THE BATTLE'S OVER – A NATION'S TRIBUTE SUNDAY 11 NOVEMBER 2018

Responding to Argyll and Bute Council's request in the Spring through community councils that there should be local participation in the Beacons of Light tribute marking 100 years since the end of World War 1, Kilninver and Kilmelford Community Council sent out the word that they would be taking part.

So it was that on Remembrance Sunday Fergus Gillanders, John McPhee and Jim Robb gathered at the War Memorial in Kilmelford in the dark and silence to play at **0600hrs The Battle's O'er**, watched by a gathering of 20 or so people.

At 12 noon the customary Laying of Wreaths on behalf of the Community and of the Firefighters and short service took place at the War Memorial, followed by the rest of the service in the church. This year our church bell, along with that at Kilninver church, was rung at 12:30 p.m. with others world-wide to echo the spontaneous celebration on 11 November 1918 as news spread of the armistice.

People started gathering around 6:30 p.m. in the car park in Kilmelford to witness the **7 p.m. Lighting of our Beacon of Light** which had been built that afternoon high on the hill above the village. This was followed at **7:05 p.m**. by the **Ringing of our Church Bell** by the four Edwards youngsters – Emily, Adam, Amy and Jamie. All eyes were on the Beacon as

Jamie McAndrew stood alone beside it and the poignant notes of The Battle's O'er floated down to us through the night air. The official part of the evening concluded with **Tribute to the Millions** being read out.

Our committee was delighted at the number of people who attended and enjoyed the Soup, Rolls and Home baking on offer. A collection was made for the four charities chosen by the official organisers and a total of £300 will be divided between them.

A sample of comments made verbally and on social media:

"Very emotional day" "It was a lovely tribute" "Wonderful experience, brilliant community event" "Seeing the beacon and hearing the pipes played from down in the village is something I will not forget in a long time" and "For me the beacon on the hillside and lone piper brought the day to a fitting conclusion. My wife and I along with two neighbours came from Craobh to support the lovely proceedings at Kilmelford and we were so glad we did. An emotional but joyous event and a fitting end to the day"

With thanks to all who willingly set to and supplied the wood, carried it up the hill, built the beacon, erected the tent, made soup and baked cakes and not least piped at dawn and dusk. Thanks go also to our Firefighters who stood by to safeguard the beacon on the hill. We salute all involved in contributing in any way to this unique and historic occasion.

MAOLACHY'S GARDEN

The mysteries of good compost making still haven't quite become unravelled despite attending a weekly garden course over the summer at Blarbuie Woodlands behind Lochgilphead.

Much of our discussions returned to the advised methods of making a wholesome nutritious organic material to add to our garden soil. Layering the components of non invasive root weeds, green plants stems + leaves, contents of the kitchen vegetable & fruit waste bin, grass cuttings and bags of muck are the foremost ingredients. Then there is the rough stem + stick base to allow air in at the bottom plus having the arm power to occasionally turn the whole lot over.

A helpful sign is if the mix is too wet the bin houses a variety of toads, if too dry the mice colonise and build nests and best of all, if it is heating up nicely, as it should, the slow-worms enjoy the warmth under the top cover.

The net result of all my labours to achieve the ultimate, crumbly nutritious texture having spread or dug in two bins worth was the vegetable patches producing one of the best crops of beetroot, parsnip, leeks, cauliflower, cabbages and various beans picked over the summer and some still cropping. All with good flavour.

The early summer's lack of rain kept one busy watering to plump up the tattie crop. There were few slugs, unblemished skins and all were lifted on the last day memorable dry sunny day in mid August.

September's endless damp + October's gale force winds and rain have added to the bleakest weather halting any autumnal clearing, weeding, cutting back etc. Hopefully some time over the winter these tasks can be tackled and the welcome sight of the snowdrops to brighten the new year.

After a great deal of discussion with myself, often taking place in the compost bin, I have extended my garden dates to cover more times of interest from the daffodils on to the autumnal colours which despite this horrible weather have been stunning.

CHRISTMAS – GETTING OR GIVING?

