COMFORT THE DISTURBED AND DISTURB THE COMFORTABLE

Spring brings us to the high point of the Christian year with the celebration of Easter. This year the weather patterns have kept us on our toes but our Easter celebrations have been memorable – from the quiet but moving early Easter morning communion service in Kilmelford Church through to the Xplorers less quietly rolling their painted hard-boiled eggs down the hill in the manse garden through to the week of "Showstopper" holiday club activities with a visiting team from Inverness.

Stopping to think of what Easter is all about I find that it is geared to have a double effect – to comfort the disturbed and disturb the comfortable.

If our images of Easter involve dreamy thoughts of a green hill far away it might be a shock to the system to think of its disturbing aspect. Yet when we stop to think of what was involved in the crucifixion there would be something wrong if we were not disturbed.

If we are completely comfortable with the world the way it is, Easter makes it clear that God isn't. For God has taken costly action to disturb the status quo.

Yet strangely enough, it is the action of Easter which also brings comfort like nothing else can. Reflecting on all that Africans have suffered Gabriel Setiloane has this verse in one of his poems:

And yet for us it is when He is on the cross,
This Jesus of Nazareth, with holed hands
and open side, like a beast at a sacrifice:
When he is stripped naked like us,
Browned and sweating water and blood in the heat of the sun,
Yet silent,
That we cannot resist Him.

As Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote from his Nazi prison cell: "only the suffering God can help".

Life is complicated and I guess that many of us are a bit of both – comfortable and disturbed. We have our comfort zones which might need to be disturbed for the sake of justice and life. And, truth be told, we have our sore and bruised bits which cry out for healing and hope. Either way the events of Easter can transform our lives – Christ is risen!

Wishing you happy and fulfilling days in the Spring and summer.

In role play, examples of the difficult experiences of immigrant women were revealed, and responses to them contrasted with instructions in the Bible on how Christians should behave. We are asked to examine our own consciences in this regard.

Thanks are also due to the hospitality shown in Ken and Hester's home after the service, when the blue, white and red cake (the French colours), made by Isabel, soon disappeared from the scene!

Maintenance of the Village Hall

- a) The insulation and redecoration of the ladies', gents' and disabled cloakrooms has now been completed by AIS. The grant of £9,000 from Awards for All has covered the cost of this. The only money, an amount of £500, to come out of Hall funds was the cost of the cupboards which have been fitted under the washbasins, the boxing in of water pipes, and a repair of a section of the roof which had been the cause of a damp patch on the ceiling of the gents' cloakroom.
- b) A new fire door has been fitted at the end of the corridor to replace the old one which was warped and allowing the ingress of water.

Fund Raising

- a) The Quiz and Curry Night held in March has established itself as an unmissable event and was very well attended as usual. Thanks go Christine Roberts as chief organiser, Toni Mitchell who compiled the Quiz and to all those who produced the excellent selection of curries and other dishes on offer, and to everyone else who helped on the night. It raised over £700.
- b) The annual Loch Melfort beach clean will take place on Sunday 28th April, starting from the Village Hall carpark at 10.30 am. Sponsorship is by the Grab Trust and is based on miles of shoreline cleared of rubbish anywhere between Degnish and Arduaine. NEW LOOK LOOS

First my apologies to all regular hall users for the inconvenience, no pun intended, caused by the toilets and changing rooms in the village hall being out of action during the month of February. I do believe there was always at least one toilet available. I hope that now the refurbishment has been completed that you will think it worthwhile?

Once again Danny Sumison from Alternative Insulation Solutions has done us proud. The toilets, showers and changing rooms have been insulated and redecorated making them warmer and aesthetically more pleasing and we trust user friendly.

This project was due to another grant obtained from 'Awards for All Scotland', part of the big lottery Fund and covered the £9,000+ cost of this refurbishment. We did as the project progressed ask if Danny could build a vanity unit in the Ladies, to support the wash hand basins, always tending to come away from the wall, secondly giving us useful storage space and of course finishing the look of the area beautifully. This he happily did and also boxed in the basin pipe work in both the gents and disabled toilets. This did have to come out of hall funds as it was an afterthought but considerably cheaper doing it with the other work than getting it done as a later project. The committee feel it was worth the extra cost as were the new curtains etc in the shower cubicles.

Friday 1st March's coffee morning brought very variable comments from 'users' in fact it was so warm in the ladies we had to turn the heating off!!!!!! A first I think.

