23rd September: World stone skimming championships 2018 on Easdale Island

Easdale Island is the smallest permanently inhabited island of the Inner Hebrides. It was once the centre of a thriving Scottish slate mining industry, and one of the disused quarries forms a perfect arena for the World Stone Skimming Championships..

The championships are held every year on the last Sunday in September. Anyone of any age and any level of skill can enter. Each competitor is allowed 3 skims using specially selected Easdale slate skimming stones.

For a skim to qualify the stone must bounce at least three times – it is then judged on the distance achieved before it sinks.

Registration for the championships takes place at Easdale Island Community Hall from 10.00am until 1.00pm on the day OR when we reach a total of 350 entrants. If you would like to compete just turn up as there are no qualifying rounds.

The competition starts at 12 noon – get down to the quarry side early to avoid the queues!

On the Saturday night before the event, come and warm up at the Pre-skim Party in Easdale Island Community Hall where there will be a licensed bar, live music, and where children are most welcome. For more information: <u>www.stoneskimming.com</u>

UPGRADE TO KILMELFORD TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

If you are a BT customer you may already be aware that the Kilmelford telephone exchange has been upgraded, so you should now have a more reliable broadband connection. Where possible, BT may have been able to increase your broadband speeds. This is of wider interest to everyone, not just BT customers, as all landline subscribers are served in our area from this exchange, which is owned and managed by BT Openreach.

BT advise that it might take up to ten days to settle down as the network establishes the best possible speed for your line. You can help things along over this period by leaving your BT Home Hub on and using your broadband as much as you can during this time.

If you experience unexpected problems with your broadband or phone services, try the usual trick of turning your BT Home Hub or other router off and then on again, but if you still have problems, go to bt.com/help/broadband or call 0800 111 4567 (or 0330 123 4567 from a mobile).

The upgrade has been achieved by a combination of the new Kilmelford UAX (UHF) Mast and installation of internet-based switching and Openreach FTTC (Fibre to the Cabinet) technology at the exchange, which means speeds of 10-20 Mbps should be provided. This is a great improvement, especially for those who live at a distance from the exchange, however don't confuse FTTC with Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) which is a different, (currently unfunded) programme.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE IN LOCAL LOCHS

It's that time of year when hopefully the sun has returned to Argyll for the summer! May was a glorious month which has prompted signs to be put up around some local lochs warning of '**blue – green algae'** with messages to keep dogs, and humans, out of the water.

What is 'blue algae' and why does it mean we have to be so cautious about entering the lochs?

'Blue-green' algae is the term used to actually describe a group of bacteria called 'Cyanobacteria'. These bacteria are larger than your normal bacterial cells and grow together forming either long chains or mats.

The organisms are called algae due to their appearance in the water when the chain or mats clump together making them appear like green flakes/bundles or brown spots. Bluegreen algae are freshwater organisms, but they can also be found at the edges of sea lochs where recent rainfall has run off the land and into the loch making the water less saline.

In the right weather conditions these cells can multiply rapidly, they are commonly found in non-flowing water such as lakes, ponds and stagnant pools during periods of hot weather when there is little rain. In such conditions the cells will 'bloom' – increasing in numbers to dangerous levels very quickly. The blooms can look like scum on the surface of the water, or 'pea soup' if you like. They can also build up at the edges of the loch or pond where it appears to look like foam.

Blooms of blue-green algae can produce toxins (poisons), <u>for which there are no antidotes</u>. Not all blue algae are dangerous but without testing of the water it is impossible to tell, so better to stay out and be safe rather than sorry!

In the case of dogs the toxins can stop the dog's liver from functioning, exposure to these toxins is often fatal, or at the very least they can commonly cause long term health issues for the dog. The toxin build up occurs not so much through the dogs swallowing the water when swimming but most likely from the blue algae getting caught in their fur and the dog ingesting large numbers of the algae whilst cleaning themselves.

According to vet websites symptoms for dogs affected by blue algae toxins are:

- Vomiting
- Diarrhoea
- Seizures/fits
- Weakness collapse/unconsciousness
- Disorientation/confusion
- Drooling
- Breathing difficulties

These symptoms can be linked to lots of other conditions but if you know your pet has been in lochs or pools during hot weather the advice is to call your vet and say that you are concerned about blue-green algae toxins. The vet will most likely flush your dog's system by inducing vomiting. For us (humans) a toxin build up is rarely fatal, but it has been known, affecting the liver function in just the same way as with dogs. For us symptoms are more likely to be:

- Skin rashes
- Sickness
- Stomach pains
- Fever
- Headaches

Children will be more at risk than adults.