If Christmas did not exist we would have to invent it – we need something to cheer up the darkest days if the year! In fact, holding a festival at the time of the winter solstice is a custom that predates Christianity. It seems that it is something that fits with the rhythm of the year and it shows no sign of losing its appeal.

When the news of Jesus Christ began to spread in our northern climes people had to make sense of the new message in terms of what they already knew. So they began to bring Christian content into traditional customs and celebrations. While the new faith brought a challenge to some aspects of traditional life, there were others with which it seemed to be a good fit. A mid-winter festival was one of them. Light in the darkness and the giving of gifts were familiar themes but now they were employed to express the meaning of Christ's coming.

This dynamic of challenge and continuity is still playing out today. There is much in Christmas that chimes with our shared values – the joy of family life, community togetherness, the fun of celebration, a glimpse of the transcendent amidst the ordinariness of life.

Yet there is also an element of challenge. Currently there are powerful forces at work that aim to turn Christmas into a festival of consumerism – all about what we can get and what we can consume. Here the Christian faith brings a note of challenge – if we make the acquisition of material goods our primary goal we are going to lose out. In fact, Christmas points in the opposite direction – it is in giving rather than getting that fulfilment in life is to be found.

Ultimately, Christmas is a matter of celebrating the giving of God as expressed in the amazing gift of Jesus Christ. This has a new urgency as we become aware of how finite are the earth's resources. If everyone is simply out to grab what they can get there may not be a sustainable future for any of us. Christmas prompts us to live generously – and this may hold the key to our common future.

DO WE NEED A "COMMUNITY BENEFIT COMPANY"?

If we do NOT want to enhance our environment, facilities and village life

- then no we do not!

If however we wish to raise money, receive grants and accept donations for Community projects and benefits then it is becoming more and more necessary (and be more likely to be successful with applications) to do this via a Community Benefit Company.

Many Communities have already established Community Benefit Companies and have acquired land, woodlands, property, built Hydro schemes and even built a school (Strontian) as well as a multitude of other projects large and small.

There are several potential projects within our Community area such as the purchase of Glenmore Hill, enlarged car park at Hall, land for a children's' play area, some sports facilities and more; perhaps providing employment and even housing opportunities.

Grants and Loans from Government, the Council, Scottish Land Fund, the Lottery, charities and other organisations mostly require their funds to be channelled through an independent Community Company.

I have already had preliminary meetings with organisations which have been set up to aid the formation of Community Benefit Companies or Development Trusts and they are keen to help.

In order to establish one we need the agreement of 50% of the community and we intend to gauge the level of support and to ask for volunteers for a Steering Group to formulate a Community Action Plan.

Please don't turn the page and think, "Someone else can step forward to do that". Input from the community is needed now!

By the time you will be reading this the colder darker nights will have set in but our new Rapid Response Unit (RRU) will be "On The Run" one of only 2 such vehicles in Argyll vastly increasing the specialist capabilities of the Firefighters at Kilmelford. There are still vacancies at Kilmelford Community Fire Station so if you wish to join the crew and do something really special and worthwhile for your community, come along to the fire station on a Thursday night between 19:00 and 21:00 and speak to "THE GAFFER" Crew Manager Donald Smith or any member of the crew at any time for further details.

WINTER SAFETY

Get ready for winter. Make sure you have working smoke alarms.

If you wish to have a Home Fire Safety Visit Call 0800 0731 999 Text 'FIRE' to 80800, talk to your local Firefighters or me.

If you're tired or have been drinking you will be less alert to the signs of fire, more likely to fall asleep and less likely to wake up if a fire does start, particularly if you don't have working smoke alarms in your home. Cooking or smoking and alcohol can be a recipe for disaster with smoking being one of the main contributory factors to causing deaths or serious injury from fire.

FESTIVE SAFETY TIPS

*Check your smoke and heat alarms are working. Replace batteries if necessary. *If you have an open fire make sure your chimney is swept before winter. Always use a fire guard, secured in position, to protect against flying sparks from hot embers.

*Never place Christmas cards or decorations around the mantelpiece.

