GOD OF LIFE, LEAD US TO JUSTICE AND PEACE

Who could live in Kilninver or Kilmelford without being moved by the beauty and impressed by the grandeur of the environment around us? As we enter the Harvest season we are struck again by how fertile is the land and how fruitful the sea. Life and growth are all around us – something to celebrate.

Yet we are also aware of how vulnerable life is. Our hearts are broken by the tragic loss of life in Syria. Our minds are troubled by the threat of ecological catastrophe. Our spirits are disturbed by the extreme poverty which continues to be the lot of more than a billion of our fellow human beings.

It is against this background that in November 2013 the World Council of Churches will convene its 10th General Assembly with a theme which is also a prayer: "God of life, lead us to justice and peace."

The World Council of Churches was formed soon after the Second World War as a forum in which churches could confer with one another, seek greater unity and develop a common agenda. It has a good track record for being on the cutting edge of fresh thinking and challenging its member churches.

The 10th Assembly will meet in Busan, South Korea, a part of the world where the division and threat of the Cold War continues to cast a long shadow. It aims to inspire fresh urgency in the quest to care for life and seek justice.

Living in Argyll gives us a great opportunity to be sensitive to the wonder of life. Does it not then also inspire a commitment to defend life whenever it comes under threat? This is an agenda which the churches are taking to heart, with the hope that many will join them in taking it forward.

KILMELFORD CHURCH – PILOT HEATING PROJECT

The heating of Kilmelford Church, like many other small country churches that are used intermittently, causes concern both for Kirk Sessions and users. Many systems do not heat the Church to a comfortable level when they are in use and when not in use the building becomes damp which is not good for the fabric and contents. A further considerable cause for concern is the running cost of the heating system. Historic Scotland is aware of these concerns as they relate to other listed churches and buildings and is investigating means of economically heating appropriate buildings to an acceptable level. To that end Kilmelford Church has been fortunate to be selected by Historic Scotland to receive funding for an infra red heating pilot project. The project objectives are to assess the effectiveness of a new radiant system, procure and install such a system and evaluate its effectiveness over a 12 month period. A key output for the project will be Refurbishment Case Study published by Historic Scotland. In addition the funding allows for the Consulting Engineer to investigate the feasibility of installing a PV array (solar heating) in the vicinity of the Church. The installation of such an array is not funded under the grant.

The consulting engineer appointed for the project is Andrew MacOwan Associates who have advised the Church of Scotland on heating matters for a number of years.

The success of the project is not guaranteed by Historic Scotland who have stressed that the project is a pilot but there are high hopes that at least there will be a considerable improvement in the comfort levels within the Church.

The Kirk Session is delighted to have received this grant from Historic Scotland and hopes that on completion of the project it will stimulate greater attendance at services during the winter months and generally increase activities within the Church.

SCOTLAND'S PILGRIM JOURNEYS

Scotland's Churches Trust has developed a series of Pilgrim Journeys to enable visitors to travel through Scotland and through time, in the footsteps of saints and sinners. Scotland's Pilgrim Journeys are designed to connect ancient traditions with contemporary life.

The St Columba Pilgrim Journey follows a route from Ireland to Kintyre, through Argyll to Iona and on through the Great Glen to Tain and Portmahomack. This route incorporates Kilmelford and Kilninver Churches.

Travellers are able to download a free Pilgrim Passport to record their journey and experiences from the website. The Passport gives details of the locations of 'hub' churches where the Pilgrim can have the passport officially stamped to provide a memento of the journey.

Scotland's Churches Trust has chosen Kilmelford Church as a 'hub' church being approximately half way between Lochgilphead and Oban. The stamp and historical information about Kilmelford and Kilninver Churches and a leaflet about all of the Journeys are to be found in Kilmelford Church.

This initiative is an exciting development which will raise the profile of Churches on these historic routes and it is hoped will bring an increase in tourism to the areas through which Pilgrims travel.