Algae numbers and the type of algae will vary throughout the summer months meaning that the water may not always be harmful, but it is best to be cautious. If you see signs at your local loch advising you keep out, please don't ignore it!

MAKING A DIFFERENCE – SEED FOR LIFE

The calling of the church is to be very local yet utterly global. It puts down its roots and grows in local soil but it can never become narrow or parochial. Always it is called to look outward, recognising it is part of a global community of faith and that the needs of the world are close to its heart.

In 2011 this prompted our churches in Kilninver and Kilmelford, along with the wider network of churches in Netherlorn, to form a partnership with a congregation at Bemvu in Malawi. Making a link with one particular place, in a very different context to our own, was one way of expressing that global identity.

The partnership built up slowly, sometimes with long gaps between communications at first. One thing that became apparent was that the Primary School was central to life at Bemvu and it was a great boost when the Kilninver and Craignish Primary Schools began to make connections with their counterpart school in Bemvu.

Meanwhile it became apparent that some of the smallholder farmers at Bemvu were struggling as they could not afford the agricultural inputs needed for successful crops. A Harvest Fund was started and it became possible to supply fertiliser to 40 smallholders, many of them grandmothers who were bringing up their grandchildren single-handed after their parents had died of AIDS.

A major step forward came with the visit of Dikirani Gwaza and Sydney Hambeyani to our parishes in 2016. Spending time with them led to deep friendships being formed. It also spawned new ideas.

When we learned that some children who did well at Primary School were not able to continue to Secondary School because they could not afford the fees, this prompted the formation of a Scholarship Fund. Now there are 20 children attending Secondary School on the strength of a small scholarship funded by generous folk in Argyll.

Food scarcity at Bemvu was a major source of concern when Dikirani and Sydney were visiting and this prompted a still more ambitious effort – a project that has become known as Seed for Life – Feed for Life (<u>http://www.seedforlife.org.uk</u>). This is a microfinance project – it supplies small loans to 126 farmers to enable them to purchase high-quality seed and fertiliser. From the resultant yield they repay their loan, contribute to provision of school meals and keep some of the produce to feed their own families.

25 June 2018 was the big day when school meals were served at Bemvu Primary School for the first time. It is well known that hungry children do not learn well at school. The provision of a nutritious meal each day can be transformative. Now the challenge will be to keep up supplies to enable this to be delivered.

Meanwhile friendship continues to develop with smartphone technology enabling a steady stream of communication between both churches and schools. Still, you can't beat spending time together and from 30 June to 16 July 2018 Jane King and Jenny Fothergill are visiting Bemvu. They have gone laden with gifts for church and school, already they are receiving amazing hospitality and we can look forward to the partnership moving on to another level when they bring their experience back.

On a global scale this initiative is very small. But better to light a candle than curse the darkness. And there are many households in Bemvu for whom it is making a big difference. We might be small communities in this part of Argyll but here is one way in which we can look out to the wider world and play our part in making it a better place.



NEWS FROM KILMELFORD COMMUNITY FIRE STATION



As I write this today the sun has come back after a few days rest following the 7 weeks of virtually all dry and sunny weather. Great news for most but for the fire service it means an increase in wild fires. Thankfully there have only been a couple in this area so far this year (he said touching wood) but huge hill and forest fires occurred in Skye, Torridon and other parts of the Highlands. Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) will always attend to these fires but it would be so much better and safer for our firefighters if they did not occur at all. Many wildfires start by events like carelessly discarded cigarette ends, camp fires etc. and, sadly, deliberately putting Firefighters, members of the public and their property at risk. As the weather settles to days of sunshine again SFRS asks you all to be vigilant and help prevent these wildfires.

In the near future Kilmelford will be one of only two station in Argyll to run with a Rapid Response Unit (RRU) which will carry various pieces of specialist equipment "Cold Cut" lance, cutting equipment for use at road traffic collisions, water rescue gear, breathing apparatus and other bespoke equipment to enhance the capability in our area allowing SFRS to respond to the ever changing demands on a modern fire and rescue service.

THE SLATE ISLAND CENTRE. ELLENABEICH, EASDALE, SEIL ISLAND

Truly outstanding Natural Beauty, and much, much, more.

For two centuries, the natural attractions of Easdale have attracted and delighted visitors. The sea and landscapes are outstanding: with neat, white, conservation villages on each side of the water. Seek out the fast-vanishing industrial history, now peaceful, romantic and fascinating in its decay. Easdale is indeed very special.

A memorable attraction.

