HOW TO TAKE FORWARD KILMELFORD AND KILNINVER COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (KKCA)

Background

Since it was established KKCA has been administered for the wider benefit of the community as an "unincorporated" charity organisation, under the auspices of the Office of the Scottish Charities Regulator (OSCR), governed by its own approved constitution through a committee of elected trustees. The rules applied by OSCR allow these unincorporated associations to be set up, continually assessed and audited at a simpler level than many of the larger and more prosperous community bodies, which have to adopt a higher degree of management control and scrutiny. A particular benefit of this particular status for us is that it makes the annual audit requirements of the KKCA accounts much quicker, less bureaucratic and less costly to complete.

Present situation

Over the years this has become a popular method by which most of the smaller rural communities in Scotland have run their community associations or groups, many of which typically involve the ownership and management of a village hall and perhaps other assets associated with it (eg. sports facilities). This arrangement has served our community well, and it is a status some community associations or groups may decide to retain. However, a number of significant legislative changes have been imposed on charities by the Scottish Government over the past 3 years, some of which may have a longer-term effect on the KKCA. One of the outcomes of this legislation has been the establishment of a form of "incorporated" organisation called a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) which is very similar to the existing "unincorporated" one, however it has a different legal status, requires a higher degree of external scrutiny and offers the means to provide a greater level of local participation in the management of local community bodies.

In summary, there are 3 broad aims behind these legislative changes:

- 1. To enable community-derived constitutions to be more flexible in adapting to future legislation.
- 2. To promote a wider level of community involvement in local charitable bodies.
- 3. To enable charitable bodies to more easily benefit from the increasing number of funds available to local communities from sources such as renewable energy, forestry and land developers.

The Way Ahead

The KKCA trustees have been considering the implications of this legislation for some time. The Chair and other trustees have attended village hall seminars sponsored by OSCR and supported by the Scottish Government at which the new legislation was presented and discussed. Having sought advice from OSCR, Argyll Voluntary Action (AVA) and other agencies, the committee now believe the time is right to future-proof our Community Association by bringing our constitution up to date and converting the KKCA into an SCIO. Therefore, AVA have been approached to provide assistance in bringing this into effect. The process of producing a revised constitution and making an application to OSCR for conversion of the KKCA into an SCIO will take a few months, so in reality it will not be in place until early 2015. Hopefully, this will allow the constitution to be endorsed at the 2015 AGM.

What does this mean?

The legislation behind these changes can be a bit baffling, and some people may ask why should we change to an SCIO if the current status of the KKCA has worked well. There is a very useful guide to the different types of charitable organisation on the OSCR web site, however in simple terms the community will not see any difference in the way the village hall is run or the trustees carry out their business on behalf of the community. If there is one significant difference an SCIO will bring, it will be in providing a more structured means of enabling people to participate in the running of our community association, should they wish to do so.

Of course, more information will be promulgated as things develop. In the meantime, the following points are provided to show what it will mean to the KKCA:

1. The existing Scottish Charity number, tax, rateable values, insurance status and nil band community charge for the village hall will be retained.

- 2. To avoid confusion with "unincorporated" bodies that remain, the name of the KKCA will have to be changed to include "Incorporated Organisation" (eg name of bank account etc).
- 3. The changes to the constitution will largely be aimed at bringing it in line with new legislation, however a requirement of an SCIO is that its constitution should also incorporate a Code of Conduct.
- 4. As well as an annually-elected governing committee of Trustees (as exists for the KKCA), an SCIO also allows for people in the community to join a "Register of Members". This involves a very simple localised "registration" process, and once on the Register members of the community may attend and provide a "vote" (if the need arises) at meetings, and offer themselves for posts or as general members of a committee. It also allows for "Members", with or without Trustees, to form a sub-committee, if there is a need to establish one for a particular purpose. Those who do not wish to join the Register of Members may of course continue to provide input to the SCIO through a Trustee, and may attend the AGM, but would not have a direct "vote" as such.