*Check your fairy light plugs are fitted with the correct fuse, don't overload extension leads and ensure all electrical devices are BEAB approved. Always unplug them before going to bed or leave your home.

*As with all electrical appliances, always switch Christmas lights off and unplug them before you go to bed.

*Decorations can burn easily – don't place them near lights or heaters.

*Never leave cooking unattended, especially when using hot oil.

*Take time to check on elderly relatives and neighbours this Christmas as they are at greater risk from fire, particularly if they suffer from ill health or disability.

*If you're using candles, always place them on a heat resistant surface, away from Christmas trees, cards, ribbons and other decorations. Never move a lit candle and always extinguish candles before going to bed or leaving your home.

MY DEAREST BELL

I am sorry I haven't written to you for so long but things have been pretty mad here. I was very glad to receive your last letter and am pleased to hear you are happy at your new job in the munitions factory in Bishopston, how funny to think that it is disguised as a hill, hopefully that will confuse the German bombers, you were so unhappy as a land girl, I'm sorry that didn't suit you. I know it must be hard having to travel an hour in the train to get to work, especially as it is pitch dark because of the black-out, but I know you will be brave.

We have finally arrived in Burma.

It was a VERY long, hard journey, first sailing from England to South Africa where some blighter took offence to me at a dance and broke my nose. Don't worry, it hasn't spoiled my good looks!

We then sailed to India and took a train to Burma. I nipped off the train while it was stopped to boil a kettle for a pot of tea and the train left without me, I had to run very fast to catch it and all my pals were shouting and pulled me up.

Now I am in Burma, I am an advance scout which means I have to go ahead of the normal troops to find targets for the artillery. We are alone in the jungle a lot of the time apart from the Gurkha's who go ahead of us at nights. As they pass us by, they feel for our hat badges and when they recognise that we are friends they say 'alright Tommy'. We often find trenches of Japanese soldiers with their throats cut. We are fond of our Gurkha friends.

My squad has managed to find a pet monkey, he looks very sweet but is very evil and bites everybody who tries to pat him, I think we will try to pass him onto another squad very soon.

The gossip in our regiment at the moment is about a commander, who was very unpopular to say the least. He would order his troops into very dangerous situations and then he would retreat, leaving his men to face the danger alone. The word is, last battle he was shot and killed but there is every chance it wasn't an enemy bullet that killed him.

Yesterday I managed to boil up a bit of water to have a bath as best I could in an old biscuit tin, unfortunately there was an enemy air raid in the middle of my bath and I had to run to shelter with no clothes on, I got well and truly teased by my pals. Unfortunately, I took a bit of shrapnel to my neck and I am in the infirmary at the moment but they say I should make a quick recovery.

I am happy to hear that you saw my name in the Dispatches in the London Gazette. I am not able to tell you exactly what happened but let's just say that my squad was in a bit of bother with the Japanese and I managed to get most of them to safety. There is talk of a medal.

Anyway, my dear, I am always glad to receive your letters even if they take a very long time to reach me. Think of me often as I think of you and I can't wait until I come home and I can finally make you my wife.

All my love, Harry xxx 298 3621 GAR (actg Bdr.) H. Clark began the war in the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He served in the South of England until after Dunkirk when he was moved to The Royal Artillery and The Chindits.

The Chindits, known officially as the Long Range Penetration Groups, were special operations units of the British and Indian armies, which saw action in 1943-1944, during the Burma campaign of World War II.

Harry Clark, my Great Grandfather, made it home from Burma safe and sound. Unfortunately the doctor who was inoculating the soldiers on the ship returning from India, was in too much of a hurry and didn't change needles between patients. Pappy contracted malaria from this. On his discharge from hospital he was advised to work in the open air to help with the malaria and he worked on, and managed farms after the war.

He married Bell after the war and they went on to have five children, three girls and two boys. They were devoted to each other for the rest of their lives.

One of my mums' earliest memories is sitting on Pappy's lap looking at the tattoos he got while in Burma and listening to his stories.