MORAG MACDONALD - 4th August, 1920 - 6th July, 2013

Charlie and Morag MacDonald came to Kilninver, from Mull after the second world war. After a time at Raera they moved to Dairy Cottage. Charlie ran the sheep and cattle on Kilninver estate, then owned by Arthur Nicol, and Morag was in charge of the dairy. In 1968 Charlie retired and they moved to the newly built Cnoc an Daraich. Morag for a time also worked at the Tigh an Truish and at Lagganbeg. She and Charlie were enthusiastic gardeners and both at Dairy Cottage and at 3 Cnoc an Daraich their gardens were a tidy riot of colour. After Charlie's death, Morag continued to live at Kilninver until a few weeks before she died on 6th July this year, shortly before her 93rd birthday. She was a proud and devoted mother of Catriona and Iain, grandmother and great-grandmother, a constant worshipper at Kilninver, a committed member of the Fellowship, and a friend to all.

Morag was a native gaelic speaking Tirisdeach, regularly listening to the gaelic radio, and always maintaining her connections with Tiree. She had a marvellous sense of humour and with her amazing memory, which remained with her to the end, for 65 years of Kilninver history, she will be sorely missed. Her funeral at Kilninver on 13th July was attended by many friends and family.

In thanking Steve and Ruth and welcoming Andy and Gemma, it would be a good time in my text to thank all the crew for their dedication, commitment and professionalism. Make no mistake, the work of a modern operation fire station can, at times, be emotionally tough and hard work not to mention taking over your life at times. The emotional rewards, however, can be equally as great.

At the beginning of the Spring, you may remember, several large hill fires in our area some of which Kilmelford were required to attend. These kind of fires are always challenging with firefighting usually being carried out using beaters as most are too far from a road to make use of pumping appliances. A fairly quiet spell then followed but only for a short while when, in common with many parts of Argyll, we had to attend a number of road traffic collisions (RTC). These can be the most harrowing of incidents to be called to but, happily and so far, there have been few serious injuries. It has been a bad season for RTCs generally in Argyll and I would ask you to please take great care when driving on our roads.

Fund raising for the Fire Fighter's Charity has been up to the usual standard, for which I thank you, proving to the area officers of the charity, and this has been commented on at several meetings, that it's not the size of the town or village that counts but the people in it. Kilmelford is known in the Scottish Area as the small village with the big heart. This, of course, includes the population of the entire area who come and support our fund raising from Oban, Seil, Kilninver, Arduaine and Ardfern. Thank you all for your support.

For the future, we will be running our Autumn Car Wash at Kilmelford Community Fire Station on 13th. October 2013 starting at 13:00 as usual and the next Pub Quiz will be on Saturday 19th. October 2013 starting at 19:30. A slight change to the rules this time being that, due to popular demand, the teams can be of up to 6 people and not 5 as was previously the case. This is always a great night with the only casualty usually being my voice the next day.

The winter will be here soon bringing it's own difficulties with road travel, open fires being lit in our homes and dark mornings and evenings. Please take extra care so that you don't meet your local fire crew professionally and I will go and start to plan our Christmas dinner (it's just around the corner you know).

KILMELFORD COASTAL ROWING

The official launch of the club was held on Sunday, 18th August and 84 people from the community attended. Boat owners from Kilmelford Yacht Haven kindly donated £90 to celebrate the occasion. Our Minister, Ken Ross, dedicated the boat to Gill Wilkes and we toasted the boat with whisky.

The community has embraced this project with huge enthusiasm and grateful thanks go to Kilmelford Boat Yard for providing the excellent facilities for the building of the boat, to all those who gave their time and skills to build the boat, to Craobh Haven Marina for providing the life jackets, to the Cuilfail Hotel for providing a venue for fund raising events, and to all those who have donated money to make the project happen. Over £5,000 has been raised including over £500 at the Soup and Sandwich Lunch at the Village Hall and over £750 at the 60's and 70's Music Night and the Music Bingo Night, both held at the Cuilfail Hotel. Funds are still needed, a priority being insurance for the boat. Another Soup and Sandwich Lunch is planned, probably for the end of October (look out for posters with details).

