A special thanks needed to go to the Melfort Club who have allowed us to go in and print the newsletters.

Current Situation:

2018 was a tough year because the community didn't offer any items and we thought we might have to close. Fortunately, the rally of great items has kept us going. The current newsletter is looking really smart and it tries to include items that are relevant and for all parts of the community. It is frustrating when there seems to be little interest so we need to find out what makes people offer articles because the last issue was quite different in that items were offered without any prompting which is as it should be.

KAMES BAY GARDEN, KILMELFORD

We are opening our garden again for the Scottish Gardens Scheme on Saturday 4th May and Sunday 5th May from 2:00 pm -6:00 pm. Ticket price for adults is £4.00, and children under 16 are free, with all proceeds going to St Columba's Church, Poltalloch, and the Scottish Gardens Schemes charities. We would be delighted if you would like to come and explore the garden.



Over the past 37 years, Kames Bay garden has evolved from two acres of scrub and bracken on a loch side hill into a natural, almost wild, garden, spread over thirteen acres, blending into the contours of the coastal landscape. A garden where visitors can wander at peace on woodland and hillside walks, discovering hidden benches to enjoy the magnificent views over Loch Melfort, and the Isles of Shuna, Luing and Scarba. A garden full of vibrant colours all year, with more than 100 varieties of azaleas & rhododendrons, wild primroses & violets in the spring, with hydrangeas, fuchsia, roses and agapanthus in the summer, and



with acer, prunus and sorbus in the autumn. A garden which offers the best of both worlds – the beauty of cultivation softening the wild edges of the natural landscape.

There are three main walks. The pond walk is the easiest, surrounded by rhododendrons and azaleas in the spring, and by hydrangeas and agapanthus in the summer. The hill walk goes through a hazel tree path, lined with primroses and violets, then up the hill behind the house, ending up at the cream Jubilee bench, which has a fantastic view down Loch Melfort. The woodland walk is quite steep, but is worth the climb when you reach the top and see the stunning views across to Luing and Lunga (weather permitting).



We will be serving old-fashioned teas in the Conservatory, and there will be a plant stall in the Barn. We would recommend sturdy walking shoes as access is up a steep drive.



We look forward very much to welcoming you to Kames Bay Garden, and let's hope we have a warm, sunny, spring Argyll weekend

The sight of a pair of bullfinches hastened on the task of netting the black currant bushes up to the top of the job's list, in mid February. That month's weather was a complete contrast to last year and has brought on not just the fruiting buds but all the spring growth.

Gone are the days when we used to put the first daffodil stems, with flowers still to come out, into a jam jar on the kitchen table on 31st March.

This winter's project has been to replace the first bridge crossing the burn in the wild garden. The telegraph poles had rotted on the far side. With Christophe's construction skills and me as assistant we carried the three 18 ft 8×2 beams down the path and handed them across the water managing not to get our feet wet. The slats and handrail wood cut on site and the design of the 'pointy bits' made up as we went along. The final result is really pleasing.

As every garden owner in the yellow book, for Scotland's garden scheme, must feel choosing one's best day to be open in September the year before is a bit of a lottery. I try not to fret about what will be out or not as what will be will be and the character, warmth and welcome of the garden is part of its natural charm. No two gardens are ever the same.

Various tasks like planting out in the vegetable patches, weeding borders, summer pruning and taking cuttings will be on going during the summer plus being mindful of baking cakes and goodies for the tea house for the open days.

FAREWELL TO THE REV DR KENNETH ROSS

From the early days of Ken coming to be our Minister it was good to see the Manse and its garden becoming the Ross's family home.

Ken and Hester's creative gardening skills led to raised beds for vegetable, a new herbaceous border and a shady area of plantings at the side of the building, using chunks of wood and ferns to create character.

On the front steps a cast-off pair of walking boots became a home for geraniums and general big flower pots were filled with bulbs and summer annuals to make a colourful welcome.

A knock on the outer door gave Ken time to leap out of his Mastermind-style chair behind his desk and be opening the inner door to greet you; no time ever seemed inconvenient.