This should be the last of the insulation projects for the hall and put us in a variable position to pass the 'test' for the erection of solar panels, on the wonderful south facing roof. We have secured quotes for 40 panels which should cover our electricity costs, by far the halls biggest annual expenditure. However, we have run into one rather major problem. When seeking funding I was told if I obtained a grant from somewhere like 'Awards for All' or 'Community Energy Scotland', used before, as they were publicly funded we could not then benefit from the feed in tariff!! We have to secure funds from private organisations. If anyone has any bright ideas as to such organisations please let a hall committee member know. Thanks!

KILMELFORD COASTAL ROWING

JANUARY – Snow covers the mountain tops. The ground is hard. Dozens of birds are being fed in the garden, but when the sun makes the days longer and the sea sparkles across the loch, Loch Melfort is the ideal place to row a St Ayles skiff.

I quote from an article in the Guardian, Saturday January 5th 2013 "it has to be hand built from plywood and larch and comes in a flat pack. Ever since it was designed for the Scottish Fisheries Museum in Fife in 2009 the small boat, crew of 4 plus a cox, has been snapped up by coastal villages and towns across Scotland." This seems ideal for a community project in Kilmelford where many people have close ties to the sea in some way.

The basic kit costs £1340 and about £5000 is needed to put the vessel in the water, complete with trailer, cover and extra larch for the stern, keel, seats and rudder. The Scottish Coastal Rowing Association was formed in May 2010 and supports the enterprise. Building and rowing such a boat involves and unites people of both genders, all ages, skills and levels of experience all over coastal areas of Scotland.

Already we have sold 26 shares in the boat and have had considerable response from local people who would like to help build and row such a boat. We thank every one of these enthusiasts and would be grateful for more support. We have been given a space to build the skiff by the generosity of David McColl at the Kilmelford Boat Yard. He has the thanks of everyone involved. A kit has been ordered and, by the time this is in print, construction should have begun.

We would like to thank everyone who has already supported this community project in its early stages and still welcome anyone who feels they can help this worthwhile community project.

Finally we shall be making applications for grant assistance where these are appropriate. If you have a facebook page look for the Galaxy Hot Chocolate Fund supporting warm hearted people and projects and please give us your support.

Foot Note

APRIL - Since January remarkable progress has been made on the skiff by a group of dedicated volunteers. Most of the planks are on the mold and the keel has been constructed. A fund raising soup and sandwich lunch in February made £502.00 and we are grateful to all the people who supported the event. In June, date not yet decided, there will be a musical evening with buffet supper in the Cuilfail Hotel. We hope this will prove popular. We continue to need funds because a trailer for the boat will be expensive and a cover will be needed. Only one share remains unsold but donations will always be accepted with gratitude.

1. DECLARATIONS of INTEREST. There were none.

- 2. MINUTES of MEETING of 9th.OCTOBER 2012 were approved as a true and accurate representation of the meeting. Proposed by LF and seconded by MA
- 3. AGM MINUTES of 9th OCTOBER were agreed. Proposed by LF and seconded by AM
- 4. MATTERS ARISING from the last MEETING.
 - a) <u>Clachan Wind Farm</u> As of the 11th. February 2013 the Scottish Government have received no appeal. The 30th. of January 2013 at midnight was the cut off date.

 The chair has recently received an email letter from one of the adjacent landowners to the site declaring he is not interested in negotiating with Mr Rory Young regarding access across his land.
 - b) <u>Speed Limits.</u> The marking out of the new proposed speed limit signs 30mph have already begun in Kilmelford Village, and they should be in place by the end of February. The road narrow signs at the bridge are already in place. STAGE 2, the extension of the 30mph limit has still to go through the consultation period. This was confirmed by Cllr Duncan McIntyre.
 - c) Community Emergency Plan.

 CEP she had spoken about at the October Meeting and confirmed that she had attended the meeting held at the Corran Halls on Nov.13th. 2012. Mr Terry Haggerty from Argyll Voluntary Action was introduced and he spoke at some length on the subject. He stressed that the idea of a community led Emergency Action Plan was a Scottish Government initiative and they appeared to have chosen Argyll and Bute as the council to take the lead as their population was fairly evenly divided between rural and urban communities. He intimated that the islands appeared to be better prepared than mainlanders. AM pointed out that in this parish it was difficult as there were 5 separate communities. Mr Haggerty suggested that there should be different groups to make plans for each area and to regard it as a community building exercise. He went on to say he was there to give advice and help. There were funds that could be applied for to help with emergency items e.g. torches, gas fires, etc. the form applying for these items had to be completed by the end of the week. MA agreed to apply.
 - d) Ardmaddy Fish Farm. A and B Planners have now confirmed that this application is live again as SEPA have completed their deliberations and given their approval and granted Marine Pen Fish Farming their Licence. NA advised that previous letters to the planners of support or objection would still be considered. Should anyone else wish to write they could do so, but that the council could only consider planning concerns, for example those of light and noise pollution, size of barge, panoramic quality etc. A Discussion raised a number of further concerns to those of pollution namely the fact that Fish farms were self-regulatory and that SEPA did not have the resources to monitor. NM would contact Ian MacKinnon Environmental Health to see if a watch could be put on the fish farm. A further letter will be sent by the KKCC regarding the communities' additional concerns.