The Slate Islands Heritage Centre, in Ellenabeich, on Seil, is an easy and accessible place to be both entertained and informed. Wildlife, history and human stories are depicted in wonderful photographs, and displays. Military, marine and agricultural artefacts abound. Run by the Scottish Slate Islands Heritage Trust, it's very professionally laid out and beautifully maintained: entirely staffed by dedicated local volunteers. The Trust is supported only by donations from satisfied visitors, with no charge for entry. Typical reactions from visitors include surprise, fascination, generosity and delight. Housed in just one of the quarry worker's cottages, this little place has enormous appeal, and a huge welcome.

They Roofed the World

Easdale lies some eight miles south west of Kilninver via the beautiful and ancient, higharched "Bridge over the Atlantic" to Seil Island. The little passenger ferry runs to Easdale Island from Ellenabeich, about three and a half miles after the famous bridge. Here on Seil the old Easdale Piers, most no longer in use, were used by the passenger steamers and cargo ships that served both Seil and Easdale Islands. Thus the name "Easdale" spread to both sides of the narrow channel. Eventually slates from all the quarries, on all the Scottish Slate Islands, bore the Easdale brand. Those cargoes, exported worldwide, fed the expansion of the Empire overseas, and the growing industrial cities of Britain: Indeed, "The Islands that Roofed the World".

The long standing appeal of Easdale.

The worlds first commercial passenger steam ship, The Comet, was featured in the 1820 timetable of regular services to Easdale. Such was the importance of the Slate Islands. (An interesting item in the recent Kilninford News describes the sad loss of PS Comet). Those early holiday visitors probably inspected Easdale largely from the deck of their ship: slate quarrying was enormously black and noisy. Today it's very different: all is peaceful and relaxing: but it's not dull. Boat trips run from the pier, and there are is a variety of food, drink and shopping. Visitors can enjoy both good facilities and tranquillity, while enjoying these fascinating islands. The secret is to visit both sides of the water, allowing plenty of time to enjoy the Slate Islands Heritage Centre.

THE CHAPEL AT KILCHOAN

St. Comghan's Chapel "has been conceived as a symbol of unity, for our common destiny, open to all."

On the 18th of July 2018 the inauguration of the new Chapel at Kilchoan takes place.

The chapel was built by the new owner of Kilchoan estate, Nicolas Ibañez Scott. He is one of three brothers of Chilean descent whose great-grandmother came from Glasgow, hence the name Scott. In the Spanish custom, the female name is placed at the end of the surname.

The brother's father had created businesses including a chain of supermarkets. When he died, the eldest son inherited the family estancia, being more interested in herds and crops. The younger brothers ran the supermarket chain. This, in recent years, and nearing retirement age, they sold to the US company Wall-mart. The consequences are that managing their investments has become a considerable task.

The middle brother studied at Edinburgh University, where he met and married a Scottish girl. As a result, Nicolas visited and fell in love with Scotland, its history and its beauty. He became particularly enthusiastic about Edinburgh with its traditions of the Scottish Enlightenment and the Isle of Iona, the cradle of Columban Christianity.

Already having Highland Cattle in Chile, Nicolas was keen to acquire a farm or estate where he could establish a fold in Scotland and also re-establish his Scottish roots. In June 2015 he visited the Royal Highland Show where he was impressed by the bulls on display. He also visited Edinburgh Castle, where he was much moved by the very touching little Chapel of St. Margaret. Built on solid rock on the crown of the Castle, the chapel is the oldest surviving building in Edinburgh. The Chapel has been traditionally held to have been used by Margaret, Queen of Malcolm III, known as *Caen Mor*, King of Scots, yet was likely erected in the early 12th century (eleven hundreds) by Alexander I or David I Kings of Scots.

For Nicolas, it is possible that these experiences to some extent coincided with the small and extremely beautiful, if time-worn, estate of Kilchoan coming onto the market. The place had been held by the Henderson and then the related Keate family for just under a century. Up to the late 19th century it had been a part of the lands of the Campbells of Melfort who had acquired it from the original MacLachlans, known for their Gaelic scholarship. The Campbells of Melfort were granted lands about Caenlochmelfort in the fourteen hundreds. Their descendant Rory Campbell-Gibson recently sold some of his lands on the north side of Loch Melfort to Nicolas, so extending the lands of Kilchoan.

There used to be a Chapel at Kilchoan, founded by monks from Iona. The very name 'Choan' evolved from the early Christian Chomgain or Chomghan, making allowances for the difference between Gaelic spelling and English pronunciation. Chomghan (Choan) had likely founded a contemplative community in the era of Celtic spirituality, less organizational and more freely spiritual than what would follow. In his day, the seaways were the highways, there being no roads, only tracks in the Highlands, so he was not in isolation.