Soon their home was filled with interesting mementos of travels abroad including the carnival masks from Venice and the herd of wooden elephants on the windowsill in the loo, plus two of the largest and most comfortable armchairs in the sitting room.

Ken's mother Dorothy became a frequent visitor and was known for her determination to attend all of the services at Christmastime and not to be put off by inclement weather or ferries. She was an independent and strong personality with a firm hand at the helm of her own boat – a characteristic which Ken perhaps inherited.

My first sighting of Ken was this figure

striding purposefully up the path at Kilninver Church with members of his family. He was wearing what was to become a familiar olive green fleece jacket and carrying a small black case containing his cheerful blue robe and a brightly embroidered stole.

Our first Kirk Session meeting was held on a bright and sunny afternoon, just too good to be indoors so we sat around the front steps of the Manse on newly moved in garden furniture. Ken commented that he hadn't held a Session meeting outside before. This novelty was followed by him finding that his then Clerk wrote the Minutes by hand, wasn't the best at spelling and didn't do emails. And I never heard him grumble!

Ken's first request was to meet everyone in the three parishes, later to be referred as Netherlorn. Elders took turns to take him on a tour of islands, glens, villages and out of the way homesteads. If folk were not at home Ken wrote a note to leave in the letterbox with the wish to make personal contact at a later date.

From the beginning of his ministry with us Ken showed an amazing ability to remember people's names and asked after family and friends if their troubles were mentioned at a previous meeting. He treated everyone as an equal and put people at their ease – a very genuine and kind man.

At the root of all his involvement in parish life has been his deep and unquestionably strong faith which must support him in all the ups as well as the down times of his ministry. Ken happily became involved with our Xplorers group for the young, adding to his skills with making paper flowers, wielding a needle and wools for tapestry or taking acting parts in our play. He would draw out answers to questions he put to the children and put them all at their ease. It was with enthusiasm that the children volunteered to help say the grace with the hand actions at the close of the gathering.

Our Session of Kilninver and Kilmelford is a Quoad Omnia and meetings could be quite lengthy to cover both pastoral matters, property and finance business. One item that we never minuted was the fact that we had our "elder in residence" and she was Zara – the Ross's family cat. She used to wander in to the sitting room and select the lap with the least papers on it and ever so gently climb up and settle down to a soft purring during the Bible reading and prayers. Thus constituted, she could if necessary be co-opted to form a quorum.

The hill behind the Manse was often used as a keep fit challenge, either running up or down or cycling. He also joined the Kilmelford skiff crew to row back and forth across Loch na Cille. He surprised the children with quick, neat footwork when playing softball in the village hall.

It was when he was very reluctantly chair bound after his dramatic fall off a mountain that Ken admitted it was quite an experience to be on the receiving end of care, for which he expressed his deep appreciation. The table beside his chair was soon covered with chocolates, homemade cakes, books and the odd bottle of uisge beatha.

Another sustenance came in tablet form – not the home-made sweet, but in digital communications via emails across the parish or involvement in World Mission. Equally, Ken was at home with Gaelic conversations with Shian, Mary and Sandy. We were soon used to seeing the neat flat red iPad discretely placed on the lectern and the scroll finger in action during the sermon.

Ken extended his faith and friendship to everyone in Argyll and it is with much sadness that we must say a heartfelt thank you and a very fond farewell to Ken and Hester, Greg, Barney and Cait Anna, Elliot and not forgetting Zara.

May God's blessing keep them all safe on their travels.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 11TH NOVEMBER 2018

In our report in the Christmas Newsletter of events to commemorate the ending of the First World War, we omitted to list Donald Campbell from the Isle of Seil as one of the four stalwart pipers present at the 0600 hrs. tribute around the Kilmelford War Memorial at the Church that day. We apologise for this oversight and in mitigation plead that vision was rather limited that very dark Winter morning!

Donald has sent us this moving piece which we are very pleased to reproduce below:

"It was quite poignant for me as I was playing my grandfather's pipes, Pipe Major John T Park of the 15th Highland Light Infantry. He survived the War but was invalided out in August 1918 after a gassing incident. I was also wearing the medal ribbons of my Great-Uncle, Lt. William A Henderson of the 4th Pioneers Australian Imperial Force. He was decorated for bravery but unfortunately was killed in action in April 1918, at Dernancourt near Amiens, on my birthdate.