5. PLANNING APLICATIONS.

The chair NM has received a letter from Stuart Cannon concerning his KAMES fish farm. Kames had a SEPA application in last week's Oban Times this is a Technical variation to Kames current licence, which marine Scotland had requested that they obtain. This was to enable them to treat any trout that they hold prior to harvest, with any medicines that the fish may need during that period. He went on to say that KAMES had been holding fish there for many years without EVER having to treat or medicate fish. However, they had to comply with regulations and have things in place.

Land around the hall. The Planners have confirmed that this site is zoned as a new PDA and is for Community Facility development. The Public consultation period has now started and finishes on the 29th April 2013. Representations must be made before then. There is a public drop in event being held in Oban on the 20th. Feb 2013 between 3pm and 8pm in the Corran Halls, which is open to all and is an opportunity for the public to talk to planning officers about the LDP. All relevant documents are available for viewing on the council web site, Oban Library and council offices, Oban.

Erection of private dwelling house and formation of access. Land at Melfort Home farm Kilmelford. Pending consideration. Ref: No: 13/00007/PP

Local Review requested for....removal of condition number 5 of planning permission 01/94/0409 restricting occupancy. Harbour Master Melfort Pier and Harbour Kilmelford. Ref: No: 12/01624/PP and site for the erection of a dwelling house and installation of a septic tank land NW of Arduaine farm. Ref: No: 12/00361/PP

Exploratory drilling of up to 30 sites over a period of 3 years for mineral deposit identification. Lagalochan Forest Kilmelford ref. No. 12/02675/PP

Concerns were raised by Mrs Dalton, on this last application, as to the roads suffering from large vehicles, the road to be traversed was only a C class road. A discussion was held and it was agreed that the KKCC should write to Roads flagging up the concerns. AM agreed to write.

6. <u>CORRESPONDENCE</u>

1. HEALTH CARE Points were raised concerning health care issues. The chair admitted that he had been approached about a number of things. People not being seen, and not on time, Staff leaving etc. Cllr. Elaine Robertson stressed that if people were concerned they must contact their care managers. She also said a paper was being brought to the attention of A and B council. A list of people who receive care was being compiled for community councils.

2. HISTORIC SCOTLAND

NM has received information from Historic Scotland stating that they wish to re-schedule the site of the cairn at the back of the hall

3. SCOTTISH COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

NA has been approached by Dajit Singh from the Scottish Community Foundation and has met with him concerning the benefits to KK that could arise from the already permitted Carrick Gael Wind farm. Kilninver and Kilmelford are one of a number of neighbouring communities who are entitled to a percentage of the WF's income. NM has agreed to join a community panel with other community councils to set up a charitable trust. Once the WF comes on line then the Scottish Community Foundation would work with the KKCC rep to set up KK Charitable Trust enabling us to receive our possible benefits.

4. BUDGETS.

Nigel has received information concerning the new budget proposals as per the SNP led administration paper for this Thursday.

The roads Operation budget to be reduced by £510,000 (7.1%) and the loss of 21 FTE jobs (15.3%) The Street scene budget to be reduced by £400,000 (8.1%) and the loss of 14 FTE jobs

A and B are holding a meeting on Thursday 14th Feb to discuss the budget and its implications.

7. A.O.B.

It was asked if Mcleods could be asked to deal with the overgrowing vegetation and trees at the Degnish Road end of the Glebe. Cllr Duncan McIntyre agreed to approach them.

A discussion ensued concerning the trees obstructing the visibility at the bridge at the north end of the village and the possibility of obstruction to new signs. NM suggested that we should wait to see what clearing was done when the new signs were erected and deal with everything at one time.

It was commented that the new road narrows signs were too small. Most people agreed that they had missed them. A lorry has already hit one.