LIFE AFTER THE REFERENDUM

At the time of writing, we are within a week of the Referendum which seems likely, one way or the other, to be a watershed in Scotland's modern political history. I hope that when we look back on the campaigns we will feel that there is much of which to be proud.

At a time when we were supposed to be living in a cynical age where people were politically apathetic, there has been passionate intensity to the debate as people of all ages and backgrounds have engaged with the issues. The sense that responsibility is ours and that it is up to us to shape our political direction is something that I welcome and which I hope we can sustain.

I have been particularly impressed by how vigorously many people have been committed to thinking

things through for themselves. The "democratic intellect" in Scotland is not dead yet. In fact, it appears to be reviving and taking new forms. This is something that is full of promise for our future.

At the same time, the intensity and vigour of the debate do carry certain risks. Inevitably, given the binary nature of the choice in the Referendum, it has been divisive. Division can lead to ill feeling and it would not be realistic to imagine that we would get through such a process without some strong words being exchanged. Nonetheless, in terms of struggles for independence Scotland's must be one of the most peaceful ever – something else of which we can be justly proud.

The church has had a lot of experience of handling division. Read the Epistles of the New Testament and you will find that from its earliest days the church was riven by splits, factions and intense debates. On the positive side, this is a sign of life. It shows that people care passionately about their faith – how it is lived and expressed. At the same time it poses a challenge – how will people with different views be able to remain one community?

One answer is found in humility. As Oliver Cromwell once put it to some dogmatically-minded Scots: "I beseech you by the bowels of Christ, think it possible you may be mistaken." Human finitude is such that it is always possible we might be wrong – worth remembering that. Another answer is found in love – and specifically the kind of love that unites us not only with PLU (people like us) but with those who see things very differently. The church has been at its best when it has been humble and loving. Can I commend these qualities as we emerge from the excitement of the Referendum?

FEEDBACK ON BT COMPLAINTS

Thank you to all those of you who returned the feedback slip that was enclosed with the last newsletter. I'm afraid I didn't get round to collating the information and writing to BT as soon as I should have (busy summer). However, I wrote to BT last month and, amongst other things, asked for a definitive answer as to when the infrastructure serving Kilmelford and Kilninver will be upgraded to an acceptable standard – this appears to be the only solution to our problems. KILMELFORD COMMUNITY FIRE STATION

Well September is upon us and I hope you enjoyed Summer. It has been a busy time getting used to the single Scottish Fire and Rescue Service which replaced the 8 F&RS that used to cover Scotland. It has, however, been a quiet year for turnouts at Kilmelford but some of the jobs we have had were challenging and required all our training. This Spring was the first in my memory that we were not called out to any hill fires. I think the ground was so wet from the weeks of rain at the start of the year that nothing would burn. All good news, however, as every time we turnout it means someone is in need of assistance or in peril, so that can only be a good thing. Our latest recruit, Firefighter Gemma MacCowan has now completed her basic training, her Breathing Apparatus training and the first of her live fire training and is now a "turnout ready" member of our fire crew. The addition of Gemma, once again, brings our compliment of 10 back up to full strength.

This will be my last full year as Crew Commander at Kilmelford. *Tempus fugit* as they say and next year I will be 60 so will be hanging up my helmet and boots. 2014 has been a really great one for me having

been nominated for the Daily Record "Our Hero" awards held in Glasgow and "Firefighter of the Year" at the UK wide Spirit of Fire awards in London. I was judged to be a runner up at both these events but, third time lucky, I, together with Firefighter Gareth Strang from Oban Community Fire Station, have been successful in receiving the Brave@Heart award from the First Minister at a ceremony to be held in Edinburgh Castle in October. Gareth and I provided immediate trauma care for a road accident victim whilst off duty and travelling home from work in July 2013. Our intervention was highlighted by the attending *Helimed* Doctor who contacted the fire service to confirm that our intervention had directly prevented a tragic outcome at the scene. We were both happy enough to see the people we had helped up and about but are pleased to accept our awards as the "icing on the cake" and you know how much firefighters like cake !!

