NOTES FROM ARDUAINE GARDEN

As I write early in November the rain is bucketing down; observant readers may recall this opening sentence from the last report – only the month has changed! It's the morning after Storm Abigail was supposed to hit us overnight, but a walk around the garden this morning has shown nothing untoward but heavy rain; maybe Abigail should have been name Abirain!

A sad end to an unsettled season in a way, particularly as the weather improved significantly after my last report in August. September and October were generally good – looking back over my diary I see regular 'Sunny, warm' and 'Dull, dry' and quite a few 'Dull at first, sunshine later' and on the whole we had a satisfactory autumn. This has resulted in a greatly extended flowering season and those wonderful hydrangeas which began so well back in August went on and on and on; may are still producing new flowers even now! It was likewise a great season for the fuchsias, with many flowers still out and more to come – it hasn't been cold yet though the mercury fell to zero a couple of times in October. All the late summer flowers did well – agapanthus, kniphofia, crocosmia and especially the nerines, many of which are still in good flowering condition even now. Even today a wonderful flower on the prickly bromeliad, *Ochagavia carnea*, is there to be seen on the bank above the lawn.

The mild weather has rather prolonged leaf-fall this year though, with some trees completely bare of leaves and others, such as *Magnolia campbellii*, still totally green. Oak and beech are hanging in there, as are the Japanese larches. I much prefer those years when the nights are cold, the leaves fall rapidly, and we can clear everything up and be done with it instead of raking and blowing day after day! Being open all year round necessitates this sort of continuing maintenance – we have to make sure that everything is safe every day.

I'm hoping for a reasonable winter to be able to finish a number of projects which are still to be completed, steps and paths mainly. My decision to retire at the end of February has seriously concentrated my mind and I don't want to walk away leaving unfinished work, though inevitably there are many things I would like to have done and now will not be doing. In more than twenty-three years we've made many improvements, I hope, but I have to leave something for my successor! In the meantime I'm trying to record everything I can think of for the benefit of those who come later! Many details may seem trivial now, but I often wish that I had more interesting these no doubt stories from previous owners! We're not moving far away, only to Oban, so I'm sure we'll bump into many local folk here and there!

Finally a date for your diary! Santa is coming back to Arduaine a little earlier this year – he blames parking problems for his reindeer and sleigh. He'll be at Arduaine from 1-4pm on Saturday and Sunday 5th and 6th of December. There'll be gifts for the kids and warming drinks and snacks on sale plus a fun and easy reindeer hunt – sorry, not with real reindeer! Entry for children will be £3, free for accompanying adults if they bring their grandparents with them!

Well, after some wonderful hail storms this morning the sun is shining brightly through the office window, so that's it for this issue. I hope that some of you might make it down the path to the garden over the winter - we'd love to see you. We'd love to have more interaction with the local community generally too, so if you have anything to say, offer or ask, do get in touch.

MINUTES OF MEETING - TUESDAY 11 AUGUST 2015

8 p.m. KILMELFORD VILLAGE HALL

Present: Nigel Mitchell (NM); Antoinette Mitchell (AM); Jane Rentoul (JR); Colin Clark (CC); Annie Delap (AD); 5 members of the public. In attendance: Councillor Elaine Robertson (ER)

1. APOLOGIES - Councillor Duncan MacIntyre; Constable Jeremy Moore; Keiron Green (Jamie McAndrew was unavoidably detained at work and unable to advise of this as out of mobile phone range.)

2. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST - There were none.

3. AGREE MINUTES OF AGM OF 9th June 2015 - Item 6. Election of Officers for 2015/2016. Penultimate line: alter "We have six members at present" to "We have seven members at present."

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MEETING HELD 9th June 2015 - AM proposed and CC seconded that the Minutes were a true and accurate representation of the meeting.

5. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE LAST MEETING

a) **Carraig Gheal Community Fund** - A further meeting is proposed for August. Treasurer (SGC) to advise NM of bank details and proposed method of distributing funds.

b) Street Numbering Glebe Kilmelford - ER has spoken to Graham Stone who agrees it is a good idea and has the matter in hand.

c) **Community Council Elections** - 17 August Nomination papers available. 3 September 4 p.m. Close of Nominations. 8 October Election Day. 9 October Count of Votes. If there is more than one candidate, which would bring the Council up to full strength of eight members, there will be an election.