ARDUAINE GARDEN UPDATE

I cannot tell a lie – I'm sitting in my office on the 16th of April listening to the roar of the wind in the trees, the lashing of rain on the window and the banging of the door. Spring must be here at last! I can rarely resist a quote – Dr Johnson in this case: "It is commonly observed, that when two Englishmen meet, their first talk is of the weather; they are in haste to tell each other what each must already know, that it is hot or cold, bright or cloudy, windy or calm." Well I think we can discard the 'two Englishmen' and say 'several British people' in this instance – as none of us can help ourselves when it comes to discussing the climate; this appalling weather goes on and on!

Winter didn't start off too badly – the usual windy, showery, sunny, dry, cold, overcast etc. After Christmas it continued much the same until February when the emphasis changed to dry and cold, and the lack of precipitation became very noticeable. Weeks of only gently sub-zero temperatures overnight did nothing to prevent our rhododendrons coming into flower before February was out, and by early March we had a wonderful display. The night of the 11th brought this all to a sudden end though, as -7.5°C overnight destroyed the lot, flowers and opening buds. This was the coldest night for some years! How frustrating to be a rhododendron!

It was certainly quite a novelty to see mud around the pond margins in March and April and to see the natural leafy mulch drying up and disappearing from the top of the hill and ending up in thick piles at the bottom! Quite amusing too to see *Primula denticulata*, the drumstick primula, flowering almost at ground level, presumably because of the lack of moisture to extend the stems. Never mind, every spring is different, and we carried on, clearing up the winter debris from the garden, particularly from the woodland, where even the lightest wind seems to bring down more twigs and branches from the larches. This long job was finally completed on the 22nd March, the week before Easter, and we were all set for an influx of visitors along our carefully raked and leaf-free paths – until, that is, that very night when an easterly gale, from which direction we are really unprotected, brought down more debris from the trees than I have seen in 21 years! The following morning showed a scene of utter chaos, with two large trees and several others down. The paths were cleared again for Easter and the dangerous areas taped off – some of the damage has been cleared but the rest will have to wait!

We've had no further infections from *Phytophthora ramorum* for a while, and although we're not being complacent, we're hopeful that we might be over the worst. But who knows!

So when this weather decides to settle down and the sun returns, all those wonderful plants that delight our visitors will be there to enjoy – do come along!

BARROCHREAL GARDEN

I have been prompted to write this article as on the weekend of July 27th and 28th 2013 we have been asked to open our garden for the National Garden Scheme of Scotland. As this is a charity event we would love to see as many of you there as possible. For those of you really interested or not able to visit, may we urge you to go to our web site, www. Barochreal.co.uk and on the garden page you will see a pictorial account of the before and after scenario of each section of the garden. There are so many beautiful gardens in this area, I feel sure many are asking why we should have been asked to open ours. The simple answer is it is a very young garden 7 years this year and many people we are told are interested to see what can be achieved when starting literally from scratch.

In the Spring of 2006 we, Nigel and I, started on clearing an area we wanted to be our garden. We filled a skip with metal alone! Nigel and Andrew Sandilands then erected the 700m of fencing and gates which would define the garden area from the rest of Barochreal land. We had to clear a lot of the area of scrub grass, builder's bonfires and debris and plant some trees for height. We only inherited a few, a Copper Beech, a Eucalyptus, an old crab apple, a minute Tulip tree and Medlar. While Nigel tackled the area in front of the barn planting fruit trees and ornamentals, I made a start on the bed in the front and the area to become the rock garden. During the summer Nigel started creating the tiered garden, 7 beds of different colours, not quite how it turned out. Severe winters and nature has had other ideas! The construction was completed by the end of August and filled with manure dug from Scammadale Farm miden, and then planted up. Towards the end of the year we turned our attention to 'The Fank' which was to become our formal Rose garden.