Nicolas' deep interest in cattle, the beauty and history of Kilchoan, and his finding St. Margaret's Chapel remarkable, may all have came together to make the purchase of these lands attractive. Certainly a core influence on him must have been his visits to lona from where he took the style of architecture also found at St. Margaret's.

An Edinburgh architectural firm with local connections (a partner being half brother of Colin Lindsay MacDougall of Lunga) was commissioned to produce a replica of St. Margaret's on the shores of Loch Melfort at Kilchoan. The young project architect was Neil McAllister, originally from Glasgow. Neil had previously worked with the chosen contractor, Ardle Construction from Perthshire, due to their experience in restoring historic buildings with traditional methods. Creating such a building from ground up today is extremely rare.

Sited close to the shore, the floor level had to be raised to allow for the sea level now rising by 25 mm (an inch) each decade. At Kilchoan, in addition to the St. Margaret's model, the north side entrance is protected by a porch in the Norman Style and a Scots-style Kirk belfry has been set on the apse gable. One of the stone masons was local craftsman Ben Weaser. Hugh McFarlane of Oban set the rafters. The estate has employed more local people on other buildings.

The plan of the Chapel is simple and consists of three spaces; a square porch, a rectangular nave and a semi-circular sanctuary. The stone-vaulted interior has the rectangular nave (the main space for the tiny congregation) opening traditionally at the east end through a chancel arch to an apsidal sanctuary. The Apse is a half moon curved bay beyond the arch and with a half-dome stone vaulted ceiling Although there are great pine rafters above the stone vault over the nave to carry the slated roof, and the porch is ceilinged in oak, all else in the building is mainly of granite from the Tormore quarry on Mull, with the carved stone vaults, quoins and arches being of Forth sandstone. The walls are massive masonry.

There is much symbolism, making use of numbers; three for the Christian Trinity of Father Son and Holy Spirit, and seven for the Creation and Sunday rest. The chancel arch in Norman style is built with a keystone, symbol of the Christus, according to the gospel of Matthew, with six stones each side of it as the twelve apostles. The Romanesque Norman chevron pattern over the chancel arch has with it the Celtic Key pattern.

The stained glass windows, specially made for the chapel, depict concepts of St. Margaret herself, welcoming you in the porch, and moving up the nave, St. Kentigern, St. Columba and St. Comghan. Behind the massive altar stone the east window of the apse depicts Mary, known in Christian iconography as 'Mother of God' and holding the Christ Child.

Nicholas' vision for Kilchoan reflects his passion for the beauty of the setting, its history and natural evolution. He has a strong desire to understand, reinvigorate and celebrate the landscape and to create an enduring sense of peace.

Message from Mary Phillips, Practice Manager, to all Easdale Medical Practice Patients:

"Thank you for all your efforts and correspondence to the powers that be.

We have had no formal notification of any changes proposed however we believe that there is some reconsideration going on, thanks we are sure to the volume of correspondence and interest from all Easdale Medical Practice Patients.

Dr. Alan McDevitt Chair of the BMA's (British Medical Association) Scottish GP committee who negotiated the New GP Contract and who has been writing letters to the Oban Times, phoned the surgery in person, which is highly unusual.

The LMC (Local Medical Committee) have indicated there may be reconsideration on the use of the "Work Load Formula" for Phase 2 (in 3 years time) and The Rural GP Association of Scotland (RGPAS) have been invited to join the Short Life Working group. Both of these possible developments are positive."


NORTH ARGYLL CARERS CENTRE – OUTREACH

WWOOFING WORKS

The space we are lucky to have at Bragleenbeg has allowed us to join hosting programmes for people to come and work for bed and board. One of these is WorkAway and the other is WWOOF. For us it's been a wonderful way to welcome young and enthusiastic travellers who have pitched in on various tasks here including painting; cutting back rhododendrons; bracken & bramble clearing; cutting back rhododendrons; path-laying and pruning; cutting back rhododendrons; pond digging; stump removing; cutting back rhododendrons; wallpaper-stripping; floor sanding; cutting back rhododendrons and... you get the picture.

A quick tally shows in the last 18 months we have hosted: 15 French; 7 Austrians; 6 Danes; 5 Germans; 4 Brits; 4 Americans; 1 Belgian; 1 Israeli and 1 Hungarian. They have largely been students but also electricians; teachers; painters; shoe-makers; architects; musicians; town-planners; engineers; welders; animators and pastry-chefs. There have been plenty of adventures – but with only one broken window and one trip to A&E no real misadventures. Although there was the time a Frenchman with a fondness for Buckfast went up a hill with an American and a German. He came back alone, unwittingly and unconcernedly leaving them frantically searching all the gullies for an hour and a half until in near darkness they chanced upon a pocket with a phone signal and made a panicked call to discover the errant wanderer was sitting here with his feet up and a glass of the monks' finest.