KILNINVER 1928 – 1968

It is exactly fifty years since my Mother, Peggy Tegner (née Nicol), sold Kilninver estate to David and Vanessa Kilpatrick. It had been owned by our family for just forty years. I first came to Kilninver on 14th August 1933 at the tender age of five weeks.

Kilninver and the surrounding farms were historically owned by the Earls of Breadalbane, whose west coast seat was Ardmaddy. Much of the Breadalbane lands was sold during the 1920s. My grandfather, Arthur Nicol, was a Glaswegian who had prospered in India, the Yukon gold-rush and various business ventures in London. In 1928 he was persuaded by his friend, Guy Mellor of Knipoch, to buy four farms, Kilninver, Barrochreal, Barnacarry and Lagganmore, for his retirement. He only told my grandmother after the event!

Kilninver House was at that time a rather ramshackle shooting lodge. My grandparents converted it, starting with a new east wing to provide quarters for six indoor servants. The original front door opened onto the road, and they added two south gables facing on to the garden to provide a new entrance and a drawing room and extra bedrooms, as well as extending the dining room. They moved to Kilninver in April 1930, bringing with them from the South their butler, William Atkins (a cockney who quickly adapted to west coast life) and his wife, the cook. In 1935 they added the west wing, creating the sun-filled morning room and main guest bedroom. There was a splendid but very noisy Kelvin diesel generator, which woke us up early each morning, and a central heating system which lasted until the end of the century.

Lagganmore was tenanted by the Livingstone, and then MacDiarmid, families, and Barrochreal by Geordie MacDonald. Barnacarry was initially farmed by the MacAskill family, but Grandpa took it in hand in 1935. At that time the Barnacarry land stretched across the hill on the landward side of the Seil road.

There were fourteen men employed on the farm and the salmon fishings. Willie McBain was the farm manager, living at Park which had always been the farmhouse for Kilninver. Alan MacLean was shepherd and cowman, at Dairy Cottage. There was a gamekeeper, George Lamond who lived at Keepers Cottage, and Hugh MacDougall was gardener and ghillie.

Hugh was brother to Sarah, the Kilninver post-mistress. Their sister was married to Mr Clark who had built the "new" (now "old") Post House around the turn of the century, moving business from the low white cottages alongside. Mrs Clark kept the shop after her husband died. Alick and Donald Clark, their sons, also worked on the estate, whose sisters, Jessie and Maggie, subsequently ran the shop and post office until it closed on 31st March 1978.

It was a warm community and a glorious place in which to spend my childhood years.

Initially the ploughing, reaping etc. was carried out with two massive Clydesdale horses, Prince and Stella. I can picture them in my mind's eye today, silhouetted on the top of the raised beach above the house. Before and immediately after the war Kilninver was a hill sheep and cattle farm, while oats, potatoes, hay and neeps were grown on the low ground. The sheep were blackface, and the cattle were crossed to the Aberdeen Angus bull, Jed. There were several milking cows at the dairy, and I regularly "helped" with the milking and butter making. There were always a few grouse and hares on the moor, and excellent salmon and sea trout fishing in the Euchar. Rabbits swarmed everywhere, consuming vast quantities of scarce grass and oats, but providing me with endless sport. I had my first gun at the age of eleven.

Originally there were two salmon netting stations, one on either side of the river estuary. Grandpa only worked the one on the east side, one tide a day, and it was a gorgeous way to spend an evening (in spite of the midges), looking out of the mouth of Loch Feochan to the mountains of Mull.





During the war my family spent a year living at Barnacarry, a wonderful time of freedom before I had to succumb to school life, starting at Kilninver School under Helen Campbell.

After the war things became very difficult. Grandpa was getting old (he was born in 1870). He sold Lagganmore to the McKessacks, and then, in 1952, Barnacarry to Ronnie and Barbara Kerr.

Three men (and a tractor) on the estate replaced the fourteen men and two horses. When Grandpa died in 1958 my Mother inherited Kilninver and, when my father retired in 1960, they came north to live there. But they were unable to cope with the need for new ideas and enterprises, and we took the agonising decision to sell, retaining Keeper's Cottage as our link with our much loved Kilninver and its community.