We have formed a rowing club to manage the rowing and have elected a committee for this purpose. The annual fee for rowing members is £25 and children (up to 16), who are our future, are free. Children must be accompanied by a parent, not just an adult, as this would require disclosure. Life jackets are provided as are shorter oars for children.

The boat has already been used by children, women and men on a number of occasions and we are making good progress keeping in time with each other. At the time of writing women are the most regular users and are doing well. During September we have been rowing at 6.30 p.m. on Wednesdays and 2 p.m. on Sundays and anyone is welcome to join us. As the days grow shorter, the Wednesday evenings will be dropped. The boat is available for use by members by contacting the Cuilfail Hotel, time of use subject to the state of the tide and availability of a member of the committee to accompany you.

From now on the boat belongs to the Community and is yours to enjoy.

3. MATTERS ARISING from the last MEETING.

Speed Limits

The Kilmore infrastructure is in place and the speed limit is now up and running, but the Kilmelford new limit is not yet in place. However, legality is in place for the original 30 speed limit on the Kilmelford road and the signage should be up in the near future.

The Second Stage has yet to be advertised, but there are no changes to the original proposal. It then has to be advertised for any other comments and takes 8-12 weeks after advertising, (speed limit as shown in red on the plan).

Community Emergency Plan

The Equipment pack has been applied for and delivery is expected anytime. The plan is still to be drawn up. A copy of the Dunbeg Community Plan has been given to the Council and we can use this as a guide, but the whole idea is that it reflects the needs of the K & K Community. Matthew (MA) is to progress the grant for the equipment pack, but he isn't writing the plan.

There is some urgency in getting this done, in a much as no one knows when it will be needed. Still need someone to write the plan and take it on board, Matthew agreed to get grant for initial equipment, but others will possibly be needed to get the actions all pulled together.

It was suggested that the emergency pack was kept at Kilmelford, with the Village Hall as the base, however, there is no phone/WiFi at the Hall. It was suggested that use could be made of the VHF at the Boat Yard.

The whole ethos of the plan is to protect vulnerable people in the neighbourhood. We need to obtain a list of these people and ensure it is up to date.

The advice from those who have done these things before is Keep it Simple.

Need a copy of the local phone book in the kit.

How would the plan integrate with Fire / Police (police would need a copy of the plan). Looking for a champion to take it on board.

Public Right of Way at Melfort Pier

The Council have been approached to help with the claims of public right of way at the Melfort Pier. A Mr Douglas Grierson of A&B Council, who is the Access Officer, has been directed to look into the claims of a public right of way at Melfort Pier and servitudes of access. A form has been distributed to the community to seek peoples opinions and information regarding public pathways, walks etc. Send back the forms with any queries or questions to Mr Grierson who will take this matter forward through the council.

Historic Scotland - Cairn at the Back of the Village Hall

Historic Scotland have amended the documents and issued a new deed and these are held by NM and will keep in a safe place. Scottish Ministers have agreed to include land around the Cairn to preserve the land and also further remains of interest which they have included with the Cairn Land Monument. Metal detecting law has changed with regards to monuments and the land, including your own land and the operator needs to check the new laws and confirm that it is legal to detect. Detecting is policed by the Police and Historic Scotland – finders are not keepers, even if you are the landowner.

Wishing Trees

NM has received an email from a Phd Student from the University of Manchester, at Ardmaddy Estate to dig for Wishing Trees. If anyone interested in taking part or know of any other Wishing Trees, let NM know. Coins buried when wishing are excavated and this helps with the dating of the tree. This is to take place in the summer.

Accounts

Not quite correct, as they don't show the car parking fee of £1, although paid. Still waiting for a grant form for this year. NM emailed copy of accounts to council so that K&KCC can get grant for previous year. So NM has had to approve accounts with the exception of the £1 discrepancy. When Matthew back, will try to get accounts amended by the £1. Community Council Grant is for £300 and £35 discretionary payment which has now been claimed by NM.