Sadly he is one of 11,000 Australian troops who were killed and have no known grave but is commemorated at the Australian National Memorial at Villers-Bretonneux where I played the same pipes in 2014. He emigrated in 1912 and joined up at the very start of the war, survived the horrors of Gallipoli, sent to France where he was mentioned in despatches and decorated on the field by the King of Italy, ultimately meeting his death in 1918. Sadly, he never had a chance to wear his 'honours' in life."

The following description of a child's life at Kilninver in the 1930s and 1940s was written by Elma Lennox (née) MacLean, daughter of Alan and Nellie MacLean of Dairy Cottage, Kilninver. Alan was the shepherd and cowman at Kilninver.

<u>Part 1.</u>

Kilninver will always be a very special place to me, having been born in the Dairy cottage beside the Old Post House. I attended school there until I went to Oban High School, cycling there and back each day. My friend was Doris Atkins, whose father was butler to the Nicols at the Lodge. We had a wonderful childhood and the summer days were never long enough for all we wanted to do – climbing trees, paddling in the river, playing at "wee houses". We were never bored. When Scammadale and Shellachan were let in the summer we delivered telegrams for Miss MacDougall, the post mistress, walking there and back, for which we got 3d (old pence) each. Often we were asked to meet the bus and collect day-old chicks to deliver to Reray (as it was then spelt) or Lagganbeg. I remember having to collect a goat and walk it up to Reray on a rope. He was a real nuisance as he was always wandering and had to be brought back from as far away as Barnacarry.

Our fist teacher at Kilninver school was Miss MacGregor. In my time there were never more than eight or nine pupils. In winter she made cups of cocoa for us. In our lunch break we collected firewood for the school fire. We had school picnics at either Scammadale or Lagganmore and a party at Christmas with a real tree and candles Hugh MacDougall was always Santa Claus and we had to pretend we did not recognise him. To celebrate the coronation in 1937 Mrs Nicol presented the school with a young birch tree and I helped to plant it. It grew to a good height, but later had to be cut down for some reason. Sandy MacKenzie gave me a log from it as a keepsake.

The highlight of our year was the arrival of Salvona's Circus. They were allowed to park on the green in front of Dairy Cottage. They stayed for two or three nights and put on a show which brought people from Easdale, Clachan and Kilmore. There were side-shows, a shooting gallery etc. and they had a wonderful performing pony called Zingara. One of the daughters was an acrobat, and we were enthralled by the things she could do. One year the Zingaras had a monkey which escaped up a tree at the back of the Post Office. Miss MacDougall spied him and roped in Doris and I but the monkey was more agile than us. I still can hear Miss MacDougall calling on her sister to bring a banana. My mother and I were always invited to tea with Mrs Salvona in her caravan which was filled with the most exquisite china. They were lovely people and when they left the green was left spotless. Once war started we never saw them again.

Another highlight was the annual shooting match which took place in the field below the Post Office. Competitors came from far and wide. A marquee was erected and my aunt and Mrs Glendinning from Barandromin (sic) attended to the catering by means of two primus stoves and loads of corned beef sandwiches – and of course there was always a dram or two!

The Post Office House was partly let during the summer months and the Clarks moved out to the little old cottage. Mr Clark would stand in front of the fireplace with a handkerchief knotted at each corner on his head, humming psalm tunes. They were wonderful neighbours, as were Miss MacDougall (Auntie Sarah to us) and her brother Hugh. Mrs Clark, Miss MacDougall and Hugh were sisters and brother. I believe they were born in the little old cottage and built the Post Office when Mrs Clark married. The Clarks had the shop and Miss MacDougall became the post mistress. Hugh was gardener, ghillie and handyman at the Lodge. We depended on Clark's shop for essentials, and of course our 1d worth of sweets. Mr Clark made little "pokes" out of grease-proof paper to hold whatever took our fancy – black striped balls or peppermints, etc.