In March 2007 the new bell mouth entrance to Barochreal was constructed and at the same time Nigel and Andrew defined the drive edges with sarking and between us we shovelled and spread 52 tons of gravel on the drive area alone. No wonder bad backs are the order of the day! At the same time due to May sales we planted up the front bank with Rhododendrons and Azaleas. In June we added the water feature to the Rock garden and Andrew dug out the bed in front of the fank and I the one at the base of the back slope. We call this the Jenny and Terry Moody bed as they gave us most of the shrubs contained therein and a number on the back slope and back fence line. We finished the construction work on the Rose garden. At the end of the year the cedar barn doors went on and the conservatory was completed. In March and April 2008 Nigel started working on the back walls and raised flower beds which stretch all along the back of the house. He had completed a stone walling course the previous Autumn at Kilmartin Glen Museum. The bank behind the house was constantly collapsing, and while rebuilding it properly these beds were also established. During this time we had to remove many Sitka Spruces which the previous owner had planted all over the slopes at the back!! Many trees and shrubs on the back boundary fence we re-planted in 2009 as we lost all our Leptospermums in 08 and my lovely Lupin tree in 09. When Nigel had finished the walling he hired a digger to create a space outside the conservatory to form a patio overlooking the burn. He then dug a small burn in the field to drain into the existing Allt Gleasan, the fields to the north outside the garden were very boggy. He also constructed the small pond, bridge and weir. He then cleared the area to the north side of the fank. This area and the area behind the fank was a mass of collapsed walls and rubbish. It had been used for holding and drip pens and the sheep dip, one could not walk over it. It is now the area of the Green house, raised seating area, raised vegetable beds and Japanese garden. In the Spring we had planted up the Rose garden, this has needed several replantings in some beds and we created a fernery on the north facing walled bed. In 2009 Nigel cleared the area where the Greenhouse now stands. This took a long time as the area had to be levelled and many walls re-built. Andrew, Nigel and Philip Coyle all helped to build the greenhouse. In the meantime I was working in the Rock garden. The two Philip Coyles senior and junior helped Nigel build the bridge across the burn from the patio. A very wet summer and poor Nigel's back hindered further progress that year. The new slate Arch was constructed to the entrance of the Rose garden. In 2010, the area behind and to the side of the greenhouse was completed, steps built and the rubble mound levelled off for the raised seating area. Raised vegetable beds at the back of the seating section were constructed. The sheep dip was buried but the drip pen was rebuilt to become a little Japanese garden. In June Nigel built the steps from the bridge up the other side of the bank to the 'wild garden', which in 2012 was to house the Bee Hives.

During these years Nigel had also been working on the fields and slopes, ridding the area of bracken and with the help of the flayer creating paths to make the rest of the land more accessible. Walks now up to the area of 'Burns Meet' and 'Castle Rock' and the waterfalls are a pleasant walk and not a struggle. This work will continue for many years to come. As bracken is cleared we discover banks of wild orchids and banks of sedum, many wonderful wild flowers and even springs we didn't know we had.

2011 was mainly spent in replacing a lot of plants we had lost in the severe winters of 2009/10. Clearing a lot of the wild garden of unwanted Sitka Spruce and re-painting the whole of the outside of the house seemed to take up most of this year. Remembering that during all these years we had also been doing some renovations inside the house as well, so we weren't slacking! In 2012 we took a rest from more construction and concentrated on trying to improve what we had, and Nigel's time was rather taken up with building beehives and learning how to look after them. His back had taken a real hammering. He did however create a wild flower area at the back by the track up the hill. Now in 2013 we are looking to change the area immediately in front of the conservatory to the south of the property, making the area around the ornamental cherry a flower bed with another set of steps down to the burn and trying to tier the very steep bank. This we hope to plant up with more plants that bees love as well as Rhododendrons and Azaleas.

With this work to house and garden, our work on the hall Committee and community council, we wondered where we got the idea that we came to Scotland to retire! A garden will always demand adding to and improving, so please drop in and watch the changes. We hope if you do that you will appreciate this is still a young garden in its infancy, suffering from 2 hard winters when hundreds of young plants and trees were lost. However, we would like to thank friends who have provided us with gifts of plants namely Terry and Jenny Moody, Georgina Dalton and Ellen Coyle.

40% of the funds raised from the garden opening will go to our local charity, Argyll Animal Aid, the cats down at Balvicar. We hope to welcome all Kilninford News readers at the end of July and if by then we are walking with sticks you may understand why.

KAMES BAY GARDEN OPENING 2013

For the first time we are opening Kames Bay Garden for Scotland's Gardens Charity. The garden was begun in 1982 on a steep hillside, where the only vegetation was a very good crop of bracken. Over the past 36 years we have developed the garden, which is full of colour and interest in all seasons but is at its best in the spring with many species of vibrant rhododendrons, azaleas and ornamental trees. There is a gentle walk around our pond, lined with rhododendrons and hydrangeas. There are two more challenging woodland walks, lined with wild primroses and violets, and with stunning views down Loch Melfort. The garden is usually in full bloom at the beginning of May, but it is difficult to tell what it will be like this year, after our extremely cold and dry February and March.

