arduaine in the coming year, which I hope you will, please make yourself known to one of us here – either to myself, Robert or Cary in the garden or to Sheila in reception.