The Clarks had four of a family – Jessie, Maggie, Alec and Donald. Alec sadly died at the age of forty-nine. He was chauffeur for the Nicols as well as odd job man. Jessie kept house for her parents, and later took over as postmistress. Maggie was teacher at the little side school at Bragleen until it closed. She travelled up and down on a motor cycle until she acquired a car. It was a bit erratic and had to be pushed to the top of the wee brae before running down to the bridge where it coughed into life. Maggie was a great lover of cats and dogs. Donald was our soul mate and we spent hours with him in the garage adjoining the wee cottage while he tinkered with bits of motor bikes, and played records on an old gramophone. When he went out on his bike, the older folk would shake their heads and say he would come to a sticky end with the speed he went at! Probably no more than 20mph!

Spring is in the air, Kilmelford's new appliance is well and truly "bedded in" and it has been turned out on numerous occasions making use of its specialist equipment as a back up to other fire stations as well as first pump for our local area. We have had a couple of applications to join the crew at Kilmelford but there is still room for more if anyone is interested please contact Crew Manager Donald Smith for details.

The next Fire Fighter's Charity Pub Quiz will be held in Cuilfail Hotel on Easter Saturday 20th April. There could be some chocolate Easter bunnies and eggs as prizes so check for posters in the pub and shop. The Fire Fighter's Charity has decided to award Kilmelford with a framed "Recognition of Achievement" certificate for the years of fundraising totalling some £20,000 over the last 18 years. Thanks are due to all crew members, both past and present, and, of course, to yourselves for your amazing support. Thank you everyone.

Two subjects are being highlighted at this time. The first is "burning" farm land and the second is "white goods" safety in the home.

If you are intending to burn any vegetation, it's important that you follow the Muirburn Code. Full details are available on the fire service web site **www.firescotland.gov.uk** but some of the points to remember are: • Notify neighbours before burning and the fire and rescue service before burning and on completion, each day.

• Erect warning signs if the fires will be close to areas heavily used by the public.

• Assess the weather conditions: are they suitable for burning? The wind speed should not be too strong – normally not above Force 3 (8-12 mph).

• You should not burn on your own. Carefully brief sufficient people (normally teams of 3) to carry out the planned burning programme.

• No more than two fires should be lit at any one time.

• Health and safety requirements must be met. Stout boots, fireretardant overalls and face visors (or goggles) should be worn.

• Communications should be available (e.g. mobile phone, radio); it is good practice to have extra people on call to assist if necessary. A supply of drinking water and a first aid kit should also be available

• Avoid burning near nesting birds or sensitive habitats.

A new campaign has been launched to try to reduce the risk of fire in the home related to white goods. Keep everyone and everything important to you safe. Don't leave appliances such as dishwashers, tumble dryers and washing machines on when you're out or asleep. If you would like to know if there may be a safety issues or any product recalls concerning white goods in your home, visit the following web sites;

YOUR FIRE STATION NEEDS YOU!

Firefighting in Kilmelford started in 1950 with a box of equipment and some informal volunteers, now the village has a modern station with a brand new fire engine and some of the best training and latest equipment available in the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service.

Squadron Leader McLean of "Glenmore Estate" started the unit in 1950. Mr McLean provided equipment and a fire box, which was sited to the rear of the church. Russell Fleming was the original Leader and served for over 32 years. In 1951 a Mr Farlane McKenzie of the Culfail Hotel met Donald Campbell, the local postmaster, and was handed a webbing belt with a hand axe and a pair of wellington boots. He was told he was now a member of the Kilmelford Volunteer Fire Service where he remained for 23 years.

Equipment and premises have moved on quite considerably since the 1950s. Today the village has a purpose built fire station, complete with a full equipped brand new Rapid Response Unit capable of blasting through concrete and steel. The new appliance is equipped with breathing apparatus, a ladder, a pump, hose, thermal imaging camera, defibrillator and a colour digital display. However, where the station is not lacking in equipment, it's very much lacking in volunteers.

Volunteering with Kilmelford fire station is great way to support the local community or even prepare you for a career in the fire and rescue service. We are looking for people from a wide age range and varied backgrounds. Have you ever thought about becoming a firefighter, or helping in the community, now is your chance to make it happen.