Our car wash in Spring was the usual success with our regular "washees" plus some new "customers" and we have been running our usual Pub Quizzes in Cuilfail Hotel, with the generous assistance of Simon and Yvonne, all of which were well supported by many locals and visitors. Watch out for dates for the up and coming Autumn Car Wash and Pub Quiz which will be advertised in the usual way. Our fundraising total for the Fire Fighter's Charity (FFC) will be boosted this year by one of the crew Firefighter Ross Stewart who will be climbing Ben Nevis in fire kit on 14th. September, with a small but beautifully formed support team to ensure he makes it to the top, all in aid of the FFC. If you wish to donate to this feat there are sponsor sheets in Cuilfail Hotel and at the Fire Station on a Thursday evening (even if you are reading this after the 14th it isn't too late). KILNINVER AND KILMELFORD COMMUNITY COUNCIL APPROVED MINUTES

Tuesday 10th June 2014, at 8pm, Kilmelford Village Hall

A note of thanks was proposed for retiring Louise Glen Lee for her contribution to the K&KCC.

1. DECLARATIONS of INTEREST.

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2. SGC & JMcA KFF proposed fish farm.

3. MINUTES of MEETING 8th April 2014 were approved as a true and accurate representation of the meeting. Proposed by NM, approved by AM and seconded by AD

4. MATTERS ARISING from the last MEETING.

<u>BT Phone Number</u> No further comments regarding telephone number for Open reach given to them by Elaine. Number was distributed and down to individuals to pursue.

<u>Road Signs</u> The Tourist sign in the Village still no word from A&B Council on re-location. The 30 mph sigh in the gateway. Land owned by Shian . When she has been approached let Cllr E Robertson know the outcome.

<u>A: Community Emergency Plan</u> JMcA gave an outline of where he currently is. He's using the information provided by Nigel and the examples from other councils, so to follow what other councils have done already.

There will be 4 sections:

- Section 1: Aims and Objectives of the Action Plan, it's a live document and should be updated and reviewed every year

- Section 2: What Are the Risks for the Community, what could happen that would cut the community off. Scenarios are fallen trees, flooding, landslips, long term loss of power.

- Section 3: What Resources does the Community have in the event of being cut off? Do we have use of a generator? Matthew Anderson has emergency packs, e.g. high viz jackets. A list of contact numbers for emergency services needs to be drawn up. Still need to research if we have any doctors or nurses locally or trained 1st Aiders (mentioned that most staff at the fish farm are trained first aiders now), and anyone who has skills or equipment, e.g. forklifts, tractors, 4x4 etc., who would be prepared and available to help in the event of a crisis, i.e. a bad tree falling storm.

- Section 4: How would an operation be coordinated? Would the Village Hall be the operations centre, food/hot drinks, accommodation, problem solving and pointing in right direction. Hopefully have a draft ready in time for next meeting. How will the plan be made available? Website? Village notice board? Printed booklet? Laminated details for homeowners (to put on a fridge for example). JMcA stressed that the most important thing is that we look after each other. So whether we send a card round with the fact that we've got an action plan. JMcA suggested that a list of vulnerable people is not put together, as updating the list would be onerous. Suggested that people voluntarily perhaps put forward their details if they felt they would need help in a situation of crisis. Also suggested that holiday cottages are included in making sure the information (emergency numbers etc.) is available.

<u>B: Proposed Fish Farm – South West Shuna</u> SGC updated the floor and the Council on the developments of the application. Since the planning application went in there have been various comments from stakeholders. The most significant comment was from the Hebridean Wales and Dolphin Trust and after discussions KFF Ltd have decided no to use any ADD's and KFF Ltd have revised their predator control plan. SGC & JMcA then left the room. AM read out an email from Jane Rentoul in support of the farm proposal.