Alongside the hard work there were a lot of large lunches and dinners – sometimes a challenge when meat-eaters, gluten-free, dairy-free and vegetarian might all be around the same table! Not to mention the only Frenchman I have ever met who didn't like cheese. He cooked us a lasagne one night – which was very kind if excruciatingly inedible.

Many of our visitors idea of – and indeed desire to see - Scotland was borne out of watching Outlander. But there were plenty with family connections who were pre-warned about midges and mud. And we think we managed to surprise & delight a few with trips to Glen Coe, Gigha, Kerrera, Morar Sands, Ardnamurchan and Craignish point. There was a participant in the Easdale stone-skimming – whose hopes and heart sank – much like his stones - on seeing the amazing Japanese skimmer's arm-twirling antics. And another who took part on spec at the Inveraray Games – coming in 5th in the 5000m and winning £15 which he promptly and generously donated to the children. One couple uttered about 8 words for their entire visit – but expressed themselves through delicious baked offerings. A young German supplanted every family member in our dog's affections for the 21 days he was here. Another self-styled, fire-loving hillbilly - proclaimed himself from Deliverance country in one breath and, fittingly, in the other revealed he regularly played with Seasick Steve. Heart-warmingly, last we heard, we can even take credit for one trans-Atlantic romance.



The fine weather over the last few months has been very welcome for garden staff, particularly after last year's washout of a summer. Last year at this time ponds and ditches were overflowing and paths were washing out after daily endless downpours. What a contrast this summer has been with hardly any rain and dry sunny weather. Ponds are very low, ditches that run almost all year round are bone dry and even the spring that provides the gardens water supply has been reduced to a trickle.

Visitors to the garden have been enjoying the cool shade of the woodland garden and the clear views over the Islands and down towards Jura from the viewpoint. Garden staff have been busy upgrading the viewpoint, winching out huge stones to create a level area and allow more visitors to enjoy the stunning view over the islands and the sea.

We have been upgrading an extremely worn out path in the cliff garden which is being resurfaced and improved. This is a tranquil part of the garden, cut through with an impressive volcanic dyke and we hope to have this section open again in July.

Work begins in September on the first main phase of the gardens Japanese Larch removal project. The presence of *Phytophthora ramorum* in some of the gardens 850 mature Japanese Larch trees that form much of the woodland garden and shelter belt, has meant that the garden is subject to a Statutory Plant Health Notice from the Forestry Commission. To comply with this all of the Larch within the garden has to be removed in case of further outbreaks which have the potential to spread the spores of *P. ramorum* to other areas. The timber from the Larch will be milled on site to produce timber for garden projects in Arduaine and other trust properties and a programme of replanting will follow on, which will remain open and accessible throughout the project. Replanting areas formally under Japanese Larch with interesting trees and shrubs from around the world will enhance the already considerable and renowned plant collection here and will see the garden enter an exciting new phase in its continual development.

Preparatory work for this project begins in July with the widening of the internal road to accommodate the transport of timber to various saw milling points within the garden. Regular visitors to the garden will notice that the lawn area above our conservatory glass house has been reduced to accommodate the construction of the new road surface and will be reinstated once the road has been completed.

Thistle camp volunteers led by Kenneth Leiper and Barry Craven helped garden staff at the beginning of May, with groups clearing the fence line at the sea, removing brambles, removing old fences and creating new access paths through the windbreak so that Larch trees in there can be accessed and removed safely. Their contribution to the maintenance of the garden is greatly appreciated by all the staff here and I would like to thank everyone for their hard work and enthusiasm. There is a lot to see in the gardens just now like yellow flowering <u>Tropaeolum polyphyllum</u> from Chile is growing through purple leaved <u>Cotinus coggygria</u> 'Grace' above the

conservatory glasshouse. Many perennials are coming into their own now with metallic blue <u>Delphinium</u> and <u>Morina longifolia</u> with its thistle like prickly leaves flowering in the long border. Yellow flowered <u>Primula florindae</u> is at its best just now on the pond edges and burns. There's also the last of the red <u>Asteranthera ovata</u> flowers scrambling on banks and climbing on Larch in the woodland.

There's always something to see here and the gardens are looking particularly stunning just now in the fine weather.