There are currently several Volunteer Firefighter vacancies at Kilmelford Fire Station.

Pop down to the station on a Thursday evening between 7-9pm and have a chat with Donald Smith, Kilmelford's Volunteer Leader about being a Volunteer Firefighter or download the application from the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service website. RIFLEMEN FORM!



There is a sound of thunder afar, Storm in the south that darkens the day, Storm of battle and thunder of war, Well, if it do not roll our way. Form, form! Riflemen form! Ready, be ready to meet the storm! Riflemen, riflemen, riflemen form!

The pace of Tennyson's poem echoed the impatience of the British people in 1859. With the threat of French invasion growing ever stronger, the government finally created a new military force for home defence. Now there was an urgency to bring it up to strength. Volunteer companies of part-time soldiers formed eagerly throughout the British Isles. What was remarkable was how this fervour permeated even the remote communities of Argyll, the least accessible county in Scotland.

It all began a decade earlier when a letter was leaked to The Times. It was from the Duke of Wellington to one of his generals; and it was embarrassing. The Commander-in-Chief exposed how woefully inadequate Britain's defences were. Worse, the threat had changed. Steam was replacing sail, and a French navy powered by steam could easily land an invading army anywhere around the coast of Britain. The public reacted angrily, but it needed a mass demonstration in London before the government took action.

The Volunteer Force was entirely new and its strategy was simple. All around Britain's coast there would be Artillery Volunteers to defend towns and cities from naval attack. Elsewhere there would be Rifle Volunteers – infantrymen – to harass the flanks of an invading army. In Argyll, as in every other county, there was a surge of enthusiasm. As early as March 1860 the slate quarrymen at Easdale formed two artillery companies. Heavy cannon would guard this tiny slab of land for almost half a century. We can trace their history in the museums at Ellenabeich and on Easdale Island. We can even examine records of their live-firing practices and follow their training, minute by minute, as they fired four 64-pounder guns at a target floating in the Firth of Lorne. Argyll's Volunteer Artillery would expand to more than a dozen companies spread over fifteen remote locations. But Argyll's Rifle Volunteers were quicker off the mark.

In that year, 1860, twelve Rifle companies formed in Argyll. One of the earliest was at Melfort, drawing its manpower mostly from the Gunpowder Works. 6th Argyllshire Rifle Volunteers were established for two companies, each of three officers and a hundred men, but they may never have recruited sufficient for both. Richard Roper Kelly became its only captain in April 1860. John MacGregor and Malcolm MacOueen joined as junior officers in May and a total of ninety seven had been recruited by August. Elsewhere, companies formed in Oban, Tayvallich and Campbeltown; on Mull and on Islay; and at Inveraray, Dunoon, Glendaruel and Glenorchy. Subsequent years would include Ballachulish, Kilmartin and Carradale as well.

By 1863 all companies were wearing uniforms of green doublets with scarlet facings, kilts of Campbell of Cawdor tartan, white sporrans with three black tassels, hose of the colours of heather, and glengarry bonnets. Their badge was the bugle of Light Infantry surmounted by a crown and, in the centre, the boar's head of the Campbells of Argyll.

Many units, swept along by the initial wave of enthusiasm, did not survive. The company on Mull disbanded in 1862. Those in Melfort followed in 1864, victims to the practicalities of recruitment, training and equipment in so remote a location. They were not alone. But others flourished, surviving frequent reorganization and changes of uniform – over the next half-century. In 1887 the Argyllshire Rifles became 5th Volunteer Battalion Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. They wore red doublets with the kilts of their regular counterparts, which military folk call 42nd or Government tartan but is better known today as Black Watch.

The Volunteer Force achieved its aim: the French never invaded. But some Volunteers did see active service. Sixty-one men from the Argyll battalion served in South Africa, answering their country's call for volunteers to reinforce Britain's depleted army during the Boer War. Then in 1908 came radical change. The nation's Volunteer Force was replaced with a new Territorial Force; and Argyll's Volunteers became 8th Territorial Battalion Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. They served with distinction in two world wars before being disbanded in 1967. Argyll's war memorials, scattered throughout its far-flung parishes, testify to their service.