Sturdy (and possibly waterproof) footwear is recommended. Access is by foot up a steep private drive, with parking at the bottom of the drive either on the road or in a field (weather dependant). There is limited disabled parking for the not so nimble at the top of the drive. Dogs on a lead are welcome. The garden is not suitable for wheelchairs. Garden benches are situated all around the garden so that you can sit down and enjoy the views in peace and quiet.

Kames Bay Garden will be open on Saturday 4th May 2013 and Sunday 5th May 2013 from noon to 5 pm. Admission is £4, accompanied children free. Homemade teas are available.

MAOLACHY GARDEN

April 15th 2013. Back to normal today and the wild wet breezy weather is almost a relief after one of the longest dry spells for years. The days were accompanied by a tough easterly which blew almost constantly and often near gale force. A lazy wind as Jimmy Hawthorn used to call it, "blows right through you and can't be bothered to go round the figure in its way."

So far, no storm damage but buds are reluctant to come out and have stayed safely closed in folds by their home stem. The Lent lily daffodils' stalks are only about 2.3" high and one can almost hear them say "keep your heads down".

By the first weekend in May hopefully some warmth and watering will bring out signs of spring.

Maolachy's garden is open 12 noon - 5 p.m. both the 4^{th} and 5^{th} of May and 27^{th} and 28^{th} July. Although not officially doing teas, a family cuppa will be available even if a bit of self service.

40% of funds raised from the garden open will go towards Erskine homes, local Kilmelford charities and the net remaining to the Scotland's Gardens beneficiaries.

MELFORT HOUSE KITCHEN GARDEN

Melfort house is a family home and country house dinner, bed and breakfast on the shores of Loch Melfort, set in a mature two acre garden with specimen trees, a water feature and a variety of rhododendrons and azaleas. In the quest for the most exquisite tastes and flavours for our table we were inspired to 'grow our own'. Two years ago the kitchen garden was born. Now over 40 types of vegetables are grown from seed, including rarer heritage seed varieties, in a 54' long polytunnel. Whatever the weather, the polytunnel has become a place to relax and enjoy the colour, texture and aromas of the whole growing experience from seed to plate.

The Kitchen Garden will be open on Saturday, 27^{th} July and Sunday 28^{th} , July from 2 p.m. – 5 p.m. Teas, local produce and live music. Admission £3. 40% of funds raised will go to local Kilmelford charities, the net remaining to Scotland's Gardens beneficiaries.

USEFUL INFORMATION

POLICE SCOTLAND GOES LIVE

Police Scotland assumed responsibility for policing throughout the country at midnight on the 31st of March. At midnight, as the new Service came into effect, Chief Constable House was on foot patrol in Edinburgh's Princes Street along with T/Sgt Karen Reid. Chief Constable House and members of the Command Team then gathered at Tulliallan in the morning before making visits to police stations across Scotland. The Command Team travelled to a number of towns and cities from Stranraer in the south-west to Stonehaven in the north-east and also the Isle of Skye. Chief Constable Steve House said: "Police Scotland is up-and-running and is now wholly responsible for the delivery of policing to our communities, from local response to tackling the highest tiers of criminality. "We will do this in a way which is very visible, accessible and which truly connects with public priorities and operational demands." "Scotland has a proud history of policing. Police Scotland will take that record into a new era."

101 NON-EMERGENCY NUMBER

The 101 non-emergency number replaces the range of non-emergency numbers used by former Scottish police forces.

101 gives the people of Scotland a new way to contact the police, seek advice, speak to a local officer or to report a crime that does not need an emergency response, for example:

- ü car theft
- ü damage to property
- ü a minor traffic collision
- ü suspected drug use or dealing
- ü information about crime in their area

The 101 non-emergency number is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It costs a flat rate of 15p per call and connects the public to a police service centre in their local area. The number has already been launched successfully in England and Wales and is widely used.

The key reasons for introducing the 101 non-emergency number in Scotland are to:

- help keep people safe by giving them one easy-to-remember, easy to dial number for contacting the police, wherever they are in Scotland
- make the police more accessible, while reducing pressure on the 999 system
- help the police cut crime by making it easier for the public to pass on information
- support the creation of a more efficient and effective police service for the people of Scotland
- increase interoperability with England and Wales, with 101 becoming the nationally recognised nonemergency number for contacting the police across the UK

We would be grateful if you could help promote this valuable new number within your local communities wherever possible.

The public should continue to call 999 in an emergency - when a crime is in progress, when someone suspected of a crime is nearby, when a life is in danger or when violence is being used or threatened.