Musdale Wind Farm

Public Exhibition invitation for Kilmore Musdale wind farm: Ford Village Hall 16th April between 1pm and 7pm, Dalavich 17th April between 1pm and 7pm, Kilmore 18th April between 1pm and 7pm Not likely to be an ordinary planning application as it will be over 50 megawatts, so it will be going through the Scottish Government, but presume will be a public meeting. Plan is for 16 turbines at a height of 130 mtrs, approx. 54.4 megawatts at Musdale. It's a major infrastructure application to the Government.

Home Care

NM has had a report through from Councillor Elaine Robertson which goes through the process and how things are done, quality control etc. Not heard of anyone in the community having a problem with their

care, but if anyone knows of anyone having problems, let NM know and he can highlight it forward (problems might be social worker or nurse not turning up for appointment). One of the things brought to NM attention is that on Luing a house is being rented for a nurse on Luing, whereas prior to that someone from Seil or Easdale used to go across as all done locally. Some time ago due to the logistic difficulties it was decided that home care would be managed by a district nurse and in conjunction with social services, and this worked very well. Problems should be reported to the care manager assigned to them if they have them, or Carrogon (care providers), or social workers or Shaun Davidson, but needs details of the problem, i.e. missed appointment and details of date and time. This process of communication needs to be put in place. Fiona Wyllie to put a note in the community newsletter.

Scottish Southern Consultation Document

NM has been given a consultation paper involving innovation for a green and more efficient future. If anyone is interested or has any comments, let NM know. Local Plan Still open for anyone to put comments in until 29th April 2013.

4. AOB

- Comment raised that on the Local Plan the hall field has been reduced in size by a rectangular / square area next to the hall. This is there to stop any obstruction to the Cairn, (which was originally erected there for navigation purposes), so there can be no obstruction in front of it, i.e. building. Representation should be made to the planners, and is it in the public domain? PDA 4008 shows all the land around the hall. The square next to the Cairn needs to be designated as an open space protection area. Plan will need submitting by NM when making application.

Barochreal Garden

Maolachy's Garden

I'm not sure what other gardeners think but I've felt this year, so far, has been one of the most challenging and yet full of surprises. The strong cold easterlies in the new year broke branches, crisped new shoots and sent the toughies like hydrangeas into a complete decline of bare dead twigs. Shrubs in the most sheltered corners being sort out and scorched by the wind. Easterlies can bring snow but even at our height it had run out its course somewhere nearer Dalmally and left the Argyll coast clear. No snow also meant less rain so the ground was wonderfully dry and easy to barrow bags full of muck for the roses and compost for the shrubs.

The first April showers watered the earth and we waited with bated breath to see how deep the frost damage had gone. The winter's good feeding paid off as shoots appeared, buds fattened, the grass grew and everything took off and soon we were staggered by the jungle like growth in what I thought were neat corners of interest in the garden.

I netted the blackcurrants for the first time to thwart the destructive bullfinches and it paid off by the well fed bushes bursting out through the top nets and growing quantities of fat juicy berries.

The tatties loved this season and crop was clean and plentiful. The beetroot, pea, beans, leeks with extra watering in the dry spells are fat, full podded and taste delicious. The tender courgettes which shivered in May enjoyed June's warm sun and are not in glut mode.

If one could predict the weather it would be easier to choose what dates to open the garden. As it turned out we were 4 weeks behind this year so the May 4th/5th weekend still had plenty of daffodils out and early azaleas on their way to book but there was definitely a feel of "wait and see". In contrast 27th/28th July was full of bursting growth everywhere and the pre-weekend tidy up was a serious amount of cutting back and hauling heaps to compost or bonfire.

Thank you to everyone who came up over the open weekends and paid kind compliments. It was good to swap garden talk and glean ideas for projects.

The tea house was as usual a source of good chatter and generous donations which brought the total to £907.50 to be divided between Kilmelford Village Hall, Erskine home and Scotland's Gardens charities.