The floor was in favour of the proposal. The CC agreed with the proposal 2 against, 3 in favour and supports the application. An email will be sent to Richard Kerr to this effect. There was a discussion about the cumulative effect of the number and size of fish farms in the area and whether Marine Scotland is monitoring this. Thanks from the floor for Stuart's openness with his presentation. SGC and JMcA were re-admitted to the meeting and NM advised SGC the CC had no objections to the proposal and in fact was supported.

C: Celtic Sea Wind Farm

Planning have advised them to withdraw the application and revise their plan and come back with a smaller turbine.

There's an exhibition about Argyll and Southern Highlanders 8th Battalion which will visit main branch libraries. Possibly look into the names on the war memorial and get some history of that. G Dalton was asked if she could, look into this further and research the history of those who died in the war and their families. There will be a big event on 20th Sept, commemorative service, military bands etc. It was confirmed the war memorial is in good condition and was repaired by council a few years ago. In Kilninver church there is a full list of everyone who went to the 1st WW, whether they died or not.

Police Scotland – Monthly Report

There were 566 incidents, resulting in 116 crimes. If anyone interested, drop Nigel an email and he will forward the report. There are some phone numbers, particularly Roads and Lighting Faults - 01546 605514. Might be useful for blocked roads or accident on road. Alternative routes around Oban. these types of routes are unsuitable for camper vans and caravans, and that perhaps signs at the Kilmelford and Dalavich end of the road could indicate this.

ARDUAINE GARDEN

A couple of weeks without rain is a fairly serious problem for us at Arduaine. The garden is not equipped to deal with drought and the plants themselves rely on regular doses of rainfall to keep going. Normal rainfall patterns make us complacent - we tend to plant at any time as we can rely on the odd shower to keep things moist. At the moment we're having to water recent plantings with a can, which is rather slow as you can imagine! I'm told that rain is on the way so I'll try to believe it!

The warm dry weather has been good for the visitors, of course, and people have been delighted at the number of plants in flower in the borders in the last few weeks. There's really no excuse for flowerless borders in September and October as there's good range of perennials and shrubs to continue on from the summer flowering. As I write in mid-September there are many beautiful plants flowering; from memory and to save going for a walk down the Long Border, we have Japanese anemones, *Chelone obliqua*, *Eupatorium maculatum*, *Schizostylis coccinea* and its cultivar 'Mrs Hegarty, *Nerine bowdenii* and several cultivars thereof, *Strobilanthus attenuata*, several *Sanguisorba* species, *Crinum x powellii*, *Tropaeolum speciosum*, several *Kniphofia* species and cultivars, a number of asters, various *Crocosmia* cultivars, loads of *Agapanthus*, *Acanthus spinosus*, *Morina longifolia*, *Eucomis* cultivars, *Helianthus decapetala* and *H*. 'Lemon Queen' – I must stop as it's beginning to sound just a boring list. There are also various *Hydrangea* cultivars still in flower, of course, both *macrophylla* and *paniculata* – sorry, I promised to stop! But the point of it all is that there's a huge number of plants of all types which can light up the garden in late summer and autumn, helped, of course, by some sunshine.

We're hoping to make some changes in these borders this autumn, taking out some of the rampant plants and encouraging the more spectacular and possibly less vigorous, trying to make more of plants with special characters. There are a lot of pushy thugs about; sometimes it's not easy to tell until they really get going. Many invasives have started off as 'interesting new plants'!

Phytophthora ramorum is still very high on our list of worries, although we've had no new infections in the shrub collection for some time now. The larches continue to be a concern, though by this time of year, when the needles are beginning to colour, it's hard to identify symptoms and we'll have to wait until spring to renew the regular inspections.

All-in-all, a season of mixed fortunes, variable weather and many weeds! It's a rare season when we get any hoeing done, but we have done this summer!

Do come down to see what's going on. Our reception closes at the end of September but the garden is always open, and tickets for both NTS members and non-members will be available from the Loch Melfort Hotel.