Discussion took place regarding ways of attracting people to serve. Georgina Dalton reported that she had approached around 12 people to encourage them to come forward and suggested they attend this evening to get a flavour of meetings but disappointingly none had attended. The meeting was grateful that Iain Bark offered to put himself forward. NM reaffirmed his wish that members on the Community Council take on more of the duties which he alone performs. He is prepared to offer advice and assistance but does not wish to continue with the heavy workload as at present. It was agreed that a meeting of the community councillors would be held subsequently in order to discuss this matter. Holders of present posts would remain in place for now.

d) Public Consultation on Ward Boundaries - ER stated that this is a huge issue and of grave concern to everybody. The Scottish Government has reduced the number of councillors representing us from 4 to 3 in order to increase the number in Dunoon from 3 to 4 as it is designated a deprived area. This decision is not negotiable. Removing a councillor will place a much greater burden of work on the remaining three, not only concerning the geographical spread involving lengthier and more timeconsuming travelling but compromises the two levels at which all councillors function, namely strategic and local. It would inevitably mean less time for contact with local people. Of further very serious concern is that the Scottish Government has decided that we will no longer be in Ward 5 Oban North and Lorn but moved to Ward 3 Mid-Argyll and administered from Lochgilphead. The concerns are many: Oban is our natural hub, is the administration centre for us, and our services come from Oban, along with our Area Committee. All this will be centred on Lochgilphead if the change goes ahead and local links built up over many years will be broken. It was stressed that socially, culturally, commercially and historically we have always had stronger links with Oban than Lochgilphead and to change that would be a very disturbing development to the community as a whole. It was observed that the Scottish Government policy is to support rural communities and enable them to flourish. Removing a councillor, expanding the ward boundary and transferring us to Mid Argyll is flying in the face of such a policy. This is a matter for individuals to address and express their concern - it is not just a community council matter. There is a booklet available describing these changes which is available from NM by email: Nigel@themitchells.co.uk or phone: 01852 316151. Discussion took place regarding how to inform people and spread the word as widely as possible so that individuals respond, rather than the community council. Suggestions were: Piece in the September Kilninford Newsletter, flier to be delivered in our area - by post or volunteers, possible meeting to be addressed by Argyll & Bute Council officer or Kieron Green who has taken a great interest in this matter, encouragement of discussion and of people to submit their views to the Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland. 2 ER undertook to find out if a consultation form was available at Albany Street. If not, we would create our own and encourage people to make their views known as weight of numbers would count. The consultation period ends on **Thursday 22nd October**.

Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Emergency Action Plan

As we are now into the time of year when our weather can be somewhat changeable and challenging, it is a good time to make the community aware of the Emergency Action Plan (EAP). Argyll and Bute Council asked local communities to create a plan to show how they would cope in an emergency situation if they were cut off from the emergency services. As a result, most communities now have a plan in place to deal with such situations and Argyll and Bute council achieved an award for its work.

Some communities have chosen to create an extensive plan of how they would deal with everything from hurricanes to flu endemics. It was agreed by the Community Council that for now the document would be best suited if it was kept simple and highlighted the important aspects of looking after each other and making the community aware of what resources we have in our area to deal with such emergencies.

The plan is broken into 4 sections:

- Aims and objectives of the plan
- A brief risk assessment
- A list of some of the resources which may be available in an emergency
- Plan for the co-ordination in such an event

The plan highlights the importance of looking after our neighbours and the vulnerable members of the community. Some of the most helpful features of the plan are the map of our area on the front page and the list of resources which includes contact numbers. At its December meeting the Community Council will be issued with a pack including high visibility waistcoats and torches.

Copies of the EAP will be distributed to local businesses, Community Councillors and anyone else who wishes to receive a copy.

WINTER WILDLIFE

We are now into December and many of us will be looking forward to the festive period and the overindulgence that invariably comes with it. But whilst we are putting weight on in our warm cosy houses, just outside our door the wildlife that has chosen to winter here, are fighting the elements just to survive. If we are cold we can turn up the heating or put another log on the fire, and go to the cupboard for a snack when we are hungry. Our wildlife does not have this luxury. Many birds will have flown south for the winter, including most of our summer garden birds, and they have been replaced with birds that have flown in from the north and east. Some from as far as the Arctic and Scandinavia others from Central Europe in the hope that winter will be kinder here. But no two winters are the same, even if the weather is not severe they still face a major challenge. All their winter food is harder to find and there is much less of it. The winter daylight hours are down to about a third of the summer daylight hours. So our diurnal creatures have to find a reduced food supply in much less time. This is made even more desperate because the cold winter weather requires a higher intake of calories just to keep the body temperature normal.

They may have to withstand frosts that freeze their food and drinking water. Snow that hides their food and gales and rain that make life more arduous and the colder and wetter it gets the more food they require just to keep warm. Many will not survive a hard winter. We can help by feeding our garden birds at this time of year and assist them get through the winter and survive until spring, the time of plenty. If you do not already feed your garden birds then here are a few ideas to help our wintering birds, and if you do decide to feed them it will not be long before they find the food and visit your feeding station daily: You can make a very simple bird table, just a tray with a raised rim to retain the food and a gap on the corner to allow rainwater to drain will suffice. This will suit most birds and most foods types. You can also use feeders to hang in trees or on sheds, fences etc.

- Peanuts are always popular and there are feeders that will hold several days worth of nuts. Good for Woodpeckers, Finches, Tits and Starling.
- Mixed seed, Sunflower seed and other seed feeders will pull in the Siskins, Greenfinches Tits etc.
- Nyger seed need a fine meshed feeder and the Goldfinches love this seed.
- Ground feeding birds, Thrush, Chaffinch, Dunnock etc will feed on the food spilt from the feeders.
- Fat balls are also a popular food for birds, avoid getting the fat balls in nets, as the birds feet and occasionally the tongue can become entangled.
- Also, if you are using feeders ensure that you put the lids on properly as birds will go in the top and can get trapped.
- In frosty weather fresh water is vital for the birds. Another tray or bowl with a rock in it will provide both drinking water and a bath.
- It is very important to disinfect the feeders, water containers and bird tables at least once a fortnight with a weak disinfectant. Ideally move your feeding station every two weeks to a fresh area.

If you are interested in wildlife photography you could make a feeding station on a trolley so you can move it around the garden to take advantage of the light and the backdrop, the birds will soon get used to their feeding station being in different places. Using a shed, or another permanent fixture as a hide works very well as the birds expect it to be there and you will be astonished how close you can get to the birds. You do not need a huge lens for this type of nature photography even a phone camera can give good results. Take some time each day just to watch the antics of the different species and encourage your children to take an interest, most of all, enjoy your garden birds. Merry Christmas!!!

VILLAGE HALL SOLAR PANELS

Three years ago I looked into installing Solar Panels on the Village Hall Roof. Of all the renewables these seem the most logical for our needs, I have looked into both wind turbines and Bio mass. The halls situation facing south with no over hanging trees and pitch of roof makes it very suitable for solar panels. Also the switchboard room is easily accessible from the roof. At the time I sort to put 40 panels the most one can have without getting into the management problems of commercial obligations. I then went to search for a grant unaware at the time that if we wanted to take the feed in tariff (FIT) for the hall I could not receive public money twice. This meant all the Funders that I have received our other grants from were unavailable to me it had to be private funding. I endeavoured to seek private funding and failed and confess I rather put the idea on the back burner while I concentrated on looking for funding to re vamp the toilet facilities and more recently the kitchen.

However, just over a week ago I received a phone call from someone in Argyll and Bute council alerting me to the fact that the FIT was being reduced from approximately 12% to 2% at the end of December 2015. At the same time I was made aware that at long last the Carraig Gheal wind farm funding had just gone on line. The maximum grant £7,000.

In discussion with other members of the hall committee it was thought if I could get the grant then 16 panels would be better than nothing. I returned to my original Solar Panel company Absolute, and they were prepared to do another survey and came up with £7,835. for 16. Whilst appreciating this is not the cheapest for panels, we have them on our barn roof and we are pleased with them, and, two other local companies I originally approached were not interested because of grants etc. Also time is brief. I have now done all the paper work and applied for this CG grant. I have made it clear to Carraig Gheal that time is of the essence and these panels need to be up and working before the end of the year.

So if by the Christmas time you see panels you know we have been successful with the Carraig Gheal grant and the following is important. If no panels then my appeal is pointless and the whole project sadly abandoned. If successful we will have to pay the additional £835 from hall funds. This would make us rather short of money so I promised Fergus our treasurer I would appeal to the Community for donations towards our solar panel funds. If time were not against us this would not be necessary, I rather pride myself in rarely having to ask the community for money for our hall projects, but this time hopefully you will see this as a worthwhile project and contribute PLEASE!
